CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

- In 2013, Minnesota had 69,322 total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 20,316 reports were referred for investigation.
- In 2013, 4,183 children were victims of abuse or neglect in Minnesota, a rate of 3.3 per 1,000 children, representing a 1.3% decrease from 2012. Of these children, 70.8% were neglected, 21.5% were physically abused, and 18.1% were sexually abused.
- The number of child victims has decreased 10.4% in comparison to the number of victims in 2009. 10
- Minnesota responds to lower risk, higher safety reports through alternative response services to address family issues. 19,734 reports were responded to in this way in 2013. 11
- In 2013, 18 children in Minnesota died as a result of abuse or neglect.¹²
- In 2013, 5,719 children in Minnesota lived apart from their families in out-of-home care, compared with 5,410 children in 2009. In 2012, 1,740 of the children living apart from their families were age 5 or younger, and 1,221 were 16 or older.¹³
- The number of children living apart from their families in out-of-home care has increased 5.7% in comparison to the number of children in out-of-home care in 2009.¹⁴
- Of Minnesota children in out-of-home care in 2013, 46.5% were white, 17.7% black, 13.0% Hispanic, 8.1% American Indian/Alaskan Native, 3.3% Asian or Pacific Islander and 10.8% of more than one race or ethnicity. 15

ADOPTION, KINSHIP CARE, AND PERMANENT FAMILIES FOR CHILDREN

- Of the 5,276 children exiting out-of-home care in Minnesota in 2012, 66% were reunited with their parents or other family members. ¹⁶
- In 2013, 583 children were legally adopted through the public child welfare agency in Minnesota, a 12.1% increase from 520 in 2012.¹⁷
- Of the 5,719 children in out-of-home care in 2013, 1,080 or 18.9% were waiting to be adopted.
- In 2013, approximately 25,068 Minnesota grandparents had primary responsibility caring for their grandchildren.
- Of the children in out-of-home care in 2012, 1,050 were living with relatives while in care.

CHILD POVERTY AND INCOME SUPPORT

- The total number of individuals receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) in Minnesota decreased from 84,901 in 2013 to 61,280 in 2014, a decrease of 27.8%. The number of families receiving TANF in 2014 was 26,721, a 26.9% decrease from 2013.²¹
- From 2012-2013, for every 100 Minnesota families living in poverty, only 38 received TANF benefits.
- In 2013, \$432,184,048 was spent in Minnesota on TANF assistance, including 22% on basic assistance, 0% on child



care, 0% on transportation, and 78% on nonassistance.²³

- In 2013, \$69,709,016 was spent on WIC (the Special Supplement Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children) in Minnesota, serving 123,360 participants. ²⁴
- In 2013, Minnesota distributed \$584,830,863 in child support funds, a 0.4% increase from 2012.²⁵
- In 2013 in Minnesota, 332,000 children lived in households with a high housing burden, where more than 30% of monthly income is spent on housing costs. ²⁶

CHILD CARE AND HEAD START

- In 2013, Minnesota had a monthly average of 25,700 children served by subsidized child care; 25,700 children received subsidized child care in 2012 and 31,200 in 2011. 27
- In 2014, to be eligible for subsidized child care in Minnesota, a family of three could make no more than \$34,459, which is equivalent to 47% of the state's median income. ²⁸
- As of early 2014, Minnesota had 7,973 children on its waiting list for child care assistance.
- In 2013, Head Start served 10,702 Minnesota children, a 6.2% decrease from 2012. 30

HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE

- In 2014, 389,700 children younger than 19 were enrolled in Medicaid in Minnesota—58% of the total number of
 enrollees in the state.³¹
- In 2012, Minnesota had 4,104 children enrolled in its State Children's Health Insurance Program, a 8.0% decrease from 2011, when 4,461 children were enrolled.³²
- In 2013, Minnesota had 71,982 uninsured children.³³
- In 2012, 4,550 babies were born weighing less than 2,500 grams in Minnesota. 34
- In 2011, 326 infants under age 1 died in Minnesota. 35
- In 2012, the birth rate for teens 15–17 in Minnesota was 8 births per 1,000 girls; for teens 18–19, the rate was 33. This reflects a total rate of 19 births per 1,000 girls ages 15–19.³⁶
- Cumulative through 2013, 6,420 adults and adolescents, as well as 30 children younger than 13, were reported as having HIV/AIDS in Minnesota.³⁷
- In 2013, an estimated 21,000 children ages 12–17 and 306,000 adults age 18 and older were dependent on or abusing illicit drugs or alcohol in Minnesota. 38

