
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Iowa had <u>53,004</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. All referrals were screened in for response by CPS.
- 10,789 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 14.8 children per 1,000 (7.4% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 10,789 children, 7,290 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 1,693 of the 10,789 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




Workforce

There are 3,020 children, family, and school social workers in Iowa with a mean wage of \$25.26 (compared to Iowa's minimum wage: \$7.25)



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 79.6% = parents of the child.
- 20.4% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 50.4% = female; 49.5% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>18</u> in 2022 to <u>14</u> in 2023.
- Iowa reported **14** total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 12,800 victims and 41,395 non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment



Foster Care and Adoptions

- 6,797 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- **4,048** in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 2,699 children entered care and **2.749** exited.
- 960 children were adopted; 985 were waiting to be adopted.
- 2.3% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system increased by 4.9% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice


- 8,901 total arrests for children under 18 in
- 964 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 1,891 for Property Crimes.
- 890 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 267 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 441 kids in 2019; 39.5% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>



- In 2021, <u>178</u> children exited foster care due to age (7.8% increase from 2020).
- 1,631 children were living with nonrelatives; 1,751 stayed with a relative.
- 430 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 46 children classified as runaways.
- 3% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

Adoption, 2020




The decline since 39.5% 2019 of children living in juvenile correction facilities.





Funding for Child Welfare Services


- Iowa spent <u>\$290,288,636.74</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$156,834,940.62 = from the federal government.
- \$127,824,510.00 = from state and local funds.



The significant funding sectors of the \$156,834,940.62 in federal funding received in Iowa in 2020:

- \$20,155,837.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$41,838,503.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Iowa's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$28,306,441

Child Care & Early Learning



- 33% of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 13% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 14% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- \$12,168 annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$8,176 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty

- <u>142,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2023 (20% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>11,556</u> in 2022 to <u>10,590</u> in 2023 (8.4% decrease).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, 2023



HOUSING


- 1,836 children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (1.24%)
- 27.8% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- 20% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>5,767</u> total Iowa residents living in public housing

<u>Child Poverty Over Time</u>



- The state spent \$40,296,948 on WIC in 2024, serving 61,683 people: a 7% increase in total participants and an 8.1% increase in spending since 2023.
- <u>329,779</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including 115,404 children.
- 40.7% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2019 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Iowa, <u>2020</u>








Health

- <u>2,742</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (**7.6**% of births).
- <u>3,731</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2022 (10.23%).
 - 9.90% of all White babies
 - 11.24% of all Black babies
- 1,299 births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 12 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>181</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023 -- a rate of 5 per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2022</u>




Medicaid Expansion

Iowa has been a <u>Medicaid expansion</u> state since 01/01/2014

Maternal Mortality

- 36 Iowa women died while pregnant or within 42 days post-pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents.
- For every 100,000 live births in Iowa, there are **20** maternal deaths.
 - <u>26,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2023 (7.7% decrease from 2022).
 - 291,000 children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2023 (6.5% increase from 2022).
 - <u>91,640</u> children in Iowa were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (9.9% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








Zero to Three

- 64.5% of babies live above low-income
- 23.1% of babies live at low income
- 12.4% of babies live in poverty
- 6.6% of babies live in deep poverty
- 81.9% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

In 2023, Iowa reported <u>40</u> infants screened with prenatal substance exposure.

Iowa <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>20,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (5%)
- 10 children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Iowa in 2022.

Mental Health

- <u>85,441</u> children received mental health treatment in Iowa in 2022 (4.6%)
- In 2022, there were <u>13.1</u> deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Iowa.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>14,283</u> children in Iowa (1.4% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>8,576</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for substance use disorder
