
#### Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Arizona had 90,832 total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 44,804 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 11,624 were child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 7.3 children per 1,000 (9.5% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 11,624 children, 6,614 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 2,627 of the 11,624 cases.

#### Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




#### Workforce

There are 7,690 child, family, and school social workers in Arizona with a median wage of \$23.93 (compared to Arizona's minimum wage: \$14.35)



#### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 73% = parents of the child.
- 27% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 49% = female; 51% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from 38 in 2022 to 43 in 2023.
- Arizona reported 1 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 8,263 victims and 8,571 non-victims.


#### Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>



#### Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>20,565</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 12,358 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **6,874** children entered care and **8,207** exited.
- 2,371 children were adopted; 3,015 were waiting to be adopted.
- 17% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 19.9% from 2021.

#### Duration in Care, 2021




The increase since 2020 in children transitioning from foster care to independence.

#### Juvenile Justice


- <u>18,502</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 1,299 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 2,839 for Property Crimes.
- 2,970 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>351</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **606** kids in 2019; 42% decline).

### Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>428</u> children exited foster care due to age (15.6% decrease from 2020).
- 3,409 children were living with non-relatives; 7,160 stayed with a relative.
- 2,288 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 193 children classified as runaways.
- <u>5%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






# Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Arizona spent <u>\$945,178,337.74</u> on child welfare services in 2020
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$560,529,997 = from the federal government
- \$377,472,825 = from state and local funds


#### Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$560,529,997 in federal funding received in Arizona in 2020:

- \$132,731,565 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$168,279,649 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Arizona's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$59,572,913

### Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>25%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 8% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 14% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$14,040</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$8,840 annual cost of home-based infant care






#### Child Poverty

- <u>387,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2023 (24% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>11,906</u> in 2022 to <u>10,675</u> in 2023 (10% decrease).


### Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>



#### **HOUSING**


- 4,804 children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (1.54%)
- 41.3% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- 29% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>9,725</u> total Arizona residents living in public housing

#### Child Poverty Over Time



- The state spent \$46,072,833 on WIC in 2023, serving 149,248 people: a 5.82% increase in total participants and 7.12% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>963,130</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including 293,950 children.
- 46.3% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

#### Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Arizona, <u>2020</u>






#### Health

- <u>6,291</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (**8.1**% of births).
- <u>7,729</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2022 (9.85% of births).
  - 9.13% of all White babies
  - 12.71% of all Black babies
- <u>3,461</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of **14** in every 1,000 teen girls.
- 430 infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of 5.5 per 1,000.

#### Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2022</u>




#### **Medicaid Expansion**

Arizona is a <u>Medicaid expansion</u> state.

#### **Maternal Mortality**

- 118 Arizona women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Arizona, there is **30** maternal deaths
- <u>145,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2023 (2.7% increase from 2022).
- <u>612,000</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2023 (2% decrease from 2022).
- <u>134,122</u> children in Arizona were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (12% increase from 2020).

### Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2021








#### Zero to Three

- 56.6% of babies live above low-income
- 24.1% of babies live at low income
- 19.3% of babies live in poverty
- 10.1% of babies live in deep poverty
- 72.6% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

#### Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Arizona reported <u>472</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Arizona reported 303 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Arizona <u>does have a Family First</u> <u>plan</u> approved by the administration.


#### Teens & Youth

- <u>33,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (8%)
- **99** children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Arizona in 2020.

#### Mental Health

- <u>128,647</u> children received mental health treatment in Arizona in 2022 (6.9%)
- In 2022 there were <u>14.3</u> deaths from suicide per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Arizona.

#### Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>50,550</u> children in Arizona (2.3% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>2,772</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
