# VIRGINIA'S CHILDREN 2015

### Virginia's Children At a Glance<sup>1</sup>

### CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

- In 2013, Virginia had 70,079 total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 32,384 reports were referred for investigation.<sup>8</sup>
- In 2013, 5,863 children were victims of abuse or neglect in Virginia, a rate of 3.1 per 1,000 children, representing a 0.6% increase from 2012. Of these children, 65.6% were neglected, 27.9% were physically abused, and 15.4% were sexually abused.<sup>9</sup>
- The number of child victims has decreased 1.5% in comparison to the number of victims in 2009.<sup>10</sup>
- Virginia responds to lower risk, higher safety reports through alternative response services to address family issues. 36,410 reports were responded to in this way in 2013.<sup>11</sup>
- In 2013, 33 children in Virginia died as a result of abuse or neglect.<sup>12</sup>
- In 2013, 4,327 children in Virginia lived apart from their families in out-of-home care, compared with 5,968 children in 2009. In 2012, 1,337 of the children living apart from their families were age 5 or younger, and 1,037 were 16 or older.<sup>13</sup>
- The number of children living apart from their families in out-of-home care has decreased 27.5% in comparison to the number of children in out-of-home care in 2009.<sup>14</sup>
- Of Virginia children in out-of-home care in 2013, 59.8% were white, 21.9% black, 9.9% Hispanic, 0.0% American Indian/Alaskan Native, 0.3% Asian or Pacific Islander and 7.9% of more than one race or ethnicity.<sup>15</sup>

#### ADOPTION, KINSHIP CARE, AND PERMANENT FAMILIES FOR CHILDREN

- Of the 2,928 children exiting out-of-home care in Virginia in 2012, 29% were reunited with their parents or other family members.<sup>16</sup>
- In 2013, 709 children were legally adopted through the public child welfare agency in Virginia, a 11.0% increase from 639 in 2012.<sup>17</sup>
- Of the 4,327 children in out-of-home care in 2013, 1,503 or 34.7% were waiting to be adopted.<sup>18</sup>
- In 2013, approximately 66,760 Virginia grandparents had primary responsibility caring for their grandchildren.<sup>19</sup>
- Of the children in out-of-home care in 2012, 293 were living with relatives while in care.<sup>20</sup>

#### **CHILD POVERTY AND INCOME SUPPORT**

- The total number of individuals receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) in Virginia decreased from 10,119 in 2013 to 9,932 in 2014, a decrease of 1.9%. The number of families receiving TANF in 2014 was 4,099, a 1.9% decrease from 2013.<sup>21</sup>
- From 2012-2013, for every 100 Virginia families living in poverty, only 28 received TANF benefits.<sup>22</sup>
- In 2013, \$257,740,669 was spent in Virginia on TANF assistance, including 39% on basic assistance, 0% on child care, 0% on transportation, and 61% on nonassistance.<sup>23</sup>



- In 2013, \$58,403,793 was spent on WIC (the Special Supplement Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children) in Virginia, serving 154,287 participants.<sup>24</sup>
- In 2013, Virginia distributed \$606,514,260 in child support funds, a 0.0% increase from 2012.<sup>25</sup>
- In 2013 in Virginia, 639,000 children lived in households with a high housing burden, where more than 30% of monthly income is spent on housing costs.<sup>26</sup>

#### CHILD CARE AND HEAD START

- In 2013, Virginia had a monthly average of 25,000 children served by subsidized child care; 21,200 children received subsidized child care in 2012 and 23,300 in 2011.<sup>27</sup>
- In 2014, to be eligible for subsidized child care in Virginia, a family of three could make no more than \$29,295-\$48,828, which is equivalent to 39-65% of the state's median income.<sup>28</sup>
- As of early 2014, Virginia had 7,786 children on its waiting list for child care assistance.<sup>29</sup>
- In 2013, Head Start served 13,761 Virginia children, a 4.8% decrease from 2012.<sup>30</sup>

#### HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE

- In 2014, 468,200 children younger than 19 were enrolled in Medicaid in Virginia—81% of the total number of enrollees in the state.<sup>31</sup>
- In 2012, Virginia had 189,961 children enrolled in its State Children's Health Insurance Program, a 4.3% increase from 2011, when 182,128 children were enrolled.<sup>32</sup>
- In 2013, Virginia had 101,251 uninsured children.<sup>33</sup>
- In 2012, 8,375 babies were born weighing less than 2,500 grams in Virginia.<sup>34</sup>
- In 2011, 699 infants under age 1 died in Virginia.<sup>35</sup>
- In 2012, the birth rate for teens 15–17 in Virginia was 10 births per 1,000 girls; for teens 18–19, the rate was 40. This reflects a total rate of 23 births per 1,000 girls ages 15–19.<sup>36</sup>
- Cumulative through 2013, 21,356 adults and adolescents, as well as 185 children younger than 13, were reported as having HIV/AIDS in Virginia.<sup>37</sup>
- In 2013, an estimated 35,000 children ages 12–17 and 442,000 adults age 18 and older were dependent on or abusing illicit drugs or alcohol in Virginia.<sup>38</sup>

