CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

- In 2013, North Dakota had 3,779 total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 3,779 reports were referred for investigation.
- In 2013, 1,517 children were victims of abuse or neglect in North Dakota, a rate of 9.3 per 1,000 children, representing a 7.6% increase from 2012. Of these children, 72.3% were neglected, 12.5% were physically abused, and 4.2% were sexually abused.
- In 2013, 1 child in North Dakota died as a result of abuse or neglect.¹⁰
- In 2013, 1,227 children in North Dakota lived apart from their families in out-of-home care, compared with 1,210 children in 2009. In 2012, 350 of the children living apart from their families were age 5 or younger, and 255 were 16 or older. 11
- The number of children living apart from their families in out-of-home care has increased 1.4% in comparison to the number of children in out-of-home care in 2009. 12
- Of North Dakota children in out-of-home care in 2013, 53.8% were white, 0.0% black, 5.8% Hispanic, 24.0% American Indian/Alaskan Native, 0.0% Asian or Pacific Islander and 16.3% of more than one race or ethnicity.

ADOPTION, KINSHIP CARE, AND PERMANENT FAMILIES FOR CHILDREN

- Of the 778 children exiting out-of-home care in North Dakota in 2012, 54% were reunited with their parents or other family members.¹⁴
- In 2013, 104 children were legally adopted through the public child welfare agency in North Dakota, a 32.9% decrease from 155 in 2012.¹⁵
- Of the 1,227 children in out-of-home care in 2013, 237 or 19.3% were waiting to be adopted.¹⁶
- In 2013, approximately 4,445 North Dakota grandparents had primary responsibility caring for their grandchildren. ¹⁷
- Of the children in out-of-home care in 2012, 138 were living with relatives while in care. 18

CHILD POVERTY AND INCOME SUPPORT

- The total number of individuals receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) in North Dakota decreased from 38,955 in 2013 to 31,223 in 2014, a decrease of 19.8%. The number of families receiving TANF in 2014 was 16,554, a 17.8% decrease from 2013. 19
- From 2012-2013, for every 100 North Dakota families living in poverty, only 14 received TANF benefits.
- In 2013, \$33,921,801 was spent in North Dakota on TANF from both federal and state dollars, including 57% on basic assistance, and 43% on nonassistance. ²¹
- In 2013, \$7,063,635 was spent on WIC (the Special Supplement Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children) in North Dakota, serving 12,030 participants. ²²



- In 2013, North Dakota distributed \$92,256,930 in child support funds, a 3.0% increase from 2012.²³
- In 2013 in North Dakota, 31,000 children lived in households with a high housing burden, where more than 30% of
 monthly income is spent on housing costs.²⁴

CHILD CARE AND HEAD START

- In 2013, North Dakota had a monthly average of 2,200 children served by subsidized child care; 2,300 children received subsidized child care in 2012 and 3,700 in 2011.²⁵
- In 2014, to be eligible for subsidized child care in North Dakota, a family of three could make no more than \$58,980, which is equivalent to 85% of the state's median income. ²⁶
- In 2013, Head Start served 2,318 North Dakota children, a 7.2% decrease from 2012.²⁷

HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE

- In 2014, 35,900 children younger than 19 were enrolled in Medicaid in North Dakota—79% of the total number of enrollees in the state. ²⁸
- In 2012, North Dakota had 7,792 children enrolled in its State Children's Health Insurance Program, a 9.5% increase from 2011, when 7.115 children were enrolled.²⁹
- In 2013, North Dakota had 12,725 uninsured children.³⁰
- In 2012, 625 babies were born weighing less than 2,500 grams in North Dakota.
- In 2011, 61 infants under age 1 died in North Dakota. 32
- In 2012, the birth rate for teens 15–17 in North Dakota was 12 births per 1,000 girls; for teens 18–19, the rate was 43. This reflects a total rate of 26 births per 1,000 girls ages 15–19.³³
- Cumulative through 2013, 198 adults and adolescents, as well as 2 children younger than 13, were reported as having HIV/AIDS in North Dakota.³⁴
- In 2013, an estimated 3,000 children ages 12–17 and 42,000 adults age 18 and older were dependent on or abusing illicit drugs or alcohol in North Dakota.³⁵

