Child Maltreatment

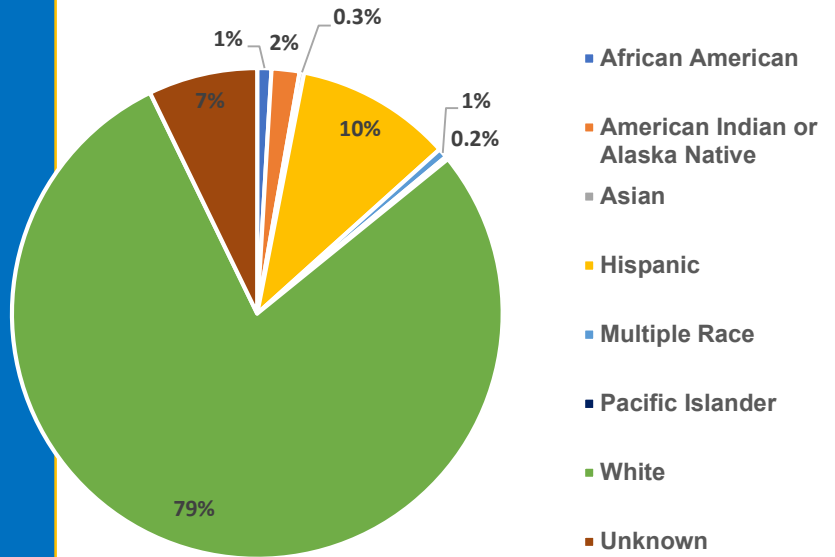
In 2018, Idaho had **22,430** total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **9,864** were referred for investigation.ⁱ

There were **1,919** child victims of abuse or neglect in Idaho in 2018, at a rate of **4.3** children per 1,000. This translates to an **20.3%** increase since 2014.ⁱⁱ

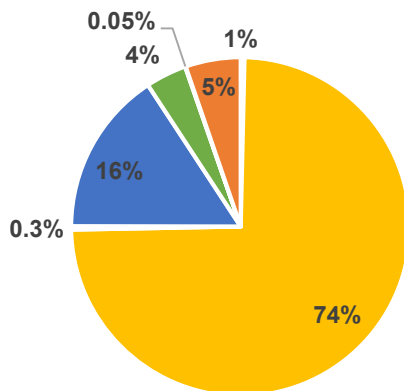
Of the **1,919** children, **1,618** were first time victims.ⁱⁱⁱ

The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing **478** of the **1,919** cases.^{iv}

• **92%** of child maltreatment perpetrators in 2017 were parents of the child. **8%** were non-parents or had an unknown relationship.^{vi}

• **50%** of Idaho's child victims in 2017 were female and **50%** were male.^{vii}

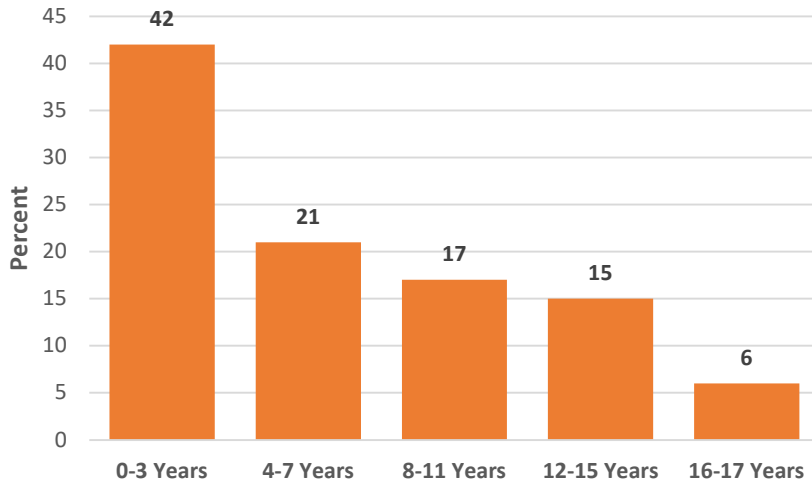
Plans of Safe Care

- In 2018, Idaho reported 1 infant who was screened-in with prenatal substance exposure.^{ix}
- Idaho reported no plans of safe care for screened-in infants.^x

- Child fatalities decreased in 2018 from **10** in 2017 to **3** in 2018.^{xi}

- Idaho reported **1** total child victim of sex trafficking with **1** female victim.^{xii}

