
Child Maltreatment

• In 2022, Ohio had <u>195,598</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 78,081 were screened in for response by CPS.

- 22,439 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 8.8 children per 1,000 (10.8% decrease since 2018).
- Of the 22,439 children, **16,217** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 3,320 of the 22,439 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2022




Plans for Safe Care

- In 2022, Ohio reported <u>5,359</u> infants screened with prenatal substance exposure.
- Ohio reported **4,701** plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Ohio <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration and implemented in September 2021.



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2022




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2022):

- 62% = parents of the child.
- 38% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2022):

- 45% = female; 55% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>98</u> in 2021 to <u>115</u> in 2022.
- Ohio reported 7 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **15,071** victims and **26,953** non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2022</u>



Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>24,391</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 14,946 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 9,701 children entered care and 9,445 exited.
- 1,543 children were adopted; 3,679 were waiting to be adopted.
- 3.3% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 4.9% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice


- <u>20,149</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 1,676 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 3,287 for Property Crimes.
- 1,362 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>1,476</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **1,746** kids in 2019; 15% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>1,173</u> children exited foster care due to age (7.3% decrease from 2020).
- 8,700 children were living with non-relatives; 3,233 stayed with a relative.
- 1,828 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 166 children classified as runaways.
- <u>3%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






Child Poverty

- <u>662,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (26% of all children).
- <u>23%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>86,601</u> in 2021 to <u>74,703</u> in 2022 (13.7% decrease).
- The state spent \$50,589,350 on WIC in 2022, serving 160,145 people: a 2.5% decrease in total participants and 0.8% decrease in spending since 2021.
- <u>1,391,290</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 386,430 children.
- 40.3% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2019 had children.

Teens & Youth


- <u>37,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (6%).
- In 2020, there were <u>26</u> reports of suicide among children aged 10-14 and <u>221</u> reports among ages 15-24.
- <u>186</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Ohio in 2020.

Health

• 122,000 children had no health insurance in 2022 (12.86% decrease from 2021).

- 1,272,111 children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (2.5% increase from 2020).
- <u>220,188</u> children in Ohio were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (4.3% increase from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>



Funding for Child Welfare Services


- Ohio spent <u>\$1,415,773,422.15</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$535,445,313.08 = from the federal government
- \$876,371,171.15 = from state and local funds.

- <u>11,291</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2021 (8.7% of births).
- <u>13,737</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (10.6% of births).
 - 9.63% of all White babies
 - 15.07% of all Black babies
- <u>5,790</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2021 -- a rate of **16** in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>913</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2021; a rate of 7 per 1,000.

Ohio has been a Medicaid expansion state since 01/01/2014

Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$535,445,313.08 in federal funding received in Ohio in 2020:

- \$222,540,668.66 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$185,674,249 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Ohio's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2021 was \$126,639,428
