

Child Welfare Resources in the ARRA by State

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (P.L. 111-5) includes substantial federal resources to support child welfare systems and interventions. Under the law, Title IV-E Foster Care, Adoption Assistance and the new kinship guardianship option will receive increased federal reimbursement through the end of 2010. In addition, Medicaid is increased considerably under the ARRA and continues to be a major funding source for supporting the wellbeing of children and youth in foster care. Also, a new flexible block grant is included in the ARRA and can contribute considerable resources to the child welfare system.

The following charts list state by state breakouts of Title IV-E and Medicaid increases, as well as state by state funding under the new block grant. The charts are intended as a tool for CWLA members to understand the current sources of child welfare funding in your specific state and to compare how the ARRA may affect your current child welfare funding sources.

It should be noted that the funds listed under the ARRA are only projections, including funds calculated by CWLA and other organizations. They are not final and in some instances are entitlement sources of funds which will yield federal funding based on what your state actually allocates and spends in these areas.

THE FIRST COLUMN - CHILD WELFARE SPENDING

The first column of numbers is based on a survey released by Child Trends, http://www.childtrends.org/Files//Child_Trends-2009_02_17_FR_CWFinancePaper.pdf. This survey is a follow up on earlier research conducted by the Urban Institute. The survey is based on state fiscal year 2006, and details how much each state spent on the range of child welfare services in that state's fiscal year. As part of this survey, each state indicated which federal funding was used to pay for child welfare services. The sources of federal funds include Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance, the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Block Grant, the Social Services Block Grant (SSBG), Title IV-B (Child Welfare Services and Promoting Safe and Stable Families) and Medicaid. The Medicaid funding does not include coverage of basic doctor and hospital services but rather services directly related to child welfare such as targeted case management (TCM) and rehabilitative services.

The first number in the first column is the total of your state's child welfare spending in SFY 2006. The second number is the total amount of federal child welfare funds your state spent in SFY 2006. Below these two totals is a breakout of federal spending by program. The Title IV-E funds are broken down to include Foster Care Maintenance Payments and Adoption Assistance Payments. You will see an overall total for your state's Title IV-E spending and then below that, a subtotal for the maintenance payments and adoption assistance payments only. This excludes administrative costs, which are included in the total. This was done because the ARRA's increased federal match for Title IV-E applies only to the maintenance payments and the adoption assistance payments. The increased match does *not* apply to Title IV-E administrative costs.

Below the Title IV-E totals is the total amount of TANF funding your state spent on child welfare. These are funds your state reported to Child Trends as having been spent from the TANF block grant on child welfare services.

Below TANF is the SSBG total. These are SSBG funds your state reported to Child Trends as having been spent on child welfare services.

Below SSBG is Medicaid. These Medicaid funds refer, for the most part, to services such as targeted case management, therapeutic and rehabilitative services. This does not include the cost of doctor's visits and services or hospitalization for children in child welfare.

The final category of funding is "other," which is an amount that includes Child Abuse Prevention Treatment Act (CAPTA), Supplemental Security Income (SSI), child care, housing and other sources of federal funds that were too small to be categorized.

THE SECOND COLUMN - ARRA

The ARRA provided states with a temporary increase in federal matching funds for Title IV-E; \$5 billion (\$2.5 billion a year) in TANF funds conditioned on states qualifying under different formulas; a state stabilization fund which can be spent on education and school construction but *can* also be spent on other government services; and Medicaid, which is the single largest source of state fiscal relief included in the ARRA.

The Title IV-E total is based on a CWLA projection. It applies *only* to foster care maintenance and adoption assistance payments, not administrative costs. We used the recently released public instruction (ACYF-CB-PI-09-03) which indicated what the first two quarters of increased reimbursements would be for state programs. The IV-E total spans a 27 month period: October 1, 2008 through December 31, 2010.

There is no funding in the ARRA for Title IV-B, although other sources of funding may assist in these areas. Each state will be eligible for a share of the \$2.5 billion per year in TANF funds if they qualify through increased caseloads, increased spending on non-recurrent emergency needs, or subsidized employment programs. To draw the funds, states are required to provide a 20% state match (one state dollar draws four federal TANF dollars).

The ARRA funds listed in the SSBG line are from the state stabilization funds portion of the ARRA. These funds can be used for schools including building repair but can also be used for other government services, including child welfare services. This calculation is based on information provided by the Center on Budget Policy and Priorities (CBPP) http://www.cbpp.org/1-22-09bud.htm. Finally, the Medicaid total is also based on a CBPP projection http://www.cbpp.org/1-22-09bud-fmap.pdf. The total Medicaid figure listed here is for a 27 month period: October 1, 2008 through December 31, 2010.

IMPORTANT QUALIFICATIONS:

Both the Title IV-E and Medicaid funds are projections. The final funding amounts will be based on what states actually spend from October 1, 2008 through December 31, 2010. If a state makes cutbacks in benefit levels or reduces caseloads, it could mean less funding. If states spend more (for example, through increased caseloads), the funds could be higher. It should be noted, however that there is a maintenance of effort requirement for states to receive the increased Medicaid funding. To receive the temporary increase, a state must maintain its eligibility criteria and enrollment/renewal procedures as they existed on July 1, 2008. If a state fails to meet this test, it would also result in that state being denied the Title IV-E increase. If a state has restricted eligibility but reinstates it by July 1, 2009, it will be deemed in compliance and thus eligible for its Medicaid and IV-E increase.

A final important note is that each state's child welfare spending varies widely and states rely on different sources of funding. For example, some states will spend much more in state dollars than other states. Some states will dedicate much more of their Title IV-E funding to administrative costs, while others will spend more on maintenance and assistance. In other states, a greater portion may be spent on foster care than adoption. Some states use fewer TANF or SSBG funds for child welfare, while other states may rely heavily on those block grants but will not use Medicaid. There are a variety of reasons for these variations and the method of funding is determined at the state level.