- **1,368** victims received postresponse services while **3,587** non-victims received postresponse services as well.^{xiii}

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Foster Care and Adoptions

- **2,956** total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2018.
- **1,814** were in care on the day of September 30th, 2018.
- **1,419** children entered care during the 2018 FY while **1,143** exited during the same year.
- **532** of Idaho's children were adopted while **245** were waiting to be adopted.^{xv}

There was a **13.9%** increase in the number of children in care between 2017 and 2018. Adoptions from the system also decreased **5%** from 2017.^{xvi}

64 children in Idaho aged out and exited foster care in 2017. This is an increase from **51** in 2016 and represents a **25.5%** increase.^{xvii}

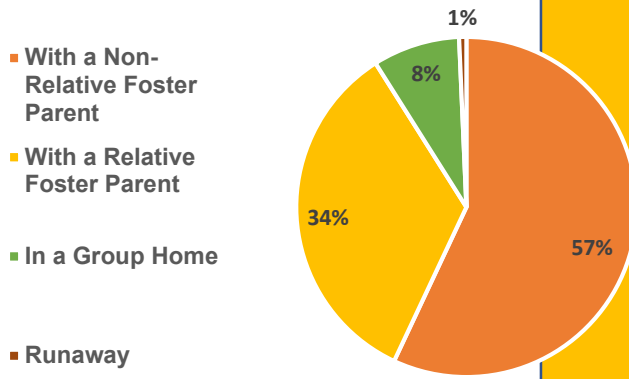
- Children in foster care in 2017 spent an average of **13.1** months in care.^{xviii}
- The average length of stay in Idaho for children waiting to be adopted from foster care in **28.2** months.^{xix}
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2017 was **8.3** years old.^{xx}
- The average age of adopted children was **6** years old.^{xxi}

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Where are Children in Foster Care Staying?

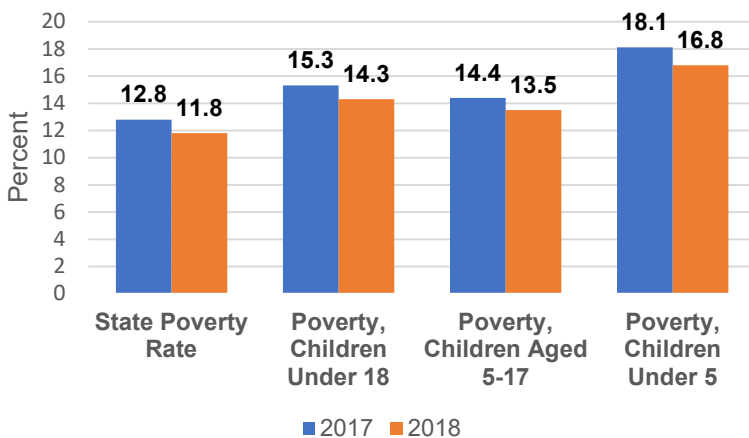


- Data from 2017 shows that **844** children in foster care within Idaho were living with non-relatives while **504** stayed
- **123** children were staying in group homes while **10** children were classified as runaways.^{xxii}
- **3%** of households in Idaho in 2017 had a grandparent living with a grandchild.^{xxiii}
- The average length of time a child in care spent living with their current relative foster family was **7.5** months.^{xxiv}

Child Poverty

Idaho had **105,000** children in 2017 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing **24%** of all children.^{xxv}

Child Poverty Over Time



24% of Idaho's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.^{xxvi}

The average number of individuals receiving TANF rose from **2,800** in 2017 to **2,941** in 2018. This represents a **5.0%** increase.^{xxvii}

The state spent **\$12,196,305** on WIC in 2019, serving **31,000** people. This represents an **8%** decrease in total participants and an **8.5%** decrease in spending.^{xxviii}

210,420 people in Idaho were food insecure in 2017, including **69,920 children** who struggled with hunger.^{xxix}

