Child Maltreatment


In 2020, Michigan had **140,748** total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **72,953** were referred for investigation.ⁱ

There were **26,932** child victims of abuse or neglect in Michigan in 2020, at a rate of **12.7** children per 1,000. This translates to a **27.7%** decrease since 2016.ⁱⁱ

Of the **26,932** children, **16,859** were first time victims.ⁱⁱⁱ

The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing **3,430** of the **26,932 cases.**^{iv}





Plans of Safe Care

- In 2020, 6,370 infants were screened-in with prenatal substance abuse exposure.^{ix}
- Michigan reported 6,101 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.x

Foster Care and Adoptions

- **16,021** total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2020.
- **10,661** were in care on the day of September 30th, 2020.
- **4,386** children entered care during the 2020 FY while **5,360** exited during the same year.
- 1,851 of Michigan's children were adopted while
 3,660 were waiting to be adopted.^{xv}

There was a **8.7%** decrease in the number of children in care between 2019 and 2020. Adoptions from the system also decreased **14.3%** from 2019.^{xvi}


9.3% Decrease since 2018 in children aging out of foster care

640 children in Michigan aged out and exited foster care in 2019. This is a decrease from **706** in 2018 and represents a **9.3%** decrease.^{xvii}

- Children in foster care in 2020 spent an average of 21.2 months in care. xviii
- The average length of stay in Michigan for children waiting to be adopted from foster care is **30.6** months.^{xix}
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2020 was 7.6 years old.xx
- The average age of adopted children was 6.0 years old.xxi

Data from 2019 shows that **4,550** children in foster care within Michigan were living with non-relatives while **4,600** stayed with a relative (See Pie Chart).^{xxii}


986 children were staying in group homes while **59** children were classified as runaways.^{xxiii}

3% of households in Michigan in 2020 had a grandparent living with a grandchild.^{xxiv}

The average length of time a child in care spent living with their current relative foster family was **10.0** months.^{xxv}

Child Poverty

Michigan had **556,000** children in 2019 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing **26%** of all children.^{xxvi}



24% of Michigan's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.^{xxviii}

The average number of individuals receiving TANF rose from **27,888** in 2019 to **34,944** in 2020. This represents a **25.3%** increase.^{xxix}

The state spent **\$67,786,322** on WIC in 2021, serving **207,317** people. This represents a **3.07%** decrease in total participants and a **15.5%** decrease in spending. ^{xxxi}

1,299,020 people in Michigan were food insecure in 2019, including **305,190 children** who struggled with hunger.^{xxxii}

33.8% of households receiving SNAP benefits in Michigan in 2019 had children.xxxiii



Health


Michigan had **9,414** low birth-weight babies born in 2019 which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to **8.7%** of infants born in Michigan in 2019.^{xxxiv}

Michigan had a total of **11,070** preterm births in 2019, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. **9.19%** of all white babies were born premature while **14.69%** of black babies arrived prematurely in 2019. The total premature birth rate was **10.27%.**^{xxxv}


There were **4,758** births to mothers aged 15-19 in Michigan in 2019, representing a rate of **15** in every 1,000 teen girls. ^{xxxvi}

690 infants under one died in Michigan in 2019, representing an infant mortality rate of **6.4** per 1,000. ^{xxxvii}

1,150,183 children in Michigan were enrolled in Medicaid in 2020. This represents a **2.1%** decrease from 2019. ^{xi}

71,853 children in Michigan were in the state Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2020. This represents a **18.3%** decrease from 2019. ^{xii}

Juvenile Justice System

- There were **11,172** total arrests for children under 18 in Michigan in 2019.
- **408** of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- **2,646** arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- **403** were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.^{xlii}


• **1,353** children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Michigan in 2019. This is an increase from **1,260** kids in 2017, representing an **7.4%** incline.^{xliii}

Teens & Youth

- **31,000** (6%) of Michigan's youth were both not in school and not working in 2019.^{xliv}
- In 2020, there were 14 reports of children in Michigan aged 10-14 committing suicide, and 62 reports of suicide among children aged 15-19.^{xiv}
- 117 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Michigan in 2020.xlvi

Child Welfare Services Funding

- Michigan spent **\$1,281,121,489** on child welfare services in 2018. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.
- \$853,527,106 were allocated from the federal government and \$424,266,810 came from state and local funds.^{xlvii}
