CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

- In 2013, South Carolina had 27,606 total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 22,772 reports were referred for investigation.
- In 2013, 10,404 children were victims of abuse or neglect in South Carolina, a rate of 9.6 per 1,000 children, representing a 9.9% decrease from 2012. Of these children, 68.2% were neglected, 42.3% were physically abused, and 6.5% were sexually abused.
- The number of child victims has decreased 16.0% in comparison to the number of victims in 2009. 10
- South Carolina responds to lower risk, higher safety reports through alternative response services to address family issues. 23,701 reports were responded to in this way in 2013. 11
- In 2013, 25 children in South Carolina died as a result of abuse or neglect.
- In 2013, 3,188 children in South Carolina lived apart from their families in out-of-home care, compared with 4,978 children in 2009. In 2012, 1,067 of the children living apart from their families were age 5 or younger, and 534 were 16 or older.¹³
- The number of children living apart from their families in out-of-home care has decreased 36.0% in comparison to the number of children in out-of-home care in 2009. 14
- Of South Carolina children in out-of-home care in 2013, 46.2% were white, 38.1% black, 6.5% Hispanic, 0.0% American Indian/Alaskan Native, 0.0% Asian or Pacific Islander and 8.9% of more than one race or ethnicity.

ADOPTION, KINSHIP CARE, AND PERMANENT FAMILIES FOR CHILDREN

- Of the 3,409 children exiting out-of-home care in South Carolina in 2012, 43% were reunited with their parents or other family members. ¹⁶
- In 2013, 506 children were legally adopted through the public child welfare agency in South Carolina, a 34.8% decrease from 776 in 2012.¹⁷
- Of the 3,188 children in out-of-home care in 2013, 1,226 or 38.5% were waiting to be adopted.
- In 2013, approximately 67,886 South Carolina grandparents had primary responsibility caring for their grandchildren.
- Of the children in out-of-home care in 2012, 208 were living with relatives while in care. ²⁰

CHILD POVERTY AND INCOME SUPPORT

- The total number of individuals receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) in South Carolina decreased from 35,701 in 2013 to 33,703 in 2014, a decrease of 5.6%. The number of families receiving TANF in 2014 was 12,207, a 6.3% decrease from 2013. 21
- From 2012-2013, for every 100 South Carolina families living in poverty, only 14 received TANF benefits.²²
- In 2013, \$230,226,507 was spent in South Carolina on TANF assistance, including 15% on basic assistance, 0% on child



care, 1% on transportation, and 84% on nonassistance.²³

- In 2013, \$68,999,854 was spent on WIC (the Special Supplement Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children) in South Carolina, serving 124,562 participants.²⁴
- In 2013, South Carolina distributed \$242,271,997 in child support funds, a 5.11% decrease from 2012. 25
- In 2013 in South Carolina, 349,000 children lived in households with a high housing burden, where more than 30% of monthly income is spent on housing costs. ²⁶

CHILD CARE AND HEAD START

- In 2013, South Carolina had a monthly average of 13,800 children served by subsidized child care; 15,500 children received subsidized child care in 2012 and 18,000 in 2011.²⁷
- In 2014, to be eligible for subsidized child care in South Carolina, a family of three could make no more than \$29,295, which is equivalent to 55% of the state's median income. ²⁸
- In 2013, Head Start served 12,866 South Carolina children, a 2.7% decrease from 2012.²⁹

HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE

- In 2014, 429,500 children younger than 19 were enrolled in Medicaid in South Carolina—79% of the total number of enrollees in the state. ³⁰
- In 2012, South Carolina had 75,281 children enrolled in its State Children's Health Insurance Program, a 4.4% increase from 2011, when 72,084 children were enrolled.³¹
- In 2013, South Carolina had 72,595 uninsured children. 32
- In 2012, 5,456 babies were born weighing less than 2,500 grams in South Carolina.³³
- In 2011, 426 infants under age 1 died in South Carolina. 34
- In 2012, the birth rate for teens 15–17 in South Carolina was 17 births per 1,000 girls; for teens 18–19, the rate was 63. This reflects a total rate of 37 births per 1,000 girls ages 15–19. 35
- Cumulative through 2013, 17,755 adults and adolescents, as well as 117 children younger than 13, were reported as having HIV/AIDS in South Carolina.³⁶
- In 2013, an estimated 21,000 children ages 12–17 and 254,000 adults age 18 and older were dependent on or abusing illicit drugs or alcohol in South Carolina.³⁷

