## Washington's Children

## Child Maltreatment

- In 2022, Washington had $\mathbf{1 0 9}, \mathbf{6 1 9}$ total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 41,645 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 3,389 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 2.1 children per 1,000 ( $24.7 \%$ decrease since 2018).
- Of the 3,389 children, 1,552 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims $=<1$ years, representing 353 of the 3,389 cases.

## Plans for Safe Care

- In 2022, Washington reported $\underline{253}$ infants screened with prenatal substance exposure.
- Washington reported 92 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Washington has a Family First plan approved by the administration.

Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2022


Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2022):

- $\underline{85 \%}=$ parents of the child.
- $15 \%=$ non-parents or unknown relationship.
Child victims (2022):
- $55 \%=$ female; $45 \%=$ male.
- Child fatalities decreased from $\underline{19}$ in 2021 to $\underline{31}$ in 2022.
- Washington reported 20 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 2,109 victims and 3,800 non-victims.

## Foster Care and Adoptions

- 12,349 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 8,049 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 3,518 children entered care and 4,300 exited.
- 864 children were adopted; 2,450 were waiting to be adopted.
- $9.5 \%$ decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system decreased by $19.8 \%$ from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021


The decrease since 2020 in 4240 children transitioning from foster care to independence.

## Juvenile Justice

- $\underline{10,101}$ total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 168 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 1,905 for Property Crimes.
- 852 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 396 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 693 kids in 2019; 42.9\% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021

Runaways 1.4\%


- In 2021, 106 children exited foster care due to age ( $42.4 \%$ decrease from 2020).
- 3,413 children were living with nonrelatives; 3,068 stayed with a relative.
- 341 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 100 children classified as runaways.
- $4 \%$ of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

## Washington's Children <br> Child Poverty

- 397,000 children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 ( $24 \%$ of all children).
- $31 \%$ of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients
 2022 ( $9.95 \%$ increase).

## Health

- 48,000 children had no health insurance in 2022 ( $12.7 \%$ decrease from 2021).
- 679,000 children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2022 ( $\mathbf{3 . 1 \%}$ decrease from 2021).
- $\underline{81,870}$ children in Washington were in the state Children Health Insurance
Program (CHIP) in 2021 ( $1.9 \%$ increase from 2020).
- The state spent $\$ 44, \mathbf{3 4 6}, \mathbf{5 8 0}$ on WIC in 2022, serving 121,676 people: a $1.03 \%$ decrease in total participants and $0.4 \%$ decrease in spending since 2021.
- 688,170 people were food insecure in 2021, including 197,550 children.
- 30\% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2019 had children.


## Teens \& Youth

- $\underline{28,000}$ youth ( $16-19 \mathrm{yrs}$ ) were not in school nor working in 2022 ( $8 \%$ ).
- In 2020 , there were 18 reports of suicide among children aged 10-14 and 154 reports among ages 15-24.
- $\mathbf{6 6}$ children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Washington in 2020.

## Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Washington spent $\$ \mathbf{3 9 8}, \mathbf{0 8 5}, \underline{527.05}$ on child welfare services in 2020.
- Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- $\$ 216,992,482=$ from the federal government
- $\$ 181,093,045.05=$ from state and local funds.
- $\underline{5}, \mathbf{8 3 0}$ low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2021 ( $7 \%$ of births).
- 7,422 preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 ( $8.9 \%$ of births).
- 8.1\% of all White babies
- $10.5 \%$ of all Black babies
- $\underline{2}, \underline{276}$ births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2021 -a rate of 10 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- 360 infants aged $<1 \mathrm{yr}$ died in 2021 -- a rate of 4.3 in every 1,000 infants.

- Washington's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2021 was $\$ 42,392,622$
