#### **Child Maltreatment**


In 2020, New Hampshire had **18,825** total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **10,816** were referred for investigation.

There were **1,182** child victims of abuse or neglect in New Hampshire in 2020, at a rate of **4.7** children per 1,000. This translates to a **30.6%** increase since 2016.<sup>ii</sup>


Of the **1,182** children, **946** were first time victims.<sup>iii</sup>

The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing **150** of the **1,182** cases.iv

- **86**% of child maltreatment perpetrators in 2020 were parents of the child. **14**% were non-parents or had an unknown relationship. vi
- **51%** of New Hampshire's child victims in 2020 were female while **49%** were male.<sup>vii</sup>

#### **Plans of Safe Care**


 In 2020, New Hampshire reported zero infants who were screened-in with prenatal substance abuse exposure.<sup>ix</sup>

- Child fatalities remained the same in 2020 from **two** in 2019 to **two** in 2020.<sup>xi</sup>
- New Hampshire had zero reports of child victims of sex trafficking.xii
- •632 victims received postresponse services while 1,005 non-victims received post-response services as well.xiii

### **Foster Care and Adoptions**

- **1,842** total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2020.
- **1,184** were in care on the day of September 30<sup>th</sup>, 2020.
- 677 children entered care during the 2020 FY while
   658 exited during the same year.
- 183 of New Hampshire's children were adopted while 214 were waiting to be adopted.xv

There was a **3.3%** decrease in the number of children in care between 2019 and 2020. Adoptions from the system also decreased **34.2%** from 2019.<sup>xvi</sup>

**69** children in New Hampshire aged out and exited foster care in 2019. This is a decrease from **85** in 2018 and represents a **18.8%** decrease.<sup>xvii</sup>

- Children in foster care in 2020 spent an average of 20.0 months in care. xviii
- The average length of stay in New Hampshire for children waiting to be adopted from foster care is 35.6 months.xix
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2020 was 9.2 years old.xx
- The average age of adopted children was 6.3 years old.xxi




**332** children were staying in group homes while **six** children were classified as runaways.\*xxiii

**3%** of households in New Hampshire in 2020 had a grandparent living with a grandchild.\*\*

The average length of time a child in care spent living with their current relative foster family was 13.7 months.\*\*xv

### **Child Poverty**

New Hampshire had **59,000** children in 2019 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing **23%** of all children.<sup>xxvii</sup>



**24%** of New Hampshire's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.xxviii

The average number of individuals receiving TANF fell from **7,201** in 2019 to **7,241** in 2020. This represents a **0.56%** increase.xxix

The state spent **\$4,123,922** on WIC in 2021, serving **13,925** people. This represents a **8.69%** increase in total participants and a **0.15%** decrease in spending. xxxi

**119,990** people in New Hampshire were food insecure in 2019, including **27,980 children** who struggled with hunger.<sup>xxxii</sup>

**41.9%** of households receiving SNAP benefits in New Hampshire in 2019 had children. XXXXIII



#### Health


New Hampshire had **756** low birth-weight babies born in 2019 which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to **6.4%** of infants born in New Hampshire in 2019.\*\*xxiv

New Hampshire had a total of **969** preterm births in 2019, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. **7.97%** of all white babies were born premature while **12.16%** of black babies arrived prematurely in 2019. The total premature birth rate was **8.19%**.xxxv


There were **275** births to mothers aged 15-19 in New Hampshire in 2019, representing a rate of **7** in every 1,000 teen girls. xxxvi

**37** infants under one died in New Hampshire in 2019, representing an infant mortality rate of **3.1** per 1,000. \*\*xxxvii\*

**89,674** children in New Hampshire were enrolled in Medicaid in 2020. This represents a **0.57%** increase from 2019. xl

17,115 children in New Hampshire were in the state Chip Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2020. This represents a 3.53% decrease from 2019. xli

### **Juvenile Justice System**

- There were **3,243** total arrests for children under 18 in New Hampshire in 2019.
- 88 of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- 241 arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- **337** were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.\*Xlii
- **24** children lived in juvenile correction facilities in New Hampshire in 2019. This is a decrease from **69** children in 2017, representing a **65.2%** decline.xliii

#### **Teens & Youth**


- 4,000 (5%) of New Hampshire's youth were both not in school and not working in 2019.xliv
- In 2020, there were **zero** reports of children in New Hampshire aged 10-14 committing suicide, and **10** reports of suicide among children aged 15-19.xlv
- There were no reports of children under age 19 killed by a firearm in New Hampshire in 2020.xlvi

### **Child Welfare Services Funding**

 New Hampshire spent \$58,265,492 on child welfare services in 2018. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.

 \$42,823,274 were allocated from the federal government and \$12,400,883 came from state and local funds.xlvii
