
#### Child Maltreatment

# • In 2022, Oklahoma had <u>81,428</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, <u>33,529</u> were screened in for response by CPS.

- 13,546 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 14.2 children per 1,000 (11.8% decrease since 2018).
- Of the 13,546 children, **10,525** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = **<1years**, representing 2,063 of the 13,546 cases.

#### Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2022




#### Plans for Safe Care

- In 2022, Oklahoma reported <u>2,331</u> infants screened with prenatal substance exposure.
- Oklahoma reported 48 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Oklahoma <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration that was implemented on September 2021.



#### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2022




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2022):

- 80% = parents of the child.
- 20% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2022):

- 51% = female; 49% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>15</u> in 2021 to <u>29</u> in 2022.
- Oklahoma reported 8 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 12,280 victims and 30,944 non-victims.


## Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2022</u>



#### Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>10,983</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 7,013 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **3,509** children entered care and **3,970** exited.
- 1,629 children were adopted; 3,393 were waiting to be adopted.
- 6.2% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also increased by 9% from 2021.

#### Duration in Care, 2021





#### Juvenile Justice

- 7,195 total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 552 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 1,513 for Property Crimes.
- 1,022 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>261</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **345** kids in 2019; 24% decline).

### Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>203</u> children exited foster care due to age (23% increase from 2020).
- 3,629 children were living with non-relatives; 2,388 stayed with a relative.
- 473 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 44 children classified as runaways.
- <u>4%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

The decline since 2019 of children living in juvenile correction facilities.






### Child Poverty

- <u>260,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (27% of all children).
- <u>27%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>11,240</u> in 2021 to <u>8,168</u> in 2022 (27.3% decrease).
- The state spent \$21,721,647 on WIC in 2022, serving 63,731 people: a 2.04% increase in total participants and 1.08% increase in spending since 2021.
- <u>561,640</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 182,930 children.
- 45.2% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2019 had children.

#### **Child Poverty Over Time**




### Health

- <u>73,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (2.67% decrease from 2021).
- <u>515,801</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (2.3% increase from 2020).
- <u>237,437</u> children in Oklahoma were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (8.2% increase from 2020).

#### Teens & Youth

- <u>19,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (8%).
- In 2020, there were <u>18</u> reports of suicide among children aged 10-14 and **130** reports among ages 15-24.
- <u>73</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Oklahoma in 2020.


### Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>

# Funding for Child Welfare Services


- Oklahoma spent <u>\$426,430,125.45</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$220,720,870 = from the federal government
- \$199,617,326 = from state and local funds.

- <u>4,253</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2021 (8.8% of births).
- <u>5,772</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (11.9% of births).
  - 11.6% of all White babies
  - 16.3% of all Black babies
- <u>3,189</u> births to mothers aged 15–19 in 2021 a rate of **24** in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>336</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2021; a rate of **6.9** per 1,000.

#### **Medicaid Expansion**

Oklahoma has been a <u>Medicaid</u> <u>expansion</u> state since 07/01/2021

#### Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$220,720,870 in federal funding received in Oklahoma in 2020:

- \$52,787,516 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$92,688,413 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Oklahoma's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2021 was \$33,013,691
