
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Florida had <u>246,778</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 139,213 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 22,842 were child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 5.2 children per 1,000 (30.06% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 22,842 children, **10,231** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 3,432 of the 22,842 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




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There are <u>13,930</u> child, family, and school social workers in Florida with a median wage of \$24.12 (compared to Florida's minimum wage: <u>\$13.00</u>)



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Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 71% = parents of the child.
- 29% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 49% = female; 51% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>86</u> in 2022 to <u>75</u> in 2023.
- Florida reported 0 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **8,270** victims and **9,858** non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>34,120</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 22,493 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **11,088** children entered care and **11,627** exited.
- 3,931 children were adopted; 8,615 were waiting to be adopted.
- 4.3% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 0.2% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice


- <u>44,634</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 0 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 11,457 for Property Crimes.
- 3,881 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>1,221</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 2,001 kids in 2019; 39% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>



- In 2021, <u>750</u> children exited foster care due to age (0.4% increase from 2020).
- 10,339 children were living with non-relatives; 9,813 stayed with a relative.
- 2,000 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 180 children classified as runaways.
- 4% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

- Florida spent <u>\$1,369,836,721</u> on child welfare services in 2020
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$687,573,574 = from the federal government
- \$673,556,250 = from state and local funds

Federal Funding Sources, 2020



- \$138,332,098 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$148,041,511 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Florida's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$159,845,474

Child Care & Early Learning



- 24% of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 10% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 18% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$12,639</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$10,881 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty


- 1,125,000 children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2023 (26% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients rose from <u>44,596</u> in 2022 to <u>72,711</u> in 2023 (63% increase).

HOUSING

- <u>28,407</u> children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (3.24%)
- 0% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>38%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- 46,488 total Florida residents living in public housing



- The state spent \$110,244,872 on WIC in 2023, serving 422,353 people: a 2.8% increase in total participants and 4.3% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>2,935,330</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including 819,940 children.
- <u>38.3%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.



Health

- <u>20,003</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (9.0% of births).
- 23,702 preterm births (<37wks) in 2022 (10.57% of births).
 - 9.40% of all White babies
 - 14.84% of all Black babies
- <u>8,108</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 13 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- 1,336 infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of **6.0** per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, 2022




Medicaid Expansion

Florida is not a Medicaid expansion state.

Maternal Mortality

- 263 Florida women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Florida, there is 24 maternal deaths
- 351.000 children had no health insurance in 2023 (4.5% increase from 2022).
- <u>1,827,000</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2023 (1% decrease from 2022).
- 399,577 children in Florida were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (13% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2021








Zero to Three

- 56.9% of babies live above low-income
- 24.0% of babies live at low income
- 19.2% of babies live in poverty
- 9.2% of babies live in deep poverty
- 72.6% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Florida reported <u>0</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Plans of safe care for screened-in infants were not needed.

Florida <u>does have a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>7,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (7%)
- 239 children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Florida in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>56,418</u> children received mental health treatment in Florida in 2022 (3.0%)
- In 2022 there were <u>9.0</u> deaths from suicide per 100,000 adolescents aged 15–19 in Florida.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>115,010</u> children in Florida (1.9% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>5,466</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
