
#### Child Maltreatment

## • In 2023, Alabama had <u>26,738</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **26,397** were screened in for response by CPS.

- 11,636 were child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 10.3 children per 1,000 (0.4% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 11,636 children, **9,194** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 2,013 of the 11,636 cases.

#### Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




#### Workforce

There are 4,110 child, family, and school social workers in Alabama with a median wage of \$22.91 (compared to Alabama's minimum wage: \$7.25)



#### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 72% = parents of the child.
- 28% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 49% = female; 50% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>38</u> in 2022 to <u>43</u> in 2023.
- Alabama reported 6 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 7,047 victims and 4,508 non-victims.


### Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



### Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>8,538</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 5,260 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **3,350** children entered care and **3,278** exited.
- 772 children were adopted; 1,598 were waiting to be adopted.
- 1.5% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 2.8% from 2021.

#### Duration in Care, 2021





#### Juvenile Justice


- <u>103</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 0 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 70 for Property Crimes.
- 9 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>678</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **798** kids in 2019; 15% decline).

## Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>340</u> children exited foster care due to age (2.9% decrease from 2020).
- 3,423 children were living with non-relatives; 797 stayed with a relative.
- 738 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 53 children classified as runaways.
- <u>4%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






# Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Alabama spent **\$281,380,539.00** on child welfare services in 2020
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$143,928,938.00 = from the federal government
- \$137,451,601.00 = from state and local funds


#### Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$143,928,938.00 in federal funding received in Alabama in 2020:

- \$39,518,839.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$25,676,452.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Alabama's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$33,465,551

#### Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>21%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 7% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 24% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$8,771</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$8,186 annual cost of home-based infant care






#### Child Poverty


- <u>324,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2023 (29% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients rose from <u>12,888</u> in 2022 to <u>12,980</u> in 2023 (0.8% increase).

### Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>




#### **HOUSING**

- <u>3,350</u> children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (1.45%)
- 34.6% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>24%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>54,674</u> total Alabama residents living in public housing



- The state spent \$30,506,745 on WIC in 2023, serving 111,154 people: a 2.3% increase in total participants and 19.7% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>884,270</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including 258,560 children.
- <u>47.6%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

#### Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Alabama, <u>2020</u>








#### Health

- <u>6,032</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (10.4% of births).
- <u>7,461</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2022 (12.84% of births).
  - 17.10% of all White babies
  - 11.42% of all Black babies
- <u>3,417</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 23 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- 445 infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of 7.7 per 1,000.

### Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2022</u>




#### Medicaid Expansion

Alabama is not a Medicaid expansion state.

#### **Maternal Mortality**

- 112 Alabama women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Alabama, there is **39** maternal deaths
- 46,000 children had no health insurance in 2023 (24% increase from 2022).
- <u>542,000</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2023 (0.18% decrease from 2022).
- <u>204,696</u> children in Alabama were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (2.56% decrease from 2020).

### Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2021








#### Zero to Three

- 51.8% of babies live above low-income
- 25.2% of babies live at low income
- 23.0% of babies live in poverty
- 12.4% of babies live in deep poverty
- 79.5% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

#### Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Alabama reported <u>507</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Alabama reported 241 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Alabama <u>does not have a Family</u>
<u>First plan</u> approved by the administration.


#### Teens & Youth

- <u>19,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (7%)
- 84 children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Alabama in 2020.

#### Mental Health

- <u>30,263</u> children received mental health treatment in Alabama in 2022 (1.6%)
- In 2022 there were <u>9.0</u> deaths from suicide per 100,000 adolescents aged 15–19 in Alabama.

### Treatment Type for Youth with Substance Use Disorder, <u>2023</u>



- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>43,165</u> children in Alabama (2.9% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>360</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
