Child Maltreatment

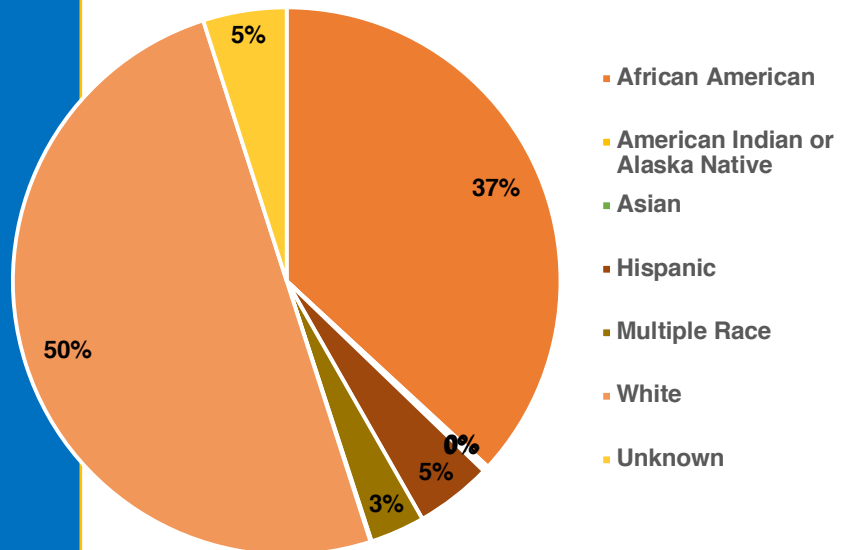
In 2018, South Carolina had **56,724** total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **45,788** were referred for investigation.ⁱ

There were **19,130** child victims of abuse or neglect in South Carolina in 2018, at a rate of **17.3** children per 1,000. This translates to a **53.8%** increase since 2014.ⁱⁱ

Of the **19,130** children, **1,080** were first time victims.ⁱⁱⁱ

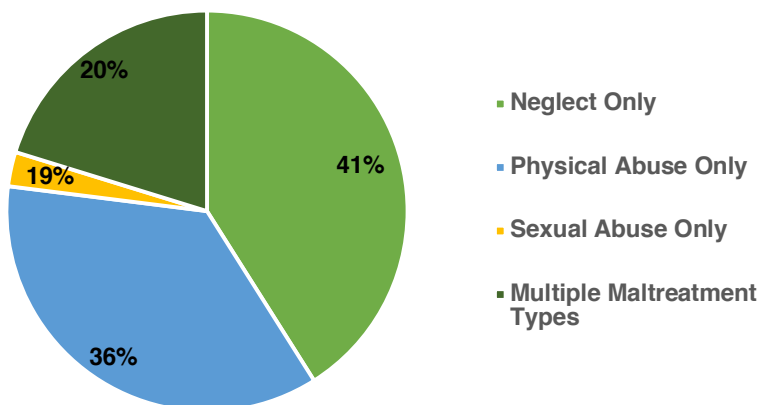
The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing **2,462** of the **19,130** cases.^{iv}

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2018



- **86%** of child maltreatment perpetrators in 2017 were parents of the child. **14%** were non-parents or had an unknown relationship.^{vi}

- **50%** of South Carolina's child victims in 2017 were female and **50%** were male.^{vii}

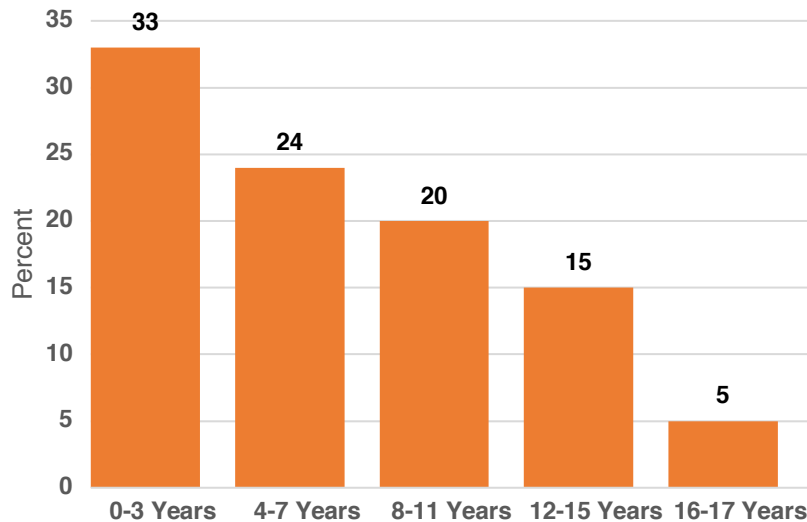
Plans of Safe Care

- In 2018, South Carolina reported **497** infants who were screened-in with prenatal substance abuse exposure.^{ix}
- South Carolina reported no plans of safe care for screened-in infants.^x

