
Child Maltreatment

- In 2022, Nebraska had <u>37,193</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 13,845 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 2,026 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 4.3 children per 1,000 (22% decrease since 2018).
- Of the 2,026 children, **1,557** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 253 of the 2,026 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2022




Plans for Safe Care

- In 2022, Nebraska reported <u>159</u> infants screened with prenatal substance exposure.
- Nebraska reported <u>30</u> plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Nebraska has a family first plan approved by the Administration.



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2022




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2022):

- <u>78%</u> = parents of the child.
- 22% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2022):

- 54% = female; 46% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>1</u> in 2021 to <u>3</u> in 2022.
- Nebraska reported 20 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 1,588 victims and 12,710 non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2022



Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>5,671</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 3,873 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **1,929** children entered care and **1,798** exited.
- 392 children were adopted; 807 were waiting to be adopted.
- 1% increase in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system increased by 6.5% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice

- <u>8,282</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 398 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 1,846 for Property Crimes.
- 1,111 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 207 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 309 kids in 2019; 33% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021




Group Home/Institution

- In 2021, <u>110</u> children exited foster care due to age (8.9% increase from 2020).
- 1,647 children were living with non-relatives; 1,322 stayed with a relative.
- 152 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 38 children classified as runaways.
- <u>3%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

The decline since 2019 of children living in juvenile correction facilities.






Child Poverty

- <u>94,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2021 (19% of all children).
- <u>22%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from 8,003 in 2021 to 6,299 in 2022 (21.3% decrease).
- The state spent \$11,110,910 on WIC in 2022, serving 35,243 people: 1.49% increase in total participants and 8.26% increase in spending since 2021.
- <u>195,670</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 58,070 children.
- 46.1% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2019 had children.

Teens & Youth


- <u>3,000</u> of youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (3%).
- In 2020, there were <u>zero</u> reports of suicide among children aged 10-14 and
 42 reports among ages 15-24.
- <u>22</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Nebraska in 2020.

Health

• <u>23,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (4.2% decrease from 2021).

- <u>174,328</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (3% increase from 2020).
- <u>57,523</u> children in Nebraska were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (7.6% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>



Funding for Child Welfare Services


- Nebraska spent \$157,510,499.71 on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$67,583,829.11 = from the federal government
- \$87,480,085.78 = from state and local funds.

- <u>1,880</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2021 (**7.6**% of births).
- <u>2,653</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (10.8%).
 - 10.16% of all White babies
 - 15.66% of all Black babies
- <u>944</u> births to mothers aged 15–19 in 2021 a rate of 14 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>133</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2021 -- a rate of 5 per 1,000.

Medicaid Expansion

Nebraska has been a <u>Medicaid expansion</u> state since 01/01/2014

- \$7,055,950.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$25,084,271.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Nebraska's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2020 was \$10,290,474
