# INDIANA'S CHILDREN 2015

## Indiana's Children At a Glance<sup>1</sup>

#### CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

- In 2013, Indiana had 160,878 total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 95,140 reports were referred for investigation.
- In 2013, 21,755 children were victims of abuse or neglect in Indiana, a rate of 13.7 per 1,000 children, representing a 7.0% increase from 2012. Of these children, 88.1% were neglected, 10.5% were physically abused, and 14.1% were sexually abused.
- The number of child victims has decreased 2.6% in comparison to the number of victims in 2009.
- In 2013, 28 children in Indiana died as a result of abuse or neglect.<sup>11</sup>
- In 2013, 12,372 children in Indiana lived apart from their families in out-of-home care, compared with 12,238 children in 2009. In 2012, 4,739 of the children living apart from their families were age 5 or younger, and 1,680 were 16 or older. <sup>12</sup>
- The number of children living apart from their families in out-of-home care has increased 1.1% in comparison to the number of children in out-of-home care in 2009. 13
- Of Indiana children in out-of-home care in 2013, 65.9% were white, 19.8% black, 7.6% Hispanic, 0.0% American Indian/Alaskan Native, 0.2% Asian or Pacific Islander and 6.5% of more than one race or ethnicity.

## ADOPTION, KINSHIP CARE, AND PERMANENT FAMILIES FOR CHILDREN

- Of the 7,170 children exiting out-of-home care in Indiana in 2012, 60% were reunited with their parents or other family members. 15
- In 2013, 961 children were legally adopted through the public child welfare agency in Indiana, a 43.9% decrease from 1.713 in 2012.<sup>16</sup>
- Of the 12,372 children in out-of-home care in 2013, 2,437 or 19.7% were waiting to be adopted. <sup>17</sup>
- In 2013, approximately 65,796 Indiana grandparents had primary responsibility caring for their grandchildren.
- Of the children in out-of-home care in 2012, 3,472 were living with relatives while in care. 19

#### CHILD POVERTY AND INCOME SUPPORT

- The total number of individuals receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) in Indiana decreased from 46,185 in 2013 to 44,546 in 2014, a decrease of 3.5%. The number of families receiving TANF in 2014 was 20,050, a 4.1% decrease from 2013.<sup>20</sup>
- From 2012-2013, for every 100 Indiana families living in poverty, only 9 received TANF benefits.<sup>21</sup>
- In 2013, \$216,971,985 was spent in Indiana on TANF assistance, including 13% on basic assistance, 0% on child care, 0% on transportation, and 87% on nonassistance. <sup>22</sup>
- In 2013, \$71,329,804 was spent on WIC (the Special Supplement Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children) in Indiana, serving 157,589 participants.<sup>23</sup>



- In 2013, Indiana distributed \$568,000,950 in child support funds, a 2.2% decrease from 2012.<sup>24</sup>
- In 2013 in Indiana, 437,000 children lived in households with a high housing burden, where more than 30% of monthly income is spent on housing costs. 25

#### CHILD CARE AND HEAD START

- In 2013, Indiana had a monthly average of 36,600 children served by subsidized child care; 34,200 children received subsidized child care in 2012 and 32,400 in 2011. 26
- In 2014, to be eligible for subsidized child care in Indiana, a family of three could make no more than \$24,804, which is equivalent to 42% of the state's median income. <sup>27</sup>
- In 2013, Head Start served 14,820 Indiana children, a 4.5% decrease from 2012.<sup>28</sup>

### **HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE**

- In 2014, 548,000 children younger than 19 were enrolled in Medicaid in Indiana—77% of the total number of enrollees in the state. 29
- In 2012, Indiana had 154,262 children enrolled in its State Children's Health Insurance Program, a 2.5% decrease from 2011, when 158,138 children were enrolled.<sup>30</sup>
- In 2013, Indiana had 130,004 uninsured children.<sup>31</sup>
- In 2012, 6,555 babies were born weighing less than 2,500 grams in Indiana. 32
- In 2011, 644 infants under age 1 died in Indiana. 33
- In 2012, the birth rate for teens 15–17 in Indiana was 16 births per 1,000 girls; for teens 18–19, the rate was 59. This reflects a total rate of 33 births per 1,000 girls ages 15–19. 34
- Cumulative through 2013, 10,663 adults and adolescents, as well as 57 children younger than 13, were reported as having HIV/AIDS in Indiana.<sup>35</sup>
- In 2013, an estimated 32,000 children ages 12–17 and 358,000 adults age 18 and older were dependent on or abusing illicit drugs or alcohol in Indiana.<sup>36</sup>

