CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

- In 2013, Louisiana had 42,003 total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 25,788 reports were referred for investigation.⁸
- In 2013, 10,119 children were victims of abuse or neglect in Louisiana, a rate of 9.1 per 1,000 children, representing a 16.4% increase from 2012. Of these children, 87.2% were neglected, 18.8% were physically abused, and 6.9% were sexually abused.⁹
- The number of child victims has increased 11.7% in comparison to the number of victims in 2009.¹⁰
- Louisiana responds to lower risk, higher safety reports through alternative response services to address family issues. 11,838 reports were responded to in this way in 2013.¹¹
- In 2013, 43 children in Louisiana died as a result of abuse or neglect.¹²
- In 2013, 3,955 children in Louisiana lived apart from their families in out-of-home care, compared with 4,786 children in 2009. In 2012, 1,732 of the children living apart from their families were age 5 or younger, and 463 were 16 or older.¹³
- The number of children living apart from their families in out-of-home care has decreased 17.4% in comparison to the number of children in out-of-home care in 2009.¹⁴
- Of Louisiana children in out-of-home care in 2013, 59.0% were white, 32.4% black, 1.8% Hispanic, 0.0% American Indian/Alaskan Native, 0.0% Asian or Pacific Islander and 5.9% of more than one race or ethnicity.¹⁵

ADOPTION, KINSHIP CARE, AND PERMANENT FAMILIES FOR CHILDREN

- Of the 3,470 children exiting out-of-home care in Louisiana in 2012, 57% were reunited with their parents or other family members.¹⁶
- In 2013, 731 children were legally adopted through the public child welfare agency in Louisiana, a 11.6% increase from 655 in 2012.¹⁷
- Of the 3,955 children in out-of-home care in 2013, 961 or 24.3% were waiting to be adopted.¹⁸
- In 2013, approximately 78,766 Louisiana grandparents had primary responsibility caring for their grandchildren.¹⁹
- Of the children in out-of-home care in 2012, 935 were living with relatives while in care.²⁰

CHILD POVERTY AND INCOME SUPPORT

- The total number of individuals receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) in Louisiana decreased from 61,812 in 2013 to 57,766 in 2014, a decrease of 6.5%. The number of families receiving TANF in 2014 was 28,587, a 6.4% decrease from 2013.²¹
- From 2012-2013, for every 100 Louisiana families living in poverty, only 6 received TANF benefits.²²
- In 2013, \$205,287,384 was spent in Louisiana on TANF assistance, including 13% on basic assistance, 0% on child care, 0% on transportation, and 87% on nonassistance.²³



- In 2013, \$84,208,074 was spent on WIC (the Special Supplement Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children) in Louisiana, serving 139,142 participants.²⁴
- In 2013, Louisiana distributed \$388,552,815 in child support funds, a 2.2% increase from 2012.²⁵
- In 2013 in Louisiana, 346,000 children lived in households with a high housing burden, where more than 30% of monthly income is spent on housing costs.²⁶

CHILD CARE AND HEAD START

- In 2013, Louisiana had a monthly average of 24,000 children served by subsidized child care; 28,700 children received subsidized child care in 2012 and 36,000 in 2011.²⁷
- In 2014, to be eligible for subsidized child care in Louisiana, a family of three could make no more than \$30,540, which is equivalent to 53% of the state's median income.²⁸
- In 2013, Head Start served 21,061 Louisiana children, a 4.5% decrease from 2012.²⁹

HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE

- In 2014, 561,900 children younger than 19 were enrolled in Medicaid in Louisiana—78% of the total number of enrollees in the state.³⁰
- In 2012, Louisiana had 150,672 children enrolled in its State Children's Health Insurance Program, a 1.1% decrease from 2011, when 152,404 children were enrolled.³¹
- In 2013, Louisiana had 63,312 uninsured children.³²
- In 2012, 6,740 babies were born weighing less than 2,500 grams in Louisiana.³³
- In 2011, 510 infants under age 1 died in Louisiana.³⁴
- In 2012, the birth rate for teens 15–17 in Louisiana was 19 births per 1,000 girls; for teens 18–19, the rate was 78. This reflects a total rate of 43 births per 1,000 girls ages 15–19.³⁵
- Cumulative through 2013, 23,428 adults and adolescents, as well as 143 children younger than 13, were reported as having HIV/AIDS in Louisiana.³⁶
- In 2013, an estimated 22,000 children ages 12–17 and 241,000 adults age 18 and older were dependent on or abusing illicit drugs or alcohol in Louisiana.³⁷

