Child Maltreatment


In 2020, Ohio had **182,036** total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **81,183** were screened in for investigation.ⁱ

There was **23,691** child victims of abuse or neglect in Ohio in 2020, at a rate of **9.2** children per 1,000. This translates to a **0.2%** increase since 2016.ⁱⁱ


Of the **23,691** children, **17,381** were first time victims.ⁱⁱⁱ

The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing **4,081** of the **23,691** cases.^{iv}

63% of child maltreatment perpetrators in 2020 were parents of the child. **37%** were non-parents or had an unknown relationship.^{vi}


53% of Ohio's child victims in 2020 were female and **46%** were male.**1%** not reported or unknown.^{vii}

Plans of Safe Care

- In 2020 Ohio reported 5,884 infants who were screened-in with prenatal substance abuse exposure.^{ix}
- Ohio reported **5,316** screened-in infants with plans of safe care. ^x

Child fatalities increased in 2020 from **79** in 2019 to **94** in 2020.^{xi}

Ohio reported **25** sex trafficking victims in 2020 ^{xii}

Ohio reported **16,575** victims who received postresponse services and **29,492** non-victims who received post-response services. ^{xiii}

Foster Care and Adoptions

- **26,475** total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2020.
- **16,017** were in care on the day of September 30th, 2020.
- **10,720** children entered care during the 2020 FY while **10,458** exited during the same year.
- 1,466 of Ohio's children were adopted while 3,472 were waiting to be adopted.^{xv}

There was a **2.2%** decrease in the number of children in care between 2019 and 2020. Adoptions from the system decreased **11.9%** from 2019.^{xvi}


24.9% Increase since 2018 in children aging out of foster care

1,127 children in Ohio aged out and exited foster care in 2019. This is an increase from **902** in 2018 and represents a **24.9%** increase.^{xvii}

- Children in foster care in 2020 spent an average of 17.5 months in care. xviii
- The average length of stay in Ohio for children waiting to be adopted from foster care is **39.2** months.^{xix}
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2020 was 9.1 years old.xx
- The average age of adopted children was 6.3 years old.xxi

Data from 2019 shows that **9,225** children in foster care within Ohio were living with non-relatives while **3,593** stayed with a relative (See Pie Chart).^{xxii}


2,024 children were staying in group homes while **141** children were classified as runaways.^{xxiii}

3% of households in Ohio in 2020 had a grandparent living with a grandchild.^{xxiv}

The average length of time a child in care spent living with their current relative foster family was **8.1** months.^{xxv}

Child Poverty

Ohio had **678,000** children in 2019 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing **26%** of all children.^{xxvi}



23% of Ohio's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.^{xxviii}

The average number of individuals receiving TANF increased from **92,550** in 2019 to **96,834** in 2020. This represents a **4.6%** increase.^{xxix xxx}

The state spent **\$71,351,195** on WIC in 2021, serving **164,327** people. This represents a **9.7%** decrease in total participants and a **7.3%** increase in spending. ^{xxxi}

1,547,110 people in Ohio were food insecure in 2019, including **448,600 children** who struggled with hunger.^{xxxii}

40.3% of households receiving SNAP benefits in Ohio in 2019 had children.xxxiii



Health


Ohio had **11,533** low birth-weight babies born in 2019 which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to **8.6%** of infants born in Ohio in 2019.^{xxxiv}

Ohio had a total of **14,120** preterm births in 2019, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. **9.63%** of all white babies were born premature while **14.11%** of black babies arrived prematurely in 2019. The total premature birth rate was **10.5%.**^{xxxv}

There were **6,926** births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2019, representing a rate of **19** in every 1,000 teen girls. ^{xxxvi}


930 infants under 1 died in Ohio in 2019, representing an infant mortality rate of **6.9** per 1,000. ^{xxxvii}

Public Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2020



4.8% of Ohio's children had no health insurance in 2019. This represents **131,000** children. Ohio is a Medicaid expansion state. ^{xxxix}

1,240,667 children in Ohio were enrolled in Medicaid in 2020. This represents a **3.6%** decrease from 2019. ^{xl}

211,086 children in Ohio were in the state Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2020. This represents a **13.0%** decrease from 2019. ^{xli}

Juvenile Justice System

• There were **20,149** total arrests for children under 18 in Ohio in 2019.

- 1,676 of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- 3,287 arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- **1,362** were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.^{xlii}


• **1,746** children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Ohio in 2019. This is a decrease from **2,079** kids in 2017, representing a **16.0%** decrease.^{xliii}

Teens & Youth

- 37,000 (6%) of Ohio's youth were both not in school and not working in 2019.^{xliv}
- In 2020, Ohio reported 26 deaths by suicide for children 10-14; There were 64 reports of suicide among children aged 15-19.^{xiv}
- 186 children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Ohio in 2020.xlvi

Child Welfare Services Funding

- Ohio spent **\$1,307,935,087** on child welfare services in 2018. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.
- \$507,740,217 were allocated from the federal government and \$796,407,369 came from state and local funds.^{xlvii}



The breakdown of the **\$507,740,217** in federal funding received in Ohio in 2018: ^{xlviii}

- **\$180,935,732** as part of the Title IV-E Foster Care Program.
- **\$157,976,098** as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program ^{xlix}
- Ohio's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2020 was \$126,141,723 ¹
