# PENNSYLVANIA'S CHILDREN 2015

## Pennsylvania's Children At a Glance<sup>1</sup>

## CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

- In 2013, 3,260 children were victims of abuse or neglect in Pennsylvania, a rate of 1.2 per 1,000 children, representing a 4.8% decrease from 2012. Of these children, 3.6% were neglected, 30.0% were physically abused, and 67.6% were sexually abused.<sup>8</sup>
- The number of child victims has decreased 16.7% in comparison to the number of victims in 2009.<sup>9</sup>
- In 2013, 34 children in Pennsylvania died as a result of abuse or neglect.<sup>10</sup>
- In 2013, 14,252 children in Pennsylvania lived apart from their families in out-of-home care, compared with 16,623 children in 2009. In 2012, 4,872 of the children living apart from their families were age 5 or younger, and 4,019 were 16 or older.<sup>11</sup>
- The number of children living apart from their families in out-of-home care has decreased 14.3% in comparison to the number of children in out-of-home care in 2009.<sup>12</sup>
- Of Pennsylvania children in out-of-home care in 2013, 49.8% were white, 29.4% black, 13.2% Hispanic, 0.1% American Indian/Alaskan Native, 0.3% Asian or Pacific Islander and 6.4% of more than one race or ethnicity.<sup>13</sup>

#### ADOPTION, KINSHIP CARE, AND PERMANENT FAMILIES FOR CHILDREN

- Of the 9,009 children exiting out-of-home care in Pennsylvania in 2012, 53% were reunited with their parents or other family members.<sup>14</sup>
- In 2013, 1,878 children were legally adopted through the public child welfare agency in Pennsylvania, a 0.6% increase from 1,866 in 2012.<sup>15</sup>
- Of the 14,252 children in out-of-home care in 2013, 1,908 or 13.4% were waiting to be adopted.<sup>16</sup>
- In 2013, approximately 97,295 Pennsylvania grandparents had primary responsibility caring for their grandchildren.<sup>17</sup>
- Of the children in out-of-home care in 2012, 3,559 were living with relatives while in care.<sup>18</sup>

#### CHILD POVERTY AND INCOME SUPPORT

- The total number of individuals receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) in Pennsylvania decreased from 60,604 in 2013 to 56,135 in 2014, a decrease of 7.4%. The number of families receiving TANF in 2014 was 23,424, a 6.2% decrease from 2013.<sup>19</sup>
- From 2012-2013, for every 100 Pennsylvania families living in poverty, only 31 received TANF benefits.<sup>20</sup>
- In 2013, \$869,972,796 was spent in Pennsylvania on TANF assistance, including 31% on basic assistance, 0% on child care, 1% on transportation, and 68% on nonassistance.<sup>21</sup>
- In 2013, \$133,743,540 was spent on WIC (the Special Supplement Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children) in Pennsylvania, serving 251,667 participants.<sup>22</sup>
- In 2013, Pennsylvania distributed \$1,300,546,352 in child support funds, a 1.5% decrease from 2012.<sup>23</sup>



• In 2013 in Pennsylvania, 866,000 children lived in households with a high housing burden, where more than 30% of monthly income is spent on housing costs.<sup>24</sup>

## CHILD CARE AND HEAD START

- In 2013, Pennsylvania had a monthly average of 92,800 children served by subsidized child care; 95,600 children received subsidized child care in 2012 and 99,800 in 2011.<sup>25</sup>
- In 2014, to be eligible for subsidized child care in Pennsylvania, a family of three could make no more than \$39,060, which is equivalent to 57% of the state's median income.<sup>26</sup>
- As of early 2014, Pennsylvania had 2,651 children on its waiting list for child care assistance.<sup>27</sup>
- In 2013, Head Start served 34,307 Pennsylvania children, a 7.2% decrease from 2012.<sup>28</sup>

#### HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE

- In 2014, 993,000 children younger than 19 were enrolled in Medicaid in Pennsylvania—76% of the total number of enrollees in the state.<sup>29</sup>
- In 2012, Pennsylvania had 271,642 children enrolled in its State Children's Health Insurance Program, a 0.3% decrease from 2011, when 272,492 children were enrolled.<sup>30</sup>
- In 2013, Pennsylvania had 147,303 uninsured children.<sup>31</sup>
- In 2012, 11,492 babies were born weighing less than 2,500 grams in Pennsylvania.<sup>32</sup>
- In 2011, 935 infants under age 1 died in Pennsylvania.<sup>33</sup>
- In 2012, the birth rate for teens 15–17 in Pennsylvania was 12 births per 1,000 girls; for teens 18–19, the rate was 39. This reflects a total rate of 24 births per 1,000 girls ages 15–19.<sup>34</sup>
- Cumulative through 2013, 41,157 adults and adolescents, as well as 371 children younger than 13, were reported as having HIV/AIDS in Pennsylvania.<sup>35</sup>
- In 2013, an estimated 55,000 children ages 12–17 and 643,000 adults age 18 and older were dependent on or abusing illicit drugs or alcohol in Pennsylvania.<sup>36</sup>

