Survey Data

Response Rate

- Twenty Five Organizations Reported
- Mix of State, County agencies and Nonprofits
- Less than 5% of CWLA Membership

Major Program Services

Family support	88.0%
Mental health	72.0%
Teen parenting	56.0%
Fatherhood	52.0%
Mentoring	48.0%

Reasons for Partnerships

Nearly 90% of respondents believe that working with Faith Partners would stimulate community interest/commitment to children and families

Criteria for Selecting a Partner

- Community outreach activities/ministries of the faith organization (86%)
- Staff knowledge or experience with the faith-based entity (77%)
- The faith-based organization's reputation in the community (91%)

Shared Activities

- Volunteer recruitment and referral identification are the major shared activities between agencies and faith organizations (65% of respondents)
- Joint Outreach and Co-hosting community activities
 (72% of respondents)

Challenges

 Large congregations with no strong connections to community (27.3%)

 Small congregations with no infrastructure (63.6%)

 Inability to align goals and missions (36.4%)

Major Initiatives

- Adoption training; space for teen clubs and visitation centers
- Chaplaincy
- Volunteer recruitment
- Mentoring and counsel
- Food, clothing and resources for needy families.
- Joint effort between faith community, agency and university to develop a "needs portal" for social workers to request assistance for families

Faith organizations are valued partners in strengthening families and communities!

Faith communities:

- provide natural support networks.
- contribute to the community safety net.
- offer a sense of refuge and support for those reluctant to seek services from the government.

Comments

Most effective connections with the faith community comes from minister to minister contact NOT from state staff outreaching to members of the faith community.
