### **Child Maltreatment**


In 2021, South Carolina had <u>64,251</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 35,107 were screened in for response.


There were 15,308 child victims of abuse or neglect in South Carolina in 2021, at a rate of 13.7 children per 1,000. This translates to a 10.3% decrease since 2017.

Of the 15,308 children, 10,836 were first-time victims.

The largest age group of victims was children under one, representing 2,257 of the 15,308 cases.

#### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>






#### Types of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2021</u>

- <u>86%</u> of child maltreatment perpetrators in 2020 were parents of the child.
- 14% were non-parents or had an unknown relationship.
- 50% of South Carolina's child victims in 2020 were female while 49% were male. 1% of child victims are unknown or unidentified.

#### **Plans for Safe Care**

- In 2021, South Carolina reported <u>501</u> infants screened with prenatal substance abuse exposure.
- South Carolina did not report plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

• Child fatalities have increased from <u>36</u> in 2020 to 41 in 2021.

• South Carolina reported <u>81</u> total child victims of sex trafficking.

• 5,237 victims received post-response services while 7,967 non- victims received post-response services as well.

### **Foster Care and Adoptions**

- <u>6,702</u> total children were served by the foster care system in South Carolina in FY 2021.
- 3,944 were in care on the day of September 30th, 2021.
- 2,709 children entered care during the 2021 FY while 2,758 exited during the same year.
- 459 of South Carolina's children were adopted while 1,438 were waiting to be adopted.

There was a 3.1% decrease in the number of children in care between 2020 and 2021. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 16.7% from 2020.

<u>273</u> children in South Carolina aged out and exited foster care in 2020. This is an increase from 260 in 2019 and represents a 5% increase.


- Children in foster care in 2020 spent an average length of <u>20.6</u> months in care.
- The average length of stay in South Carolina for children waiting to be adopted from foster care is 34.1 months.
- The average age of children waiting to be adopted in 2020 was 8.8 years old.
- The average age of adopted children was 6.2 years old.

#### Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2020</u>



25% of South Carolina's children lived in households with a high housing cost burden in 2021.

The average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>16,672</u> in 2021 to <u>14,860</u> in 2022. This represents a 10.87% decrease.


Data from 2021 shows that <u>2,724</u> children in foster care within South Carolina were living with non-relatives while 408 stayed with a relative.

<u>639</u> children were staying in group homes or institutions while 75 children were classified as runaways.

<u>3%</u> of households in South Carolina in 2020 had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

The average length of time a child in care spent living with their current relative foster family was 6.9 months.

Child Poverty Over Time



South Carolina spent <u>\$26,102,677</u> on WIC in 2022, serving <u>86,233</u> people. This represents a 0.7% decrease in total participants and a 2% increase in spending.

<u>489,510</u> people in South Carolina were food insecure in 2020, including 153,330 children who struggled with hunger.

48.3% of households receiving SNAP benefits in South Carolina in 2019 had children.




### Health

South Carolina had <u>5,461</u> low birthweight babies born in 2020, which is constituted as babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds. This translates to 9.8% of infants born in South Carolina in 2020.


South Carolina had a total of <u>6,576</u> preterm births in 2020, meaning less than 37 completed weeks of gestation. 10.10% of all White babies were born prematurely while 15.66% of Black babies arrived prematurely in 2020. The total premature birth rate was 11.81%.

There were <u>3,069</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in South Carolina in 2020, representing a rate of 19 in every 1,000 teen girls.



<u>364</u> infants under 1 died in South Carolina in 2020, representing an infant mortality rate of 6.5 per 1,000.

#### Public Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2019</u>



<u>63,000</u> of South Carolina's children had no health insurance in 2021. This represents a 8.7% decrease from 2020.

<u>633,672</u> children in South Carolina were enrolled in Medicaid in 2020. This represents a 1.8% decrease from 2019.

<u>111,645</u> children in South Carolina were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2020. This represents a 1.6% decrease from 2019.

<u>South Carolina</u> has not implemented Medicaid expansion.

### **Juvenile Justice**

- There were <u>9,403</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 865 of these arrests were for Disorderly Conduct.
- 1,918 arrests were made for Property Crimes.
- 1,375 were arrested under the charge of Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>633</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in South Carolina in 2019. This number has increased from 546 since 2017, representing a 13.7% increase.

### Teens & Youth


- <u>23,000</u> (8%) of South Carolina's youth, ages 16-19, were not in school nor working in 2021.
- In 2020, there were no reports of children in South Carolina aged 10-14 committing suicide, and there were <u>135</u> reports of suicide among children and young adults aged 15-24.
- <u>127</u> children under age 19 were killed by a firearm in South Carolina in 2020.

## **Funding for Child Welfare Services**

- South Carolina spent \$258,656,986 on child welfare services in 2018. Child welfare services are all of the direct and administrative services that state agencies provide to children and families.
- \$147,204,741 were allocated from the federal government and \$95,078,201 came from state and local funds.

# The significant funding sectors of the \$<u>147,204,741</u> in federal funding received in South Carolina in 2018:

- \$41,264,169 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$20,732,391 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- South Carolina's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2020 was \$<u>24,538,241.</u>