#### **VULNERABLE YOUTH**

- In 2011, 691 children aged out of out-of-home care—exited foster care to emancipation—in Virginia.<sup>39</sup>
- In 2013, 33,000 Virginia teens ages 16–19 were not enrolled in school and were not working.<sup>40</sup>
- In 2013, 113,000 young adults ages 18–24 were not enrolled in school, were not working, and had no degree beyond high school.<sup>41</sup>
- In 2013, approximately 20,000 children ages 12–17 in Virginia needed but had not received treatment for illicit drug use in the past year.<sup>42</sup>
- In 2013, approximately 19,000 children ages 12–17 needed but had not received treatment for alcohol use in the past year.<sup>43</sup>
- In 2013, 48 Virginia children younger than 20 committed suicide, a rate of 2.29 per 100,000 children.<sup>44</sup>



#### JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION

- In 2013, 42 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Virginia, a 31.1% decrease from 61 in 2012.<sup>45</sup>
- In 2013, 21,995 children younger than 18 were arrested in Virginia, a 13% decrease from 25,330 arrests in 2012. Of the arrests in 2013, 604 were for violent crimes.<sup>46</sup>
- In 2013, 1,686 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Virginia.<sup>47</sup>

## CHILD WELFARE WORKFORCE<sup>48</sup>

- A 2003 General Accounting Office (GAO) report documented that staff shortages, high caseloads, high worker turnover and low salaries impinge on delivering services to achieve safety, permanence, and well being for children. In Children's Rights 2009, A Long Road Home report, similar challenges to the child welfare caseworkers were identified, in addition to no standard training or consistent background requirements, need for meaningful supervision, and lack of private workspace, technology and other resources.<sup>49</sup>
- The federal Child and Family Service Reviews have clearly demonstrated that the more time a caseworker spends with a child and family, the better the outcomes for those children and families.<sup>50</sup>
- According to the 2003 GAO report, the average caseload for child welfare/foster care caseworkers is 24–31 children; these high caseloads contribute to high worker turnover and insufficient services being provided to children and families. CWLA recommends that foster care caseworkers have caseloads of 12–15 children.<sup>51</sup>
- The National Association of Social Workers 2012 Document to the Obama Administration called for full funding of the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) and Promoting Safe and Stable Families (PSSF), protection of the Social Security Block Grant (SSBG) from budget cuts and elimination, a variety of child maltreatment prevention services to be available through programs serving children and families (e.g., TANF, Head Start, etc.), maximization of collaboration amongst different systems (e.g., Child Welfare, Public Health, Juvenile Justice, etc.) to improve integration, culturally and linguistically appropriate delivery of services, identification and implementation of evidence-based practices, and incentivization of BSW and MSW students to join the child welfare workforce.<sup>52</sup>

#### FUNDING CHILD WELFARE SERVICES FOR VIRGINIA'S CHILDREN

- In 2012, Virginia spent \$680,665,410 for child welfare services. Child welfare services are all direct and administrative services the state agency provides to children and families. Of this amount, \$186,256,192 was from federal funds, \$301,150,896 from state funds, and \$193,258,322 from local funds.<sup>53</sup>
- In 2012, of the \$186,256,192 in federal funds received for child welfare, 48.2% was from Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance, 6.0% came from Title IV-B Child Welfare Services and Promoting Safe and Stable Families, 18.3% was from Medicaid, 8.0% came from Social Services Block Grant, 17.5% was from TANF, and 2.0% came from other federal sources.<sup>54</sup>
- Virginia received \$54,113,877 in federal funds for IV-E foster care expenditures in 2012, including \$24,809,575 for maintenance payments and \$29,304,302 for administration, child placement, the statewide automated child welfare information system, and training.<sup>55</sup>

<sup>48</sup> Note: The dearth in current state-by-state workforce data makes clear the need for critical data on compensation, working conditions including safety issues, academic degrees held, education and training received, and factors contributing to turnover. To address this, CWLA is calling for Congress to authorize the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) to conduct an updated study on the child welfare workforce. It would make recommendations regarding caseloads and workloads, education levels, and training requirements. In addition, the study would examine data reporting and collection and make recommendations on how states might improve these efforts.
