Child Maltreatment

In 2018, Puerto Rico had **19,146** total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **8,450** were referred for investigation.¹

There were **4,381** child victims of abuse or neglect in Puerto Rico in 2018, at a rate of **7.4** children per 1,000. This translates to an **43%** decrease since 2013.[#]


Of the **4,381** children, no number was reported for first time victims.^{III}

The largest age group of victims was children between ages 5 and 9, representing **1,360** of the **4,381 cases.**^{IV}

• **73%** of child maltreatment perpetrators in 2017 were parents of the child. **27%** were non-parents or had an unknown relationship.^{vi}

• **76%** of Puerto Rico's child victims in 2017 were female while **24%** were male.^{vii}



• Child fatalities decreased in 2018 from **6** in 2017 to **3** in 2018.^{xi}

• Puerto Rico reported **1** total child victim of sex trafficking with **no** females reported and **1** male.^{xii}

• 3,891 victims received postresponse services while 4,465 non-victims received postresponse services as well.^{xiii}

Foster Care and Adoptions

- **2,354** total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2018.
- **2,231** were in care on the day of September 30th, 2018.
- **752** children entered care during the 2018 FY while **123** exited during the same year.
- **39** of Puerto Rico's children were adopted while **279** were waiting to be adopted.^{xv}

There was a **50%** decrease in the number of children in care between 2017 and 2018. Adoptions from the system also increased from **0** to **39** in 2017.^{xvi}

6.4% Decrease since 2016 in children aging out of foster care


29 children in Puerto Rico aged out and exited foster care in 2017. This is a decrease from **31** in 2016 and represents an **6.4%** decrease.^{xvii}

- The average length of stay in Puerto Rico for children waiting to be adopted from foster care in 71.2 months.^{xviii}
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2017 was 8.9 years old.xix

• Data from 2017 shows that **2,400** children in foster care within Puerto Rico were living with non-relatives while **672** stayed with a relative.


• 944 children were staying in group homes while 64 children were classified as runaways.^{xx}

• There was no number reported of households in Puerto Rico in 2017 that had a grandparent living with a grandchild.^{xxi}

• The average length of time a child in care spent living with their current relative foster family was **52.7** months.^{xxii}

Child Poverty

Puerto Rico had **339,000** children in 2017 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing **56%** of all children.^{xxiii}



29% of Puerto Rico's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.^{xxiv}

The average number of individuals receiving TANF fell from **20,293** in 2017 to **16,437** in 2018. This represents a **19.0%** decrease.^{xxv}

The state spent **\$124,798,482** on WIC in 2019, serving **106,222** people. This represents a **5.7%** decrease in total participants and a

44.7% of households receiving SNAP benefits in Puerto Rico in 2017 had children.^{xxvi} **54%** of children in Puerto Rico lived in families that received public assistance in 2018.^{xxvii}




Health

Puerto Rico had **2,556** low birth-weight babies born in 2017 which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to **10.5%** of infants born in Puerto Rico in 2017.^{xxviii}


Puerto Rico had a total of **2,549** preterm births in 2017, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. **14.3%** of all white babies were born premature while **11.84%** of Hispanic babies arrived prematurely in 2018. The total premature birth rate was **11.9%.**^{xxix}

There were **2,650** births to mothers aged 15-19 in Puerto Rico in 2017, representing a rate of **12** in every 1,000 teen girls. ^{xxx}

163 infants under 1 died in Puerto Rico in 2017, representing an infant mortality rate of **6.7** per 1,000. ^{xxxi}

• **3.0%** of Puerto Rico's children had no health insurance in 2018. This represents **19,000** children. Puerto Rico is a Medicaid expansion state.^{xxxiii}

• **378,000** children in Puerto Rico were enrolled in Medicaid or CHIP in 2018. This represents **6.8%** decrease from 2017.^{xxxiv}

• **18,000** children in Puerto Rico had both public and private coverage in 2018. This represents an **5.2%** decrease from 2017. XXXV



Teens & Youth

- **23,000** (12%) of Puerto Rico's youth (16-19 years old) were both not in school and not working in 2017.^{xxxvi}
- In 2017, **17.1%** of children in Puerto Rico grades 9th 12th seriously considered suicide.^{xxxvii}
- **72** children died between the ages of 15 and 19 either by accident, homicide or suicide in Puerto Rico in 2017.^{xxxviii}

Child Welfare Services Funding

- Puerto Rico spent **\$22,150,340** on child welfare services in 2016. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.
- **\$14,919,711** were allocated from the federal government and **\$7,230,629** came from state and local funds.^{xxxix}