VULNERABLE YOUTH

- In 2011, 250 children aged out of out-of-home care—exited foster care to emancipation—in Louisiana.³⁸
- In 2013, 29,000 Louisiana teens ages 16–19 were not enrolled in school and were not working.³⁹
- In 2013, 106,000 young adults ages 18–24 were not enrolled in school, were not working, and had no degree beyond high school.⁴⁰
- In 2013, approximately 13,000 children ages 12–17 in Louisiana needed but had not received treatment for illicit drug use in the past year.⁴¹
- In 2013, approximately 11,000 children ages 12–17 needed but had not received treatment for alcohol use in the past year.⁴²
- In 2013, 35 Louisiana children younger than 20 committed suicide, a rate of 2.84 per 100,000 children.⁴³

JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION

• In 2013, 97 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Louisiana, a 5.4% increase from 92 in 2012.⁴⁴



- In 2013, 16,666 children younger than 18 were arrested in Louisiana, a 24% increase from 13,492 arrests in 2012. Of the arrests in 2013, 1,122 were for violent crimes.⁴⁵
- In 2013, 957 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Louisiana.⁴⁶

CHILD WELFARE WORKFORCE⁴⁷

- A 2003 General Accounting Office (GAO) report documented that staff shortages, high caseloads, high worker turnover and low salaries impinge on delivering services to achieve safety, permanence, and well being for children. In Children's Rights 2009, A Long Road Home report, similar challenges to the child welfare caseworkers were identified, in addition to no standard training or consistent background requirements, need for meaningful supervision, and lack of private workspace, technology and other resources.⁴⁸
- The federal Child and Family Service Reviews have clearly demonstrated that the more time a caseworker spends with a child and family, the better the outcomes for those children and families.⁴⁹
- According to the 2003 GAO report, the average caseload for child welfare/foster care caseworkers is 24–31 children; these high caseloads contribute to high worker turnover and insufficient services being provided to children and families. CWLA recommends that foster care caseworkers have caseloads of 12–15 children.⁵⁰
- The National Association of Social Workers 2012 Document to the Obama Administration called for full funding of theChild Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) and Promoting Safe and Stable Families (PSSF), protection of the Social Security Block Grant (SSBG) from budget cuts and elimination, a variety of child maltreatment prevention services to be available through programs serving children and families (e.g., TANF, Head Start, etc.), maximization of collaboration amongst different systems (e.g., Child Welfare, Public Health, Juvenile Justice, etc.) to improve integration, culturally and linguistically appropriate delivery of services, identification and implementation of evidence-based practices, and incentivization of BSW and MSW students to join the child welfare workforce.⁵¹

FUNDING CHILD WELFARE SERVICES FOR LOUISIANA'S CHILDREN

- In 2012, Louisiana spent \$203,811,944 for child welfare services. Child welfare services are all direct and administrative services the state agency provides to children and families. Of this amount, \$165,978,952 was from federal funds and \$37,832,992 from state funds.⁵²
- In 2012, of the \$165,978,952 in federal funds received for child welfare, 38.1% was from Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance, 9.9% came from Title IV-B Child Welfare Services and Promoting Safe and Stable Families, 2.1% was from Medicaid, 35.6% came from Social Services Block Grant, 11.0% was from TANF, and 3.4% came from other federal sources.⁵³
- Louisiana received \$43,267,273 in federal funds for IV-E foster care expenditures in 2012, including \$23,352,519 for maintenance payments and \$19,914,754 for administration, child placement, the statewide automated child welfare information system, and training.⁵⁴

⁴⁷ Note: The dearth in current state-by-state workforce data makes clear the need for critical data on compensation, working conditions including safety issues, academic degrees held, education and training received, and factors contributing to turnover. To address this, CWLA is calling for Congress to authorize the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) to conduct an updated study on the child welfare workforce. It would make recommendations regarding caseloads and workloads, education levels, and training requirements. In addition, the study would examine data reporting and collection and make recommendations on how states might improve these efforts.
