### **Child Maltreatment**

In 2018, New Mexico had **39,228** total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **20,980** were referred for investigation.<sup>i</sup>

There were **8,024** child victims of abuse or neglect in New Mexico in 2018, at a rate of **16.6** children per 1,000. This translates to a **5.5%** increase since 2014.<sup>ii</sup>

Of the **8,024** children, **5,728** were first time victims.<sup>III</sup>

The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing **1,119** of the **8,024 cases.**<sup>i</sup>√

- **86%** of child maltreatment perpetrators in 2017 were parents on the child. **14%** were non-parents or had an unknown relationship.<sup>vi</sup>
- **50%** of New Mexico's child victims in 2017 were female and **50%** were male.<sup>vii</sup>

#### **Plans of Safe Care**

- In 2018, New Mexico reported 61 infants who were screened-in with prenatal substance abuse exposure.<sup>ix</sup>
- New Mexico reported no plans of safe care for screened-in infants.<sup>x</sup>

Age Distribution of Maltreatment

• Child fatalities decreased in 2018 from **16** in 2017 to **12** in 2018.<sup>xi</sup>

• New Mexico did not report the numbers for sex trafficking victims

• 3,415 victims received post-response services while 3,018 non-victims received post-response services as well.<sup>xii</sup>

### **Foster Care and Adoptions**

- **4,299** total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2018.
- **2,508** were in care on the day of September 30<sup>th</sup>, 2018.
- **1,679** children entered care during the 2018 FY while **1,793** exited during the same year.
- 297 of New Mexico's children were adopted while 1,205 were waiting to be adopted.xiv

There was a **5.6%** decrease in the number of children in care between 2017 and 2018. Adoptions from the system also decreased **4.5%** from  $2017.^{xv}$ 

21.2% Increase since 2016 in children aging out of foster care

**80** children in New Mexico aged out and exited foster care in 2017. This is an increase from **66** in 2016 and represents a **21.2%** increase.<sup>xvi</sup>

- Children in foster care in 2017 spent an average of 21.9 months in care. xvii
- The average length of stay in New Mexico for children waiting to be adopted from foster care in **31.3** months.<sup>xviii</sup>
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2017 was 7.7 years old.xix
- The average age of adopted children was 6.4 years old.xx

#### Where are Children in Foster Care Staying?



• Data from 2017 shows that **1,515** children in foster care within New Mexico were living with non-relatives while **633** stayed with a relative.

• **173** children were staying in group homes while **43** children were classified as runaways.<sup>xxi</sup>

• **5%** of households in New Mexico in 2017 had a grandparent living with a grandchild.<sup>xxii</sup>

• The average length of time a child in care spent living with their current relative foster family was **11.7** months.<sup>xxiii</sup>

### **Child Poverty**

New Mexico had **174,000** children in 2017 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing **36%** of all children.<sup>xxiv</sup>



**28%** of New Mexico's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.<sup>xxv</sup>

The average number of individuals receiving TANF fell from **29,364** in 2017 to **25,919** in 2018. This represents a **11.7%** decrease.<sup>xxvi</sup>

The state spent **\$17,426,549** on WIC in 2019, serving **40,487** people. This represents a **12.3%** decrease in total participants and a **17.8%** decrease in spending. <sup>xxvii</sup>

**324,000** people in New Mexico were food insecure in 2017, including **118,030 children** who struggled with hunger.<sup>xxviii</sup>

44.2% of households in New Mexico with children received SNAP benefits in 2017.xxix

### Health

New Mexico had 2,250 low birth-weight babies born in 2017 which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to **9.5%** of infants born in New Mexico in 2017.xxx

New Mexico had a total of 2,554 preterm births in 2018, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. 9.1% of all white babies were born premature while 13.44% of black babies arrived prematurely in 2018. The total premature birth rate was 9.8%.xxxi

There were 1,896 births to mothers aged 15-19 in New Mexico in 2017, representing a rate of 28 in every 1,000 teen girls. xxxii

140 infants under 1 died in New Mexico in 2017, representing an infant mortality rate of 5.9 per 1,000. xxxiii

### Public Health Insurance Coverage

5.3% of New Mexico's children had no health insurance in 2018. This represents 27,000 children.xxxv

409.834 children in New Mexico were enrolled in Medicaid in 2018. This represents 2.2% decrease from 2017. xxxvi

13.224 children in New Mexico were in the state Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2018. This represents a **3.5%** decrease from 2017. ×××vii

### **Juvenile Justice System**

- There were **3,203** total arrests for children under 18 in New Mexico in 2018.
- 161 of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- 478 arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- **472** were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.<sup>xxxviii</sup>

• **318** children lived in juvenile correction facilities in New Mexico in 2018. This is a decrease from **363** kids in 2015, representing a **12.4%** decline.<sup>xxxix</sup>

### **Teens & Youth**

- 12,000 (10%) of New Mexico's youth were both not in school and not working in 2017.<sup>xl</sup>
- In 2017, New Mexico did not report any suicides for children aged 10-14 committing suicide, and 41 reports of suicide among children aged 15-19.<sup>xli</sup>
- 32 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in New Mexico in 2017.xiii

### **Child Welfare Services Funding**

- New Mexico spent **\$94,166,880** on child welfare services in 2016. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.
- \$55,715,948 were allocated from the federal government and \$38,450,932 came from state and local funds.<sup>xliii</sup>



• The breakdown of the \$55,715,948 in federal funding received in New Mexico in 2016: New Mexico is a Medicaid expansion state.<sup>xliv</sup>

• \$18,909,295 as part of the Title IV-E Foster Care Program.

• **\$20,147,169** as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program

 New Mexico's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2017 was \$10,209,930 xivi
