
Alaska's Children

Child Maltreatment

- In 2022, Alaska had <u>19,301</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 6,627 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 2,581 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 14.6 children per 1,000 (1.3% decrease since 2018).
- Of the 2,581 children, **1,676** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 358 of the 2,581 cases.



Types of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2022</u>


Plans for Safe Care

- In 2022, Alaska reported <u>0</u> infants screened with prenatal substance exposure.
- Alaska reported 0 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Alaska <u>does not have a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2022</u>




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2022):

- $\underline{83\%}$ = parents of the child.
- 17% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2022):

- 52% = female; 48% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>6</u> in 2021 to <u>8</u> in 2022.
- Alaska reported 3 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **1,498** victims and **9,544** non-victims.

Age Distribution of Maltreatment ₃₅ Victims, <u>2022</u>






Foster Care and Adoptions


- <u>3,943</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 2,690 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **1,151** children entered care and **1,253** exited.
- 288 children were adopted; 1,014 were waiting to be adopted.
- 4.9% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 15% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





- 874 children were living with non-relatives; 739 stayed with a relative.
- 109 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 18 children classified as runaways.
- <u>4%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.








Alaska's Children Child Poverty

- <u>55,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (32% of all children).
- <u>28%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>4,727</u> in 2021 to <u>4,078</u> in 2022 (13.7% decrease).




- <u>15,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (0.05% increase from 2021).
- <u>70,000</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2022 (7.9% decrease from 2021).
- <u>14,787</u> children in Alaska were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (97.6% increase from 2020).

- The state spent <u>\$6,120,065</u> on WIC in 2022, serving 13,761 people: a 5.4% decrease in total participants and 16% increase in spending since 2021.
- <u>78,260</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including **22,960** children.
- <u>41.3%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2019 had children.

Teens & Youth

- <u>3,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (8%)
- In 2020, there were <u>zero</u> reports of suicide among children aged 10-14 and 46 reports among ages 15-24.
- <u>14</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Alaska in 2020.

Funding for Child Welfare Services


- Alaska spent <u>\$165,083,541.50</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- **\$66,170,473.50** = from the federal government
- **\$95,708,100** = from state and local funds.

- <u>647</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2021 (**6.9**% of births).
- <u>949</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (10% of births).
 - 8.62% of all White babies
 - 11.52% of all Black babies
- <u>378</u> births to mothers aged 15–19 in 2021 -- a rate of 17 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>70</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2021; a rate of **7.5** per 1,000.

Medicaid Expansion

Alaska has been a <u>Medicaid expansion</u> state since 09/01/2015

Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$<u>66,170,473.50</u> in federal funding received in Alaska in 2020:

- \$21,755,470.31 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$26,024,301.13 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Alaska's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2021 was <u>\$8,052,791</u>
