
### Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Alaska had <u>20,146</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **6,452** were screened in for response by CPS.
- 2,424 were child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 13.8 children per 1,000 (20.8% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 2,424 children, **1,544** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 305 of the 2,424 cases.

#### Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




### Workforce

There are <u>1,610</u> child, family, and school social workers in Alaska with a median wage of \$31.65 (compared to Alaska's minimum wage: <u>\$11.73</u>)



#### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




#### Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 84% = parents of the child.
- 15% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

#### Child victims (2023):

- 49% = female; 51% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>8</u> in 2022 to <u>5</u> in 2023.
- Alaska reported 0 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 1,347 victims and 356 non-victims.


### Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>



### Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>3,943</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 2,690 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **1,151** children entered care and **1,253** exited.
- 288 children were adopted; 1,014 were waiting to be adopted.
- **4.9**% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by **15**% from 2021.

#### Duration in Care, 2021





### Juvenile Justice


- <u>1,433</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 11 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 321 for Property Crimes.
- 156 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>156</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **255** kids in 2019; 39% decline).

### Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>107</u> children exited foster care due to age (1.8% decrease from 2020).
- 874 children were living with non-relatives; 739 stayed with a relative.
- 109 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 18 children classified as runaways.
- 4% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






# Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Alaska spent <u>\$165,083,541.50</u> on child welfare services in 2020
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$66,170,473.50 = from the federal government
- \$95,708,100 = from state and local funds






The significant funding sectors of the \$66,170,473.50 in federal funding received in Alaska in 2020:

- \$21,755,470.31 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$26,024,301.13 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Alaska's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$6,589,385

### Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>22%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 7% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 13% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$11,760</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$9,624 annual cost of home-based infant care






### Child Poverty


- <u>52,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2023 (30% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>3,853</u> in 2022 to <u>2,967</u> in 2023 (<u>23</u>% decrease).

### Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>




### **HOUSING**

- <u>797</u> children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (2.14%)
- 25.3% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>28%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>2,994</u> total Alaska residents living in public housing



- The state spent \$5,975,244 on WIC in 2023, serving 13,806 people: a 0.32% increase in total participants and 2.4% decrease in spending since 2022.
- <u>93,620</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including 30,110 children.
- 41.3% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

#### Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Alaska, <u>2020</u>








### Health

- <u>602</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (6.7% of births).
- <u>939</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2022 (10.04% of births).
  - 14.52% of all White babies
  - 7.89% of all Black babies
- <u>342</u> births to mothers aged 15–19 in 2023 a rate of 23 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>66</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of **7.3** per 1,000.

### Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, 2022




#### **Medicaid Expansion**

Alaska is a <u>Medicaid expansion</u> state.

#### **Maternal Mortality**

- 12 Alaska women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Alaska, there is an unknown number of maternal deaths
- <u>13,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2023 (13.3% decrease from 2022).
- <u>71,000</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2023 (1.4% increase from 2022).
- 14,951 children in Alaska were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (29% decrease from 2020).

### Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








### Zero to Three

- 73.8% of babies live above low-income
- 14.0% of babies live at low income
- 12.1% of babies live in poverty
- 6.3% of babies live in deep poverty
- 69.8% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

#### Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Alaska reported <u>0</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Plans of safe care for screened-in infants were not needed.

Alaska does not have a Family First plan approved by the administration.


### Teens & Youth

- 4,000 youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (10%)
- 14 children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Alaska in 2020.

### Mental Health

- <u>3,584</u> children received mental health treatment in Alaska in 2022 (**0.2**%)
- In 2022 there were <u>30.2</u> deaths from suicide per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Alaska.

#### Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>7,834</u> children in Alaska (3.1% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>39</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