#### **VULNERABLE YOUTH**

- In 2011, 886 children aged out of out-of-home care—exited foster care to emancipation—in Pennsylvania.<sup>37</sup>
- In 2013, 44,000 Pennsylvania teens ages 16–19 were not enrolled in school and were not working.<sup>38</sup>
- In 2013, 178,000 young adults ages 18–24 were not enrolled in school, were not working, and had no degree beyond high school.<sup>39</sup>
- In 2013, approximately 29,000 children ages 12–17 in Pennsylvania needed but had not received treatment for illicit drug use in the past year.<sup>40</sup>
- In 2013, approximately 30,000 children ages 12–17 needed but had not received treatment for alcohol use in the past year.<sup>41</sup>
- In 2013, 87 Pennsylvania children younger than 20 committed suicide, a rate of 2.82 per 100,000 children.<sup>42</sup>

#### JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION

- In 2013, 105 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Pennsylvania, a 21.1% decrease from 133 in 2012.<sup>43</sup>
- In 2013, 61,442 children younger than 18 were arrested in Pennsylvania, a 8% decrease from 61,442 arrests in 2012. Of the arrests in 2013, 3,414 were for violent crimes.<sup>44</sup>



• In 2013, 3,075 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Pennsylvania.<sup>45</sup>

## CHILD WELFARE WORKFORCE<sup>46</sup>

- A 2003 General Accounting Office (GAO) report documented that staff shortages, high caseloads, high worker turnover and low salaries impinge on delivering services to achieve safety, permanence, and well being for children. In Children's Rights 2009, A Long Road Home report, similar challenges to the child welfare caseworkers were identified, in addition to no standard training or consistent background requirements, need for meaningful supervision, and lack of private workspace, technology and other resources.<sup>47</sup>
- The federal Child and Family Service Reviews have clearly demonstrated that the more time a caseworker spends with a child and family, the better the outcomes for those children and families.<sup>48</sup>
- According to the 2003 GAO report, the average caseload for child welfare/foster care caseworkers is 24–31 children; these high caseloads contribute to high worker turnover and insufficient services being provided to children and families. CWLA recommends that foster care caseworkers have caseloads of 12–15 children.<sup>49</sup>
- The National Association of Social Workers 2012 Document to the Obama Administration called for full funding of the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) and Promoting Safe and Stable Families (PSSF), protection of the Social Security Block Grant (SSBG) from budget cuts and elimination, a variety of child maltreatment prevention services to be available through programs serving children and families (e.g., TANF, Head Start, etc.), maximization of collaboration amongst different systems (e.g., Child Welfare, Public Health, Juvenile Justice, etc.) to improve integration, culturally and linguistically appropriate delivery of services, identification and implementation of evidence-based practices, and incentivization of BSW and MSW students to join the child welfare workforce.<sup>50</sup>

#### FUNDING CHILD WELFARE SERVICES FOR PENNSYLVANIA'S CHILDREN

- In 2012, Pennsylvania spent \$1,702,034,451 for child welfare services. Child welfare services are all direct and administrative services the state agency provides to children and families. Of this amount, \$421,343,242 was from federal funds, \$917,150,308 from state funds, and \$363,540,901 from local funds.<sup>51</sup>
- In 2012, of the \$421,343,242 in federal funds received for child welfare, 71.6% was from Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance, 5.0% came from Title IV-B Child Welfare Services and Promoting Safe and Stable Families, 0.3% was from Medicaid, 2.9% came from Social Services Block Grant, 13.9% was from TANF, and 6.4% came from other federal sources.<sup>52</sup>
- Pennsylvania received \$191,888,410 in federal funds for IV-E foster care expenditures in 2012, including \$70,395,229 for maintenance payments and \$121,493,181 for administration, child placement, the statewide automated child welfare information system, and training.<sup>53</sup>

To address this, CWLA is calling for Congress to authorize the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) to conduct an updated study on the child welfare workforce. It would make recommendations regarding caseloads and workloads, education levels, and training requirements. In addition, the study would examine data reporting and collection and make recommendations on how states might improve these efforts.