49.5% of households in Idaho with children received SNAP benefits in 2017.^{xxx}



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Health

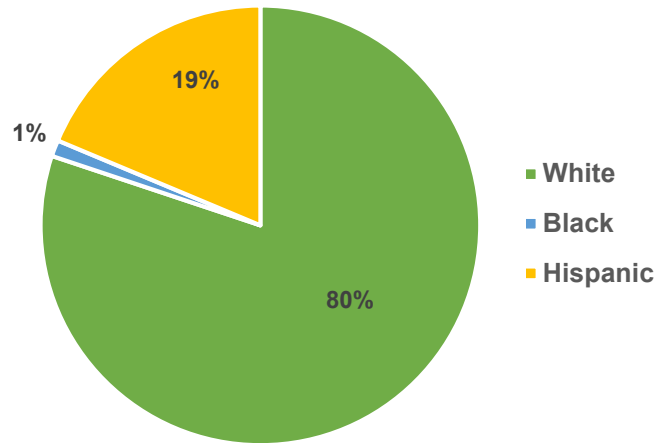
Idaho had **1,545** low birth-weight babies born in 2017 which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to **7%** of infants born in Idaho in 2017. ^{xxxv}

Idaho had a total of **1,933** preterm births in 2018, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. **8.8%** of all white babies were born premature while **9.4%** of black babies arrived prematurely in 2018. The total premature birth rate was **9%**. ^{xxxvii}

There were **1,106** births to mothers aged 15-19 in Idaho in 2017, representing a rate of **19** in every 1,000 teen girls. ^{xxxviii}

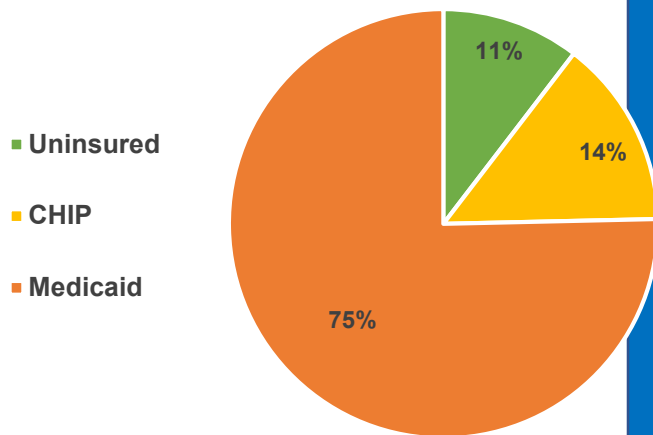
102 infants under 1 died in Idaho in 2017, representing an infant mortality rate of **4.6** per 1,000. ^{xxxix}

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Public Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2018



- **6.1%** of Idaho's children had no health insurance in 2018. This represents **29,000** children. Idaho is a Medicaid expansion state. ^{xxxvi}
- **209,767** enrolled in Medicaid in 2018. This represents a **2.1%** decrease from 2017. ^{xxxvii}
- **39,657** children in Idaho were in the state Chip Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2018. This represents an **8.2%** increase from 2017. ^{xxxviii}

Juvenile Justice System

- There were **5,993** total arrests for children under 18 in Idaho in 2018.
- **188** of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- **978** arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- **928** were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.^{xxxix}
- **408** children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Idaho in 2018. This is an increase from **393** kids in 2015, representing a **3.8%** increase.^{xi}

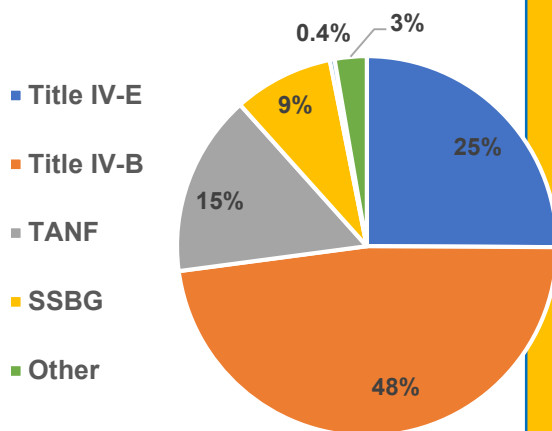
Teens & Youth

- **6,000** (6%) of Idaho's youth were both not in school and not working in 2017.^{xii}
- In 2017, there were **0** reports of children in Idaho aged 10-14 committing suicide, and **28** reports of suicide among children aged 15-19.^{xiii}
- **25** children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Idaho in 2017.^{xliii}

Child Welfare Services Funding

- Idaho spent **\$60,694,219** on child welfare services in 2016. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.
- **\$39,286,639** were allocated from the federal government and **\$21,407,580** came from state and local funds.^{xliv}

Federal Funding Sources



- The breakdown of the **\$39,286,639** in federal funding received in Idaho in 2016:^{xlv}

- **\$3,393,043** as part of the Title IV-E Foster Care Program.
- **\$7,417,496** as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program^{xlvi}
- Idaho's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2017 was **\$8,092,472**^{xlvii}
