
### Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Colorado had <u>111,364</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 31,403 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 9,868 were child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 8.1 children per 1,000 (19.4% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 9,868 children, **6,753** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 1,208 of the 9,868 cases.


#### Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



There are <u>7,560</u> child, family, and school social workers in Colorado with a median wage of \$31.10 (compared to Colorado's minimum wage: <u>\$14.42</u>)



#### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 73% = parents of the child.
- 27% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 49% = female; 51% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>40</u> in 2022 to <u>32</u> in 2023.
- Colorado reported 0 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **1,957** victims and **744** non-victims.


# Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>



### Foster Care and Adoptions

- 7,155 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- **4,133** in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 3,097 children entered care and **3.022** exited.
- 745 children were adopted; 823 were waiting to be adopted.
- 2.7% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 5.7% from 2021.

#### Duration in Care, 2021




The decrease since 2020 10.5% in children transitioning from foster care to independence.

#### Juvenile Justice


- 16,885 total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 1,565 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 3,062 for Property Crimes.
- 1,920 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 462 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 753 kids in 2019; 38.6% decline).

#### Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, 171 children exited foster care due to age (10.5% decrease from 2020).
- 2,217 children were living with nonrelatives; 1,097 stayed with a relative.
- 490 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 109 children classified as runaways.
- 3% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

#### Adoption, 2020




The decline since 38.6% 2019 of children living in juvenile correction facilities.





# Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Colorado spent \$455,074,837.71 on child welfare services in 2020
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$163,826,078.41 = from the federal government
- \$285,140,828.30 = from state and local funds




Title IV-E 67.9%

The significant funding sectors of the \$163,826,078.41 in federal funding received in Colorado in 2020:

- \$72,335,968 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$19,818,895 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Colorado's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$26,924,697

### Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>34%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 16% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 11% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$19,573</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$12,750 annual cost of home-based infant care






### Child Poverty


- <u>263,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2023 (22% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients rose from <u>28,475</u> in 2022 to <u>29,403</u> in 2023 (3% increase).

### **HOUSING**


- 4,529 children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (1.84%)
- 32.7% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- 30% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- 11,913 total Colorado residents living in public housing




- The state spent \$26,049,580 on WIC in 2023, serving 84,967 people: an 8.7% increase in total participants and 0.7% decrease in spending since 2022.
- <u>671,340</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including 172,280 children.
- <u>42.8%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Rural Population








### Health

- <u>5,973</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (**9.7**% of births).
- <u>6,258</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2022 (10.04% of births).
  - 9.35% of all White babies
  - 14.30% of all Black babies
- 1,999 births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 11 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>281</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of **4.6** per 1,000.

# Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, 2022




#### **Medicaid Expansion**

Colorado is a <u>Medicaid expansion</u> state.

#### **Maternal Mortality**

- <u>50</u> Colorado women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Colorado, there is **16** maternal deaths
- <u>53,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2023 (14% decrease from 2022).
- 440,000 children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2023 (2% increase from 2022).
- <u>150,717</u> children in Colorado were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (8% decrease from 2020).

# Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








### Zero to Three

- 67.5% of babies live above low-income
- 19.3% of babies live at low income
- 13.2% of babies live in poverty
- 6.7% of babies live in deep poverty
- 73.7% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

#### Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Colorado reported <u>18</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Colorado reported 1 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Colorado <u>does have a Family First</u> <u>plan</u> approved by the administration.


### Teens & Youth

- <u>18,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (6%)
- 79 children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Colorado in 2020.

### Mental Health

- <u>33,602</u> children received mental health treatment in Colorado in 2022 (1.8%)
- In 2022 there were <u>19.4</u> deaths from suicide per 100,000 adolescents aged 15–19 in Colorado.

# Treatment Type for Youth with Substance Use Disorder, <u>2023</u>



- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>65,918</u> children in Colorado (3.2% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>2,290</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
