
Child Maltreatment

- In 2022, Colorado had <u>109,113</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **31,792** were screened in for response by CPS.
- 9,777 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 8 children per 1,000 (17.7% decrease since 2018).
- Of the 9,777 children, 6,683 were first-time victims
- Largest age group of victims = **<1years**, representing 1,261 of the 9,777 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2022




Plans for Safe Care

- In 2022, Colorado reported <u>23</u> infants screened with prenatal substance exposure.
- Colorado reported 2 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Colorado <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2022




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2022):

- 71% = parents of the child.
- 29% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2022):

- 53% = female; 47% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>31</u> in 2021 to <u>40</u> in 2022.
- Colorado reported zero total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **1,919** victims and **38,824** non-victims.

Foster Care and Adoptions

- 7,155 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- **4,133** in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 3,097 children entered care and **3,022** exited.
- 745 children were adopted; 823 were waiting to be adopted.
- 2.7% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 5.7% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice

- 16,885 total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 1,565 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 3,062 for Property Crimes.
- 1,920 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 462 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 753 kids in 2019; 38.6% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>171</u> children exited foster care due to age (10.5% decrease from 2020).
- 2,217 children were living with nonrelatives; 1,097 stayed with a relative.
- 490 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 109 children classified as runaways.
- 3% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

Child Poverty


- 268,000 children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (22% of all children).
- 30% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients rose from <u>28,059</u> in 2021 to <u>28,475</u> in 2022 (1.5% increase).

Teens & Youth


- <u>18,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (6%)
- In 2020, there were <u>18</u> reports of suicide among children aged 10-14 and 197 reports among ages 15-24.
- 79 children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Colorado in 2020.

Health

• 62,000 children had no health insurance in 2022 (1.6% increase from 2021).

- 430,000 children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2022 (6.5% decrease from 2021).
- 112,092 children in Colorado were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2020 (35.7% increase from 2019).


Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2021

Funding for Child Welfare Services


- Colorado spent <u>\$455,074,837.71</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services.
- \$163,826,078.41 = from the federal government.
- \$285,140,828.30 = from state and local funds.

- <u>5,939</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2021 (**9.5**% of births).
- <u>6,133</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (9.75% of births).
 - 9% of all White babies
 - 12.4% of all Black babies
- <u>2,059</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2021 -- a rate of **11** in every 1,000 teen girls.
- 315 infants aged <1yr died in 2021; a rate of 5 per 1,000.

Medicaid Expansion

Colorado has been a <u>Medicaid expansion</u> state since 01/01/2014.

Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$163,826,078.41 in federal funding received in Colorado in 2020:

- \$72,335,968 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$19,818,895 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Colorado's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2021 was \$27,857,355.