• Child fatalities increased in 2018 from **28** in 2017 to **39** in 2018.^{xi}

• South Carolina did not report the number of sex trafficking victims in 2018

• **6,698** victims received post-response services while **7,887** non-victims received post-response services as well.^{xii}

Foster Care and Adoptions

- **8,047** total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2018.
- **4,456** were in care on the day of September 30th, 2018.
- **4,098** children entered care during the 2018 FY while **3,591** exited during the same year.
- **435** of South Carolina's children were adopted while **1591** were waiting to be adopted.^{xiv}

There was a **10.3%** increase in the number of children in care between 2017 and 2018. Adoptions from the system also decreased **10.7%** from 2017.^{xv}

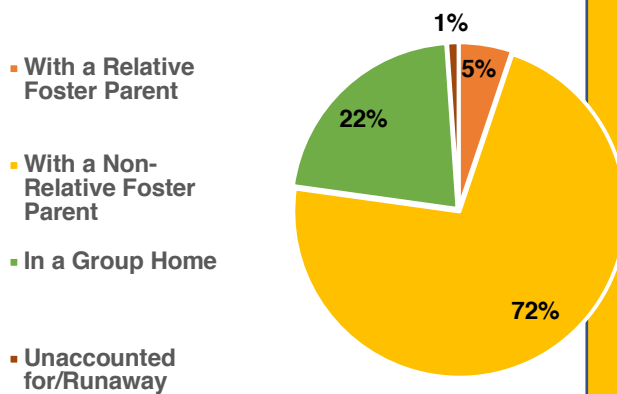
254 children in South Carolina aged out and exited foster care in 2017. This is an increase from **246** in 2016 and represents a **3.3%** increase.^{xvi}

- Children in foster care in 2017 spent an average of **18.1** months in care.^{xvii}
- The average length of stay in South Carolina for children waiting to be adopted from foster care is **32** months.^{xviii}
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2017 was **8.7** years old.^{xix}
- The average age of adopted children was **6.1** years old.^{xx}



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Where are Children in Foster Care Staying?

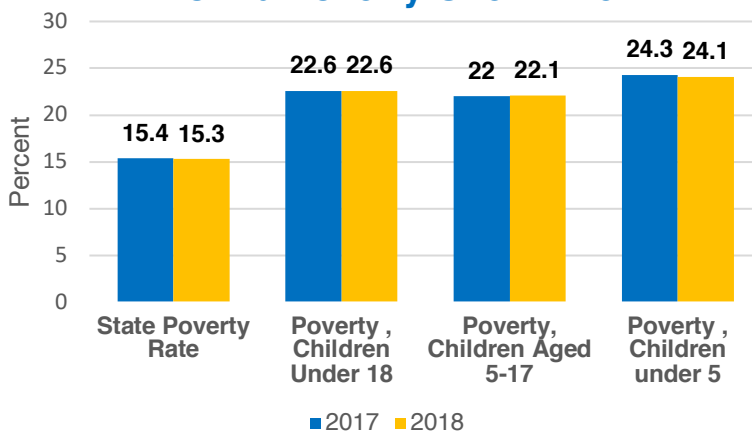


- Data from 2017 shows that **2,771** children in foster care within South Carolina were living with non-relatives while **199** stayed with a relative.
- **835** children were staying in group homes while **42** children were classified as runaways.^{xxi}
- **4%** of households in South Carolina in 2017 had a grandparent living with a grandchild.^{xxii}
- The average length of time a child in care spent living with their current relative foster family was **7.5 months**.^{xxiii}

Child Poverty

South Carolina had **331,000** children in 2017 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing **30%** of all children.^{xxiv}

Child Poverty Over Time



28% of South Carolina's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.^{xxv}

The average number of individuals receiving TANF fell from **18,764** in 2017 to **17,773** in 2018. This represents a **5.3%** decrease.^{xxvi}

The state spent **\$47,477,621** on WIC in 2019, serving **84,596** people. This represents an **8.2%** decrease in total participants and a **2.9%** decrease in spending.^{xxvii}

679,990 people in South Carolina were food insecure in 2017, including **202,110 children** who struggled with hunger.^{xxviii}

48.4% of households in South Carolina with children received SNAP benefits in 2017.^{xxix}



