North Dakota's Children

Child Maltreatment

- In 2022, North Dakota had <u>2,808</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 2,808 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 1,132 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 6.2 children per 1,000 (46% decrease since 2018).
- Of the 1,132 children, **814** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <**1**years, representing 223 of the 1,132 cases.

Plans for Safe Care

- <u>In 2022, North Dakota</u> did not report the number of infants screened with prenatal substance exposure.
- North Dakota did not report plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

North Dakota <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration and implemented in August 2020.

Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2022



Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2022):

- <u>82%</u> = parents of the child.
- 18% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2022):

- 51% = female; 49% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>4</u> in 2021 to <u>6</u> in 2022.
- North Dakota did not report total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 705 victims and 482 non-victims.

Foster Care and Adoptions

Non-Relative

67.3%

- <u>2,346</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 1,547 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **893** children entered care and **801** exited.
- 225 children were adopted; 431 were waiting to be adopted.
- 2.5% increase in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 1.7% from 2020.

Group Home/Institution 6%

- 931 children were living with non-relatives; 365 stayed with a relative.
- 83 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 5 children classified as runaways.
- <u>1.5%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

North Dakota's Children Child Poverty

- <u>33,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (18% of all children).
- <u>19%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>2,778</u> in 2021 to <u>1,738</u> in 2022 (37.4% decrease).



- <u>10,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (**28.57%** decrease from 2021).
- <u>37,385</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (**22.8**% increase from 2021).
- <u>7,592</u> children in North Dakota were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (35% increase from 2020).

- The state spent <u>\$4,136,207</u> on WIC in 2022, serving **9,848** people: a **0.42%** decrease in total participants and **0.46%** increase in spending since 2021.
- <u>42,290</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 13,690 children.
- <u>41.7%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2019 had children.

Teens & Youth

- <u>2,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (4%).
- In 2020, there were <u>zero</u> reports of suicide among children aged 10-14 and 16 reports among ages 15-24.
- <u>0</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in North Dakota in 2020.

Funding for Child Welfare Services

- North Dakota spent <u>\$51,908,304.14</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- **\$29,743,616** = from the federal government
- \$22,164,688.14 = from state and local funds.

- <u>672</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2021 (6.6% of births).
- <u>966</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (9.6% of births).
 - 8.83% of all White babies
 - 11.62% of all Black babies
- <u>317</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2021 -- a rate of **13** in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>28</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2021; a rate of
 <u>2.8</u> per 1,000.

Medicaid Expansion

North Dakota has been a <u>Medicaid</u> <u>expansion</u> state since 01/01/2014

- \$13,269,899 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$9,394,307 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- North Dakota's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2021 was \$3,703,521
