Child Maltreatment


In 2018, Alabama had **28,748** total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **28,121** were referred for investigation.ⁱ

There were **12,158** child victims of abuse or neglect in Alabama in 2018, at a rate of **11.2** children per 1,000. This translates to an **39.8%** increase since 2013.ⁱⁱ


Of the **12,158** children, **10,043** were first time victims.^{III}

The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing 2,025 of the 12,158 cases.^{iv}

- **73%** of child maltreatment perpetrators in 2017 were parents of the child. **27%** were non-parents or had an unknown relationship.^{vi}
- **54%** of Alabama's child victims in 2017 were female while **46%** were male.^{vii}


Plans of Safe Care

- In 2018, Alabama reported 533 infants who were screened-in with prenatal substance abuse exposure.^{ix}
- Alabama reported 188 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.*

 \bullet Child fatalities increased in 2018 from **28** in 2017 to **43** in 2018. xi

• Alabama reported **1** total child victims of sex trafficking with **1** female and **0** males.^{xii}

• **8,646** victims received postresponse services while **8,456** non-victims received postresponse services as well.^{xiii}

Foster Care and Adoptions

- **9,512** total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2018.
- **5,930** were in care on the day of September 30th, 2018.
- **4,062** children entered care during the 2018 FY while **3,582** exited during the same year.
- 712 of Alabama's children were adopted while 1,346 were waiting to be adopted.xv

There was a **5.3%** increase in the number of children in care between 2017 and 2018. Adoptions from the system also increased **41.2%** from $2017.^{xvi}$


6.7% Increase since 2016 in children aging out of foster care

355 children in Alabama aged out and exited foster care in 2017. This is an increase from **331** in 2016 and represents an **6.7%** increase.^{xvii}

- Children in foster care in 2017 spent an average of 17.8 months in care. xviii
- The average length of stay in Alabama for children waiting to be adopted from foster care in **32.5** months.^{xix}
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2017 was 8.1 years old.xx
- The average age of adopted children was 5.7 years old.xxi



Where are Children in Foster Care Staying?




- Data from 2017 shows that **3,510** children in foster care within Alabama were living with non-relatives while **680** stayed with a relative.
- **1,060** children were staying in group homes while **45** children were classified as runaways.^{xxii}
- **7%** of households in Alabama in 2017 had a grandparent living with a grandchild.^{xxiii}

• The average length of time a child in care spent living with their current relative foster family was **5.5** months.^{xxiv}

Child Poverty

Alabama had **336,000** children in 2017 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing **31%** of all children.^{xxv}



24% of Alabama's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.^{xxvi}

The average number of individuals receiving TANF fell from **22,172** in 2017 to **19,008** in 2018. This represents a **14.27%** decrease.xxvii

The state spent **\$61,157,711** on WIC in 2019, serving **115,410** people. This represents a **4.3%** decrease in total participants and a **6.4%** decrease in spending. ^{xxviii}

795,760 people in Alabama were food insecure in 2017, including **243,880 children** who struggled with hunger.^{xxix}

47.6% of households receiving SNAP benefits in Alabama in 2017 had children.xxx



Health


Alabama had 6.038 low birth-weight babies born in 2017 which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to **10.3%** of infants born in Alabama in 2017.xxxi

Alabama had a total of 7024 preterm births in 2018, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. 10.8% of all white babies were born premature while 16.5% of black babies arrived prematurely in 2018. The total premature birth rate was 12.4%.xxxii


There were 4.241 births to mothers aged 15-19 in Alabama in 2017, representing a rate of 27 in every 1,000 teen girls. xxxiii

434 infants under 1 died in Alabama in 2017, representing an infant mortality rate of 7.4 per 1,000. xxxiv

Public Health Insurance Coverage

 4% of Alabama's children had no health insurance in 2018. This represents **41,000** children. Alabama is not a Medicaid expansion state.xxxvi

 538.567 children in Alabama were enrolled in Medicaid in 2018. This represents 10% decrease from 2017. ×××vii

 222.072 children in Alabama were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2018. This represents an 1% increase from 2017. xxxviii

Juvenile Justice System

- There were **3,578** total arrests for children under 18 in Alabama in 2018.
- **250** of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- 959 arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- **130** were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.^{xxxix}


• **804** children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Alabama in 2017. This is a decrease from **849** kids in 2015, representing a **5.3%** decline.^{xi}

Teens & Youth

- 24,000 (9%) of Alabama's youth were both not in school and not working in 2017.^{xli}
- In 2017, there were 16 reports of children in Alabama aged 10-14 committing suicide, and 22 reports of suicide among children aged 15-19.^{xlii}
- 84 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Alabama in 2017.xliii

Child Welfare Services Funding

- Alabama spent **\$67,172,306** on child welfare services in 2016. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.
- \$67,172,306 were allocated from the federal government and \$0 came from state and local funds.^{xliv}



Federal Funding Sources

 The breakdown of the \$67,172,306 in federal funding received in Alabama in 2016: xiv

- \$10,591,739 as part of the Title IV-E Foster Care Program.
- **\$9,870,781** as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.^{xlvi}
- Alabama's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2017 was \$26,436,817.xivii