VULNERABLE YOUTH

- In 2011, 340 children aged out of out-of-home care—exited foster care to emancipation—in Minnesota.
- In 2013, 14,000 Minnesota teens ages 16–19 were not enrolled in school and were not working.
- In 2013, 49,000 young adults ages 18–24 were not enrolled in school, were not working, and had no degree beyond high school.⁴¹
- In 2013, approximately 11,000 children ages 12–17 in Minnesota needed but had not received treatment for illicit drug use in the past year. 42
- In 2013, approximately 13,000 children ages 12–17 needed but had not received treatment for alcohol use in the past year.⁴³
- In 2013, 44 Minnesota children younger than 20 committed suicide, a rate of 3.09 per 100,000 children.



JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION

- In 2013, 25 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Minnesota, a 16.7% decrease from 30 in 2012.
- In 2013, 25,554 children younger than 18 were arrested in Minnesota. Of the arrests in 2013, 877 were for violent crimes.⁴⁶
- In 2013, 828 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Minnesota.

CHILD WELFARE WORKFORCE⁴⁸

- A 2003 General Accounting Office (GAO) report documented that staff shortages, high caseloads, high worker turnover
 and low salaries impinge on delivering services to achieve safety, permanence, and well being for children. In Children's
 Rights 2009, A Long Road Home report, similar challenges to the child welfare caseworkers were identified, in addition
 to no standard training or consistent background requirements, need for meaningful supervision, and lack of private
 workspace, technology and other resources.⁴⁹
- The federal Child and Family Service Reviews have clearly demonstrated that the more time a caseworker spends with a child and family, the better the outcomes for those children and families.⁵⁰
- According to the 2003 GAO report, the average caseload for child welfare/foster care caseworkers is 24–31 children; these high caseloads contribute to high worker turnover and insufficient services being provided to children and families. CWLA recommends that foster care caseworkers have caseloads of 12–15 children.⁵¹
- The National Association of Social Workers 2012 Document to the Obama Administration called for full funding of the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) and Promoting Safe and Stable Families (PSSF), protection of the Social Security Block Grant (SSBG) from budget cuts and elimination, a variety of child maltreatment prevention services to be available through programs serving children and families (e.g., TANF, Head Start, etc.), maximization of collaboration amongst different systems (e.g., Child Welfare, Public Health, Juvenile Justice, etc.) to improve integration, culturally and linguistically appropriate delivery of services, identification and implementation of evidence-based practices, and incentivization of BSW and MSW students to join the child welfare workforce.⁵²

FUNDING CHILD WELFARE SERVICES FOR MINNESOTA'S CHILDREN

- In 2012, Minnesota spent \$529,778,891 for child welfare services. Child welfare services are all direct and administrative services the state agency provides to children and families. Of this amount, \$155,287,680 was from federal funds, \$123,800,110 from state funds, and \$250,691,101 from local funds. ⁵³
- In 2012, of the \$155,287,680 in federal funds received for child welfare, 42.8% was from Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance, 4.3% came from Title IV-B Child Welfare Services and Promoting Safe and Stable Families, 28.9% was from Medicaid, 13.9% came from Social Services Block Grant, 0.0% was from TANF, and 10.0% came from other federal sources.⁵⁴
- Minnesota received \$39,466,516 in federal funds for IV-E foster care expenditures in 2012, including \$14,186,485 for maintenance payments and \$25,280,031 for administration, child placement, the statewide automated child welfare information system, and training.⁵⁵

- ⁴⁸ Note: The dearth in current state-by-state workforce data makes clear the need for critical data on compensation, working conditions including safety issues, academic degrees held, education and training received, and factors contributing to turnover. To address this, CWLA is calling for Congress to authorize the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) to conduct an updated study on the child welfare workforce. It would make recommendations regarding caseloads and workloads, education levels, and training requirements. In addition, the study would examine data reporting and collection and make recommendations on how states might improve these efforts.
