
### Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Kentucky had <u>95,131</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. All referrals were screened in for response by CPS.
- 14,484 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 14.2 children per 1,000 (28.0% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 14,484 children, 9,129 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 1,802 of the 14,484 cases.

#### Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




### Workforce

There are 7,140 children, family, and school social workers in Kentucky with a mean wage of \$22.30 (compared to Kentucky's minimum wage: \$7.25)



#### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




#### Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 58.7% = parents of the child.
- 40.3% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

#### Child victims (2023):

- 50.1% = female; 49.3% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>12</u> in 2022 to 5 in 2023.
- Kentucky reported 10 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 11,309 victims and 862 non-victims.


### Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims 2023



### Foster Care and Adoptions

- 13,227 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- **7,905** in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 4,963 children entered care and 5.322 exited.
- 1,339 children were adopted; 3,038 were waiting to be adopted.
- 5.9% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system increased by 10.5% from 2021.

#### Duration in Care, 2021





### Juvenile Justice


- 4,6798 total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 164 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 1,193 for Property Crimes.
- 398 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 297 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 588 kids in 2019; 2.5% decline).

#### Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>



- In 2021, 580 children exited foster care due to age (15.7% increase from 2020).
- 5,582 children were living with nonrelatives; 1,189 stayed with a relative.
- 843 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 113 children classified as runaways.
- 6% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

### Adoption, 2020




The decline since **49.5%** 2019 of children living in juvenile correction facilities.





# Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Kentucky spent <u>\$612,056,512.22</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$237,658,854.48 = from the federal government.
- \$360,238,312.74 = from state and local funds.





- \$35,290,088.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$72,469,096.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Kentucky's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$21,601,463

### Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>34%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 10% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 13% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- \$9,685 annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$7,345 annual cost of home-based infant care






### Child Poverty


- <u>297,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2023 (29% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients increased from <u>23,541</u> in 2022 to <u>24,119</u> in 2023 (2.4% increase).

### Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>




### **HOUSING**

- <u>6,804</u> children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (3.26%)
- 33% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- 23% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>36,716</u> total Kentucky residents living in public housing



- The state spent \$76,001,381 on WIC in 2024, serving 105,447 people: a 8.7% decrease in total participants and an 7.3% increase in spending since 2023.
- <u>676,191</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including **220,105** children.
- 40.6% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2019 had children.

### Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Kentucky, <u>2020</u>








### Health

- 4,597 low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) were born in 2023 (8.8% of births).
- <u>6,119</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2022 (11.7%).
  - 13.85% of all White babies
  - 11.4% of all Black babies
- 2,976 births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 21 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>343</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023 -- a rate of 7 per 1,000.

### Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, 2022




### **Medicaid Expansion**

Kentucky became a Medicaid expansion state on 1/1/2014.

### **Maternal Mortality**

- <u>91</u> Kentucky women died while pregnant or within 42 days post-pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents.
- For every 100,000 live births in Kentucky, there are **35** maternal deaths.
  - <u>37,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2023 (19.5% decrease from 2022).
  - 498,000 children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2023 (no change 2022).
  - 123,953 children in Kentucky were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (22.4% increase from 2020).

### Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>






### Zero to Three

- 53% of babies live above low-income
- 23.4% of babies live at low income
- 23.6% of babies live in poverty
- 12.9% of babies live in deep poverty
- 79.8% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

#### Prenatal Substance Exposure

In 2023, Kentucky reported <u>389</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.

Kentucky <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


### Teens & Youth

- <u>14,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (6%)
- <u>39</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Kentucky in 2022.

### Mental Health

- 48,356 children received mental health treatment in Kentucky in 2022 (2.6%)
- In 2022, there were 12.2 deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Kentucky.

#### Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>58,393</u> children in Kentucky (4.0% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>5,240</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