VULNERABLE YOUTH

- In 2011, 246 children aged out of out-of-home care—exited foster care to emancipation—in South Carolina. 38
- In 2013, 22,000 South Carolina teens ages 16–19 were not enrolled in school and were not working.³⁹
- In 2013, 83,000 young adults ages 18–24 were not enrolled in school, were not working, and had no degree beyond high school.⁴⁰
- In 2013, approximately 13,000 children ages 12–17 in South Carolina needed but had not received treatment for illicit drug use in the past year.
- In 2013, approximately 10,000 children ages 12–17 needed but had not received treatment for alcohol use in the past year.⁴²
- In 2013, 33 South Carolina children younger than 20 committed suicide, a rate of 2.72 per 100,000 children.



JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION

- In 2013, 48 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in South Carolina, a 9.1% increase from 44 in 2012.
- In 2013, 15,418 children younger than 18 were arrested in South Carolina, a 7% increase from 14,385 arrests in 2012. Of the arrests in 2013, 656 were for violent crimes. 45
- In 2013, 726 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in South Carolina.

CHILD WELFARE WORKFORCE⁴⁷

- A 2003 General Accounting Office (GAO) report documented that staff shortages, high caseloads, high worker turnover
 and low salaries impinge on delivering services to achieve safety, permanence, and well being for children. In Children's
 Rights 2009, A Long Road Home report, similar challenges to the child welfare caseworkers were identified, in addition
 to no standard training or consistent background requirements, need for meaningful supervision, and lack of private
 workspace, technology and other resources.⁴⁸
- The federal Child and Family Service Reviews have clearly demonstrated that the more time a caseworker spends with a child and family, the better the outcomes for those children and families.⁴⁹
- According to the 2003 GAO report, the average caseload for child welfare/foster care caseworkers is 24–31 children; these high caseloads contribute to high worker turnover and insufficient services being provided to children and families.
 CWLA recommends that foster care caseworkers have caseloads of 12–15 children.
- The National Association of Social Workers 2012 Document to the Obama Administration called for full funding of the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) and Promoting Safe and Stable Families (PSSF), protection of the Social Security Block Grant (SSBG) from budget cuts and elimination, a variety of child maltreatment prevention services to be available through programs serving children and families (e.g., TANF, Head Start, etc.), maximization of collaboration amongst different systems (e.g., Child Welfare, Public Health, Juvenile Justice, etc.) to improve integration, culturally and linguistically appropriate delivery of services, identification and implementation of evidence-based practices, and incentivization of BSW and MSW students to join the child welfare workforce.⁵¹

FUNDING CHILD WELFARE SERVICES FOR SOUTH CAROLINA'S CHILDREN

- In 2012, South Carolina spent \$226,109,373 for child welfare services. Child welfare services are all direct and administrative services the state agency provides to children and families. Of this amount, \$136,705,569 was from federal funds, \$83,647,730 from state funds, and \$5,756,074 from local funds. 52
- In 2012, of the \$136,705,569 in federal funds received for child welfare, 30.9% was from Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance, 7.7% came from Title IV-B Child Welfare Services and Promoting Safe and Stable Families, 26.6% was from Medicaid, 6.1% came from Social Services Block Grant, 25.7% was from TANF, and 3.0% came from other federal sources.⁵³
- South Carolina received \$26,285,496 in federal funds for IV-E foster care expenditures in 2012, including \$10,748,280 for maintenance payments and \$15,537,216 for administration, child placement, the statewide automated child welfare information system, and training.⁵⁴

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A7 Note: The dearth in current state-by-state workforce data makes clear the need for critical data on compensation, working conditions including safety issues, academic degrees held, education and training received, and factors contributing to turnover. To address this, CWLA is calling for Congress to authorize the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) to conduct an updated study on the child welfare workforce. It would make recommendations regarding caseloads and workloads, education levels, and training requirements. In addition, the study would examine data reporting and collection and make recommendations on how states might improve these efforts.
