#### **Child Maltreatment**


In 2020, Kansas had **48,213** total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **28,343** were referred for investigation.<sup>1</sup>

There were **2,386** child victims of abuse or neglect in Kansas in 2020, at a rate of **3.4** children per 1,000. This translates to a **0.7%** decrease since 2016.<sup>ii</sup>


Of the **2,386** children, **2,142** were first time victims.<sup>iii</sup>

The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing **187** of the **2,386 cases.**<sup>iv</sup>

- **55%** of Kansas's child victims in 2020 were female while **45%** were male.<sup>vii</sup>



#### **Plans of Safe Care**

- In 2020, Kansas reported 48 infants who were screened-in with prenatal substance abuse exposure.<sup>ix</sup>
- Kansas reported eight plans of safe care for screened-in infants.<sup>x</sup>

### **Foster Care and Adoptions**

- **10,849** total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2020.
- **7,242** were in care on the day of September 30<sup>th</sup>, 2020.
- **3,032** children entered care during the 2020 FY while **3,607** exited during the same year.
- 985 of Kansas's children were adopted while 2,303 were waiting to be adopted.xv

There was a **10.21%** decrease in the number of children in care between 2019 and 2020. Adoptions from the system decreased **19.7%** from 2019.<sup>xvi</sup>


Increase since 2018 in children aging out of foster care

**432** children in Kansas aged out and exited foster care in 2019. This is an increase from **391** in 2018 and represents an **10.5%** increase.<sup>xvii</sup>

- Children in foster care in 2020 spent an average of 22.9 months in care. xviii
- The average length of stay in Kansas for children waiting to be adopted from foster care is 39.2 months.xix
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2020 was 8.7 years old.xx
- The average age of adopted children was 6.8 years old.xxi

Data from 2019 shows that **3,789** children in foster care in Kansas were living with non-relatives while **2,481** stayed with a relative (See Pie Chart).\*xii


**623** children were staying in group homes while **83** children were classified as runaways.<sup>xxiii</sup>

**3%** of households in Kansas in 2020 had a grandparent living with a grandchild.xxiv

The average length of time a child in care spent living with their current relative foster family was 12.1 months.\*\*xv

### **Child Poverty**

Kansas had **147,000** children in 2019 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing **21%** of all children.xxvi

**22%** of Kansas's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.xxviii

The average number of individuals receiving TANF increased from **3,834** in 2019 to **4,073** in 2020. This represents a **6.2%** increase.<sup>xxix</sup> xxx

The state spent \$16,101,798 on WIC in 2021, serving 44,368 people. This represents a 5.2% decrease in total participants and a 4.1% decrease in spending. \*xxi

**351,090** people in Kansas were food insecure in 2019, including **120,090 children** who struggled with hunger.<sup>xxxii</sup>

41.4% of households receiving SNAP benefits in Kansas in 2019 had children.xxxiii


Kansas had **2,685** low birth-weight babies born in 2019 which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to **7.6%** of infants born in Kansas in 2019.xxxiv

Kansas had a total of **3,574** preterm births in 2019, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. **9.64%** of all white babies were born premature while **14.73%** of black babies arrived prematurely in 2019. The total premature birth rate was **10.10%.**\*\*\*\*

There were **1,857** births to mothers aged 15-19 in Kansas in 2019, representing a rate of **19** in every 1,000 teen girls. \*\*xxvi\*


**201** infants under one died in Kansas in 2019, representing an infant mortality rate of 5.7 per 1,000. \*\*xxxvii\*

**5.8%** of Kansas's children had no health insurance in 2019. This represents 43,000 children. Kansas is a Medicaid expansion state.xxxix

**240,905** children in Kansas were enrolled in Medicaid in 2020. This represents **2.03%** decrease from 2019. xl

**68,955** children in Kansas were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2020. This represents an **1.2%** decrease from 2019. XII

### **Juvenile Justice System**

- There were **3,632** total arrests for children under 18 in Kansas in 2019.
- 127 of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- 552 arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- **621** were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.<sup>xlii</sup>
- **360** children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Kansas in 2019. This is a decrease from **423** kids 2017, representing a **14.9%** decrease.xliii

#### **Teens & Youth**

- 9,000 (5%) of Kansas's youth were both not in school and not working in 2019.xliv
- In 2020, there were zero reports of children in Kansas aged 10-14 committing suicide, however there were 36 reports of suicide among children aged 15-19.xlv
- 70 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Kansas in 2020.xlvi


### **Child Welfare Services Funding**
