Child Maltreatment


In 2018, Ohio had **193,824** total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **85,676** were screened in for investigation.

There were **25,158** child victims of abuse or neglect in Ohio in 2018, at a rate of **9.7** children per 1,000. This translates to a **0.9** increase since 2014.ⁱⁱ


Of the **193,824** children, **18,351** were first time victims.ⁱⁱⁱ

The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing **3,726** of the **193,824** cases.^{iv}

- **61%** of child maltreatment perpetrators in 2017 were parents of the child. **39%** were non-parents or had an unknown relationship. vi
- 53% of Ohio's child victims in 2017 were female and 47% were male.^{vii}



Plans of Safe Care

- In 2018 Ohio reported **1,997** for infants who were screened-in with prenatal substance abuse exposure.ix
- Ohio reported 1,196 screened-in infants with plans of safe care. x

- Child fatalities increased in 2018 from **73** in 2017 to **118** in 2018.^{xi}
- Ohio reported **25** sex trafficking victims in 2018 ^{xii}
- Ohio reported 18,228 victims who received postresponse services and 34,298 non-victims who received post-response services.

Foster Care and Adoptions

- 26,744 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2018.
- **15,730** were in care on the day of September 30th, 2018.
- 12,325 children entered care during the 2018 FY while 11,024 exited during the same year.
- 15,566 of Ohio's children were adopted while 3,579 were waiting to be adopted.xiv

There was a **5.1%** increase in the number of children in care between 2017 and 2018. Adoptions from the system increased **1.8%** from 2017.^{xv}


Increase since 2016 in children aging out of foster care

1,030 children in Ohio aged out and exited foster care in 2017. This is an increase from **1,027** in 2016 and represents a **0.3%** increase.xvi

- Children in foster care in 2017 spent an average of 15.9 months in care. xvii
- The average length of stay in Ohio for children waiting to be adopted from foster care is 36.5 months.xviii
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2017 was 8.9 years old.xix
- The average age of adopted children was 5.9 years old.xx




Where are Children in Foster Care Staying?



- Data from 2017 shows that **8,915** children in foster care within Ohio were living with non-relatives while **3,127** stayed with a relative.
- 2,038 children were staying in group homes while 153 children were classified as runaways.xxi
- 3% of households in Ohio in 2017 had a grandparent living with a grandchild.xxii
- The average length of time a child in care spent living with their current relative foster family was **5.9** months.*xxiii

Child Poverty

Ohio had **1,236,000** children in 2017 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing **30%** of all children.**xiv



25% of Ohio's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.xxv

The average number of individuals receiving TANF decreased from **101,392** in 2017 to **92,017** in 2018. This represents a **9.2%** decrease.xxvi

The state spent \$70,521,572 on WIC in 2019, serving 192,574 people. This represents a 7.8% decrease in total participants and a 9.1% decrease in spending. xxviii

1,691,910 people in Ohio were food insecure in 2017, including **510,030 children** who struggled with hunger.xxviii

39.4% of households in Ohio with children received SNAP benefits in 2017.xxix



Health


Ohio had **318,873** low birth-weight babies born in 2017 which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to **8.7%** of infants born in Ohio in 2017.**

Ohio had a total of **13,845** preterm births in 2018, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. **9.46%** of all white babies were born premature while **14.02%** of black babies arrived prematurely in 2018. The total premature birth rate was **10.25%.** xxxi

There were **7,788** births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2017, representing a rate of **21** in every 1,000 teen girls. **x*ii


983 infants under 1 died in Ohio in 2017, representing an infant mortality rate of **7.2** per 1,000. xxxiii

Public Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2018



- **4.8%** of Ohio's children had no health insurance in 2018. This represents **133,000** children. Ohio is a Medicaid expansion state. **xxv*
- 1,257,669 children in Ohio were enrolled in Medicaid in 2018. This represents a 3.2% decrease from 2017. xxxvi
- 260,890 children in Ohio were in the state Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2018. This represents a 4.3% increase from 2017. xxxvii

Juvenile Justice System

- There were **20,003** total arrests for children under 18 in Ohio in 2018.
- **1,722** of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- **2,995** arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- **1,655** were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.**xxviii
- **2,079** children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Ohio in 2017. This is a decrease from **2,163** kids in 2015, representing a **3.9%** decrease.xxxix


Teens & Youth

- 34,000 (5%) of Ohio's youth were both not in school and not working in 2017.xl
- In 2017, Ohio reported 25 deaths by suicide for children 10-14; There were 97 reports of suicide among children aged 15-19.xli
- 136 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Ohio in 2017.xiii

Child Welfare Services Funding

- Ohio spent \$1,299,295,490 on child welfare services in 2016. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.
- \$807,539,339 were allocated from the federal government and \$1,444,635,189 came from state and local funds.xliii
