# Nevada's Children

## **Child Maltreatment**

- In 2022, Nevada had <u>41,921</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 16,117 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 5,851 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 8.5 children per 1,000 (14.5% increase since 2018).
- Of the 5,851 children, **3,852** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <**1years**, representing 903 of the 5,851 cases.

### Plans for Safe Care

- In 2022, Nevada reported <u>747</u> infants screened with prenatal substance exposure.
- Nevada reported **48** plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Nevada has <u>a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration and implemented in October 2023.

### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2022



#### Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2022):

- <u>83%</u> = parents of the child.
- 17% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2022):

- 52% = female; 48% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>27</u> in 2021 to <u>15</u> in 2022.
- Nevada had no reports of child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services were given to 3,047 victims and 5,309 non-victims.

# Nevada's Children

## Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>6,783</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 4,047 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **2,650** children entered care and **2,736** exited.
- 744 children were adopted; 1,470 were waiting to be adopted.
- 3.3% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system increased by 2.3% from 2021.

## Nevada's Children Child Poverty

- <u>195,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (28% of all children).
- <u>35%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients rose from <u>14,546</u> in 2021 to <u>15,821</u> in 2022 (8.8% increase).



- <u>55,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (12.7% decrease from 2021).
- <u>349,006</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (7.4% decrease from 2020).
- <u>63,132</u> children in Nevada were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (4.1% decrease from 2020).

- The state spent <u>\$16,196,223</u> on WIC in 2022, serving **51,973** people: a **7.5%** decrease in total participants and **6%** increase in spending since 2021.
- <u>409,540</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including **129,350** children.
- <u>35.5%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2019 had children.

## Teens & Youth

- <u>14,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (9%).
- In 2020, there were <u>zero</u> reports of suicide among children aged 10-14 and 72 reports among ages 15-24.
- <u>48</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Nevada in 2020.

## Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Nevada spent <u>\$253,074,236.01</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- **\$114,092,179.69** = from the federal government
- \$138,642,563.84 = from state and local funds.

- <u>3,255</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2021 (9.7% of births).
- <u>3,779</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (11.2% of births).
  - 9.4% of all White babies
  - 15.6% of all Black babies
- <u>1,384</u> births to mothers aged 15–19 in 2021 -- a rate of **15** in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>190</u> infants aged<1yr died in 2021; a rate of **5.6** per 1,000.

Nevada has been a <u>Medicaid expansion</u> state since 01/01/2014

## The significant funding sectors of the <u>\$114,092,179.69</u> in federal funding received in Nevada in 2020:

- \$40,775,340.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$41,000,662.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Nevada's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2021 was \$14,785,258