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Health

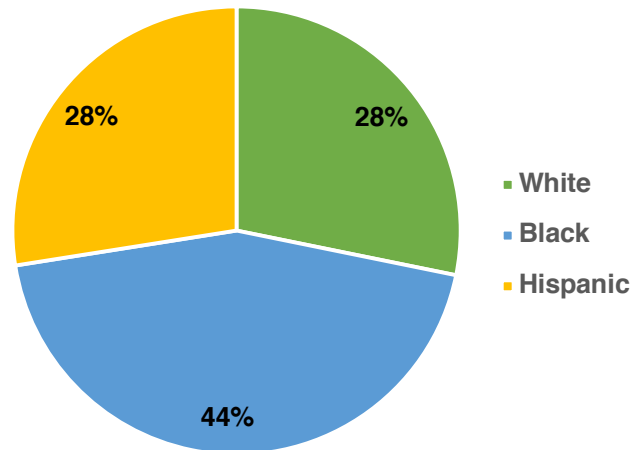
South Carolina had **5,560** low birth-weight babies born in 2017 which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to **9.7%** of infants born in South Carolina in 2017. ^{xxx}

South Carolina had a total of **943** preterm births in 2018, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. **9.7%** of all white babies were born premature while **15.8%** of black babies arrived prematurely in 2018. The total premature birth rate was **11.3%**. ^{xxxi}

There were **3,480** births to mothers aged 15-19 in South Carolina in 2017, representing a rate of **43** in every 1,000 teen girls. ^{xxxii}

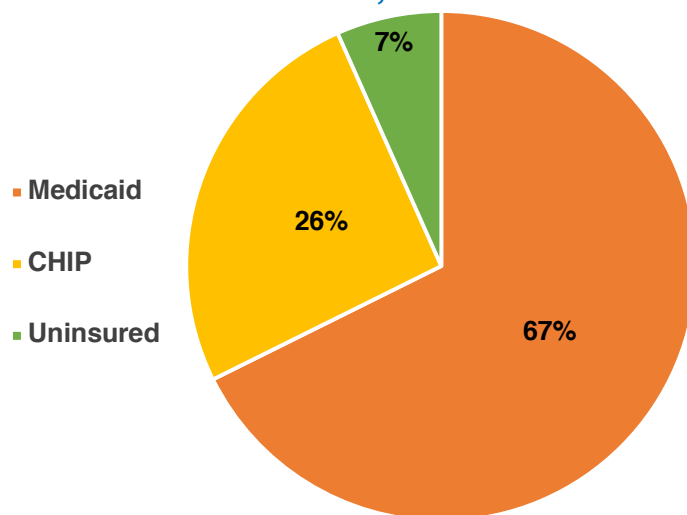
371 infants under 1 died in South Carolina in 2017, representing an infant mortality rate of **6.5** per 1,000. ^{xxxiii}

Public Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2018



- **4.7%** of South Carolina's children had no health insurance in 2018. This represents **56,000** children. South Carolina is not a Medicaid expansion state.

- **655,634** children in South Carolina were enrolled in Medicaid in 2018. This represents a **3.2%** increase from 2017. ^{xxxv}

- **111,051** children in South Carolina were in the state Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2018. This represents a **26.7%** increase from 2017. ^{xxxvi}

Juvenile Justice System

- There were **10,803** total arrests for children under 18 in South Carolina in 2018.
- **1,103** of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- **2,328** arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- **1,957** were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.^{xxxvii}
- **546** children lived in juvenile correction facilities in South Carolina in 2018. This is a decrease from **693** kids in 2015, representing a **21.2%** decline.^{xxxviii}

Teens & Youth

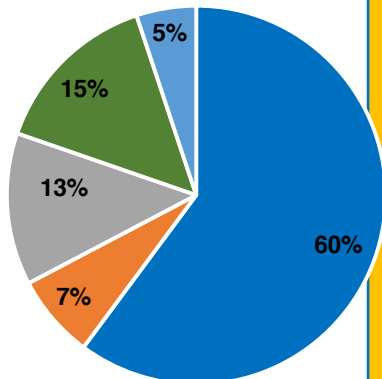
- **19,000** (7%) of South Carolina's youth were both not in school and not working in 2017.^{xxxix}
- In 2017, there were **10** reports of children in South Carolina aged 10-14 committing suicide, and **41** reports of suicide among children aged 15-19.^{xl}
- **75** children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in South Carolina in 2017.^{xli}

Child Welfare Services Funding

- South Carolina spent **\$241,403,177** on child welfare services in 2016. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.
- **\$147,984,300** were allocated from the federal government and **\$93,418,877** came from state and local funds.^{xlii}

- South Carolina's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2017 was **\$22,938,219** ^{xlv}