VULNERABLE YOUTH

- In 2011, 67 children aged out of out-of-home care—exited foster care to emancipation—in North Dakota.
- In 2013, 2,000 North Dakota teens ages 16–19 were not enrolled in school and were not working.³⁷
- In 2013, 7,000 young adults ages 18–24 were not enrolled in school, were not working, and had no degree beyond high school.³⁸
- In 2013, approximately 1,000 children ages 12–17 in North Dakota needed but had not received treatment for illicit drug use in the past year.³⁹
- In 2013, approximately 2,000 children ages 12–17 needed but had not received treatment for alcohol use in the past year.⁴⁰
- In 2013, 12 North Dakota children younger than 20 committed suicide, a rate of 6.46 per 100,000 children. 41

JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION

- In 2013, less than 10 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in North Dakota, similar to less than 10 in 2012. 42
- In 2013, 4,003 children younger than 18 were arrested in North Dakota, a 15% decrease from 4,730 arrests in 2012. Of the arrests in 2013, 38 were for violent crimes.⁴³



In 2013, 156 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in North Dakota.

CHILD WELFARE WORKFORCE⁴⁵

- A 2003 General Accounting Office (GAO) report documented that staff shortages, high caseloads, high worker turnover
 and low salaries impinge on delivering services to achieve safety, permanence, and well being for children. In Children's
 Rights 2009, A Long Road Home report, similar challenges to the child welfare caseworkers were identified, in addition
 to no standard training or consistent background requirements, need for meaningful supervision, and lack of private
 workspace, technology and other resources.⁴⁶
- The federal Child and Family Service Reviews have clearly demonstrated that the more time a caseworker spends with a child and family, the better the outcomes for those children and families.⁴⁷
- According to the 2003 GAO report, the average caseload for child welfare/foster care caseworkers is 24–31 children; these high caseloads contribute to high worker turnover and insufficient services being provided to children and families. CWLA recommends that foster care caseworkers have caseloads of 12–15 children.
- The National Association of Social Workers 2012 Document to the Obama Administration called for full funding of the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) and Promoting Safe and Stable Families (PSSF), protection of the Social Security Block Grant (SSBG) from budget cuts and elimination, a variety of child maltreatment prevention services to be available through programs serving children and families (e.g., TANF, Head Start, etc.), maximization of collaboration amongst different systems (e.g., Child Welfare, Public Health, Juvenile Justice, etc.) to improve integration, culturally and linguistically appropriate delivery of services, identification and implementation of evidence-based practices, and incentivization of BSW and MSW students to join the child welfare workforce.

FUNDING CHILD WELFARE SERVICES FOR NORTH DAKOTA'S CHILDREN

- In 2012, North Dakota spent \$62,917,595 for child welfare services. Child welfare services are all direct and administrative services the state agency provides to children and families. Of this amount, \$37,713,310 was from federal funds, \$15,328,817 from state funds, and \$9,875,468 from local funds.⁵⁰
- In 2012, of the \$37,713,310 in federal funds received for child welfare, 42.8% was from Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance, 2.1% came from Title IV-B Child Welfare Services and Promoting Safe and Stable Families, 5.0% was from Medicaid, 0.0% came from Social Services Block Grant, 42.3% was from TANF, and 7.9% came from other federal sources.⁵¹
- North Dakota received \$10,607,377 in federal funds for IV-E foster care expenditures in 2012, including \$4,823,276 for maintenance payments and \$5,784,101 for administration, child placement, the statewide automated child welfare information system, and training.⁵²

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⁴⁵ Note: The dearth in current state-by-state workforce data makes clear the need for critical data on compensation, working conditions including safety issues, academic degrees held, education and training received, and factors contributing to turnover. To address this, CWLA is calling for Congress to authorize the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) to conduct an updated study on the child welfare workforce. It would make recommendations regarding caseloads and workloads, education levels, and training requirements. In addition, the study would examine data reporting and collection and make recommendations on how states might improve these efforts.
