Child Maltreatment


In 2021, Idaho had 21,508 total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 9,121 were referred for investigation.


There were 2.268 child victims of abuse or neglect in Idaho in 2021, at a rate of 4.0 children per 1,000. This translates to a 23.8% increase since 2017.

Of the 2,268 children, 1,884 were first-time victims.

The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing 571 of the 2,268 cases.

Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2021





Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>2,693</u> total children were served by the foster care system in Idaho in FY 2021.
- 1,601 were in care on the day of September 30th, 2021.
- 1,346 children entered care during the 2021 FY while 1,097 exited during the same year.
- 346 of Idaho's children were adopted while 320 were waiting to be adopted.

There was a 4.4% increase in the number of children in care between 2020 and 2021. Adoptions from the system decreased by 2.0% from 2020.

<u>78</u> children in Idaho aged out and exited foster care in 2020. This is a decrease from 87 in 2019 and represents a 11.5% decrease.

- Children in foster care in 2020 spent an average length of <u>15.4</u> months in care.
- The average length of stay in Idaho for children waiting to be adopted from foster care is <u>27.4</u> months.
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2020 was 8.2 years old.
- The average age of adopted children was 6.3 years old.



Where are Children in Foster Care Staying?, <u>2020</u>




Child Poverty

Idaho had <u>99,000</u> children in 2021 who lived with parents who lacked secure employment, representing 21% of all children.

<u>22%</u> of Idaho's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.

The average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>2,364</u> in 2021 to <u>2,178</u> in 2022. This represents a 7.9% decrease.

DVERTY spent living with their current relative foster family was 10.3 months.



The state spent <u>\$8,717,581</u> on WIC in 2022, serving 29,030 people. This represents a 3.0% decrease in total participants and a 3.8% increase in spending.

 $\underline{152,890}$ people in Idaho were food insecure in 2020, including 46,800 children who struggled with hunger.

47.3% of households receiving SNAP benefits in Idaho in 2019 had children.


Health

Idaho had <u>1,478</u> low birth-weight babies born in 2020, which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to 6.9% of infants born in Idaho in 2020.

Idaho had <u>1,821</u> of preterm births in 2020, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. 8.0% of all White babies were born prematurely while 7.8% of Black babies arrived prematurely in 2020. The total premature birth rate was 8.46%.


There were <u>909</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in Idaho in 2020, representing a rate of 15 in every 1,000 teen girls.

<u>109</u> infants under 1 died in Idaho in 2020, representing an infant mortality rate of 5.1 per 1,000.

Public Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2019</u>



<u>35,000</u> of Idaho's children had no health insurance in 2021. This represents a 45.8% increase from 2019.

Idaho is a <u>Medicaid expansion</u> state as of January 2020.

<u>185,747</u> children in Idaho were enrolled in Medicaid in 2020. This represents a 5.1% decrease from 2019.

44,319 children in Idaho were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2020. This represents a 9.9% increase from 2019.

Juvenile Justice

- There were <u>6,235</u> total arrests for children under 18 in Idaho in 2019.
- 283 of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- 899 arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- 956 were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>342</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in Idaho in 2019. This is a decrease from 408 kids in 2017, representing a 16.2% decline.

Teens & Youth


- <u>8,000 (7%)</u> of Idaho's youth, ages 16-19, were not in school nor working in 2021.
- In 2020, there were <u>0</u> reports of children in Idaho aged 10-14 committing suicide and 65 reports of suicide among children and young adults aged 15-24.
- <u>26</u> children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in Idaho in 2020.

Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Idaho spent <u>\$60,694,219</u> on child welfare services in 2016. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.
- \$39,286,639 were allocated from the federal government and \$21,407,580 came from state and local funds.

The significant funding sectors of the <u>\$39,286,639</u> in federal funding received in Idaho in 2016:

- \$3,393,043.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$7,417,496.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Idaho's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2020 was <u>\$8,063,830.00</u>
