Child Maltreatment


In 2020, Mississippi had **32,000** total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **24,405** were referred for investigation.

There were **8,136** child victims of abuse or neglect in Mississippi in 2020, at a rate of **11.7** children per 1,000. This translates to a **20.1%** decrease since 2016.ⁱⁱ


Of the **8,136** children, **7,145** were first time victims.ⁱⁱⁱ

The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing 1,175 of the 8,136 cases.^{IV}


- 71% of child maltreatment perpetrators in 2020 were parents of the child. 29% were non-parents or had an unknown relationship.vi
- **53%** of Mississippi's child victims in 2020 were female while **46%** were male. vii

Plans of Safe Care

- In 2020, zero infants were screened-in with prenatal substance abuse exposure.ix
- Mississippi reported zero plans of safe care for screened-in infants.^x

- •Child fatalities increased in 2020 from **35** in 2019 to **38** in 2020.^{xi}
- Mississippi had 11 reports of child victims of sex trafficking.xii
- •4,239 victims received post-response services while 2,597 non-victims received post-response services as well.xiii

Foster Care and Adoptions

- **5,884** total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2020.
- **3,594** were in care on the day of September 30th, 2020.
- **1,800** children entered care during the 2020 FY while **2,307** exited during the same year.
- 597 of Mississippi's children were adopted while
 1,384 were waiting to be adopted.xv

There was a **13.6%** decrease in the number of children in care between 2019 and 2020. Adoptions from the system also decreased **17.0%** from 2019.^{xvi}

Increase since 2018 in children aging out of foster care

72 children in Mississippi aged out and exited foster care in 2019. This is an increase from **68** in 2018 and represents a **5.88%** increase.^{xvii}

- Children in foster care in 2020 spent an average of 23.2 months in care. xviii
- The average length of stay in Mississippi for children waiting to be adopted from foster care is 35.3 months.xix
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2020 was 7.5 years old.xx
- The average age of adopted children was 7.2 years old.xxi



Where are Children in Foster Care Staying?




6% of households in Mississippi in 2020 had a grandparent living with a grandchild.**xiv

Child Poverty

Mississippi had **238,000** children in 2019 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing **34%** of all children.^{xxvi}

26% of Mississippi's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.xxviii

The average number of individuals receiving TANF fell from **6,612** in 2019 to **4,767** in 2020. This represents a **27.9%** decrease.**xix

The state spent \$43,899,701 on WIC in 2021, serving 72,826 people. This represents a 6.1% decrease in total participants and a 23.4% decrease in spending. xxxi

550,370 people in Mississippi were food insecure in 2019, including **155,560 children** who struggled with hunger.xxxii

47.7% of households receiving SNAP benefits in Mississippi in 2019 had children. xxxiii



Health


Mississippi had **4,510** low birth-weight babies born in 2019 which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to **12.3%** of infants born in Mississippi in 2019. XXXIV

Mississippi had a total of **5,340** preterm births in 2019, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. **12.39%** of all white babies were born premature while **17.81%** of black babies arrived prematurely in 2019. The total premature birth rate was **14.58%**.xxxv


There were **2,869** births to mothers aged 15-19 in Mississippi in 2019, representing a rate of **29** in every 1,000 teen girls. *xxxvi


322 infants under one died in Mississippi in 2019, representing an infant mortality rate of **8.8** per 1,000. **xxv*ii*

84,459 children in Mississippi were in the state Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2020. This represents a **2.35%** decrease from 2019. xli

Juvenile Justice System

- There were **2,719** total arrests for children under 18 in Mississippi in 2019.
- **362** of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- 596 arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- **214** were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.^{xlii}
- 198 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Mississippi in 2019. This is a decrease from 273 kids in 2017, representing a 27.5% increase.xliii


Teens & Youth

- 18,000 (10%) of Mississippi's youth were both not in school and not working in 2019.^{xliv}
- In 2020, there were **zero** reports of children in Mississippi aged 10-14 committing suicide, and **15** reports of suicide among children aged 15-19.xlv
- 86 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Mississippi in 2020.xlvi

Child Welfare Services Funding

- Mississippi spent \$196,471,044 on child welfare services in 2018. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.
- \$98,501,721 were allocated from the federal government and \$97,969,323 came from state and local funds.xlvii

The breakdown of the \$98,501,721 in federal funding received in Mississippi in 2018:

- \$28,554,391 as part of the Title IV-E Foster Care Program.
- \$13,118,517 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program xlix
- Mississippi's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2020 was \$11,905,002