## **VULNERABLE YOUTH**

- In 2011, 151 children aged out of out-of-home care—exited foster care to emancipation—in Indiana.
- In 2013, 26,000 Indiana teens ages 16–19 were not enrolled in school and were not working.
- In 2013, 102,000 young adults ages 18–24 were not enrolled in school, were not working, and had no degree beyond high school.<sup>39</sup>
- In 2013, approximately 18,000 children ages 12–17 in Indiana needed but had not received treatment for illicit drug use in the past year.<sup>40</sup>
- In 2013, approximately 18,000 children ages 12–17 needed but had not received treatment for alcohol use in the past year.<sup>41</sup>
- In 2013, 53 Indiana children younger than 20 committed suicide, a rate of 2.99 per 100,000 children. 42

## JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION

- In 2013, 79 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Indiana, a 43.6% increase from 55 in 2012. 43
- In 2013, 15,960 children younger than 18 were arrested in Indiana, a 16% decrease from 19,005 arrests in 2012. Of the arrests in 2013, 806 were for violent crimes.



• In 2013, 1,878 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Indiana. 45

## CHILD WELFARE WORKFORCE<sup>46</sup>

- A 2003 General Accounting Office (GAO) report documented that staff shortages, high caseloads, high worker turnover
  and low salaries impinge on delivering services to achieve safety, permanence, and well being for children. In Children's
  Rights 2009, A Long Road Home report, similar challenges to the child welfare caseworkers were identified, in addition
  to no standard training or consistent background requirements, need for meaningful supervision, and lack of private
  workspace, technology and other resources.<sup>47</sup>
- The federal Child and Family Service Reviews have clearly demonstrated that the more time a caseworker spends with a child and family, the better the outcomes for those children and families.<sup>48</sup>
- According to the 2003 GAO report, the average caseload for child welfare/foster care caseworkers is 24–31 children; these high caseloads contribute to high worker turnover and insufficient services being provided to children and families. CWLA recommends that foster care caseworkers have caseloads of 12–15 children.<sup>49</sup>
- The National Association of Social Workers 2012 Document to the Obama Administration called for full funding of the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) and Promoting Safe and Stable Families (PSSF), protection of the Social Security Block Grant (SSBG) from budget cuts and elimination, a variety of child maltreatment prevention services to be available through programs serving children and families (e.g., TANF, Head Start, etc.), maximization of collaboration amongst different systems (e.g., Child Welfare, Public Health, Juvenile Justice, etc.) to improve integration, culturally and linguistically appropriate delivery of services, identification and implementation of evidence-based practices, and incentivization of BSW and MSW students to join the child welfare workforce.<sup>50</sup>

#### FUNDING CHILD WELFARE SERVICES FOR INDIANA'S CHILDREN

- In 2012, Indiana spent \$620,936,473 for child welfare services. Child welfare services are all direct and administrative services the state agency provides to children and families. Of this amount, \$206,658,806 was from federal funds, \$414,277,667 from state funds, and \$0 from local funds.<sup>51</sup>
- In 2012, of the \$206,658,806 in federal funds received for child welfare, 70.9% was from Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance, 6.7% came from Title IV-B Child Welfare Services and Promoting Safe and Stable Families, 4.4% was from Medicaid, 5.9% came from Social Services Block Grant, 9.3% was from TANF, and 2.8% came from other federal sources.<sup>52</sup>
- Indiana received \$65,591,731 in federal funds for IV-E foster care expenditures in 2012, including \$37,797,940 for maintenance payments and \$27,793,791 for administration, child placement, the statewide automated child welfare information system, and training.<sup>53</sup>

Note: The dearth in current state-by-state workforce data makes clear the need for critical data on compensation, working conditions including safety issues, academic degrees held, education and training received, and factors contributing to turnover. To address this, CWLA is calling for Congress to authorize the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) to conduct an updated study on the child welfare workforce. It would make recommendations regarding caseloads and workloads, education levels, and training requirements. In addition, the study would examine data reporting and collection and make recommendations on how states might improve these efforts.
