
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Maryland had <u>63,893</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those referrals, 17,668 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 6,704 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 4.5 children per 1,000 (20.7% decrease since 2019).
- Of the **6,704** children, **4,187** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 438 of the 6,704 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




Workforce

There are <u>4.030</u> children, family, and school social workers in Maryland with a mean wage of \$34.55 (compared to Maryland's minimum wage: \$15.00)





Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- <u>58.9%</u> = parents of the child.
- 41% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 52.5% = female; 37.7% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>689</u> in 2022 to <u>83</u> in 2023.
- Maryland reported 0 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **6,563** victims and **16,290** non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



Foster Care and Adoptions

- 5,334 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- **3,609** in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 1,541 children entered care and **1.725** exited.
- 252 children were adopted; 372 were waiting to be adopted.
- .7% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system also increased by 14.6% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021




The increase since 2020 37.4% in children transitioning from foster care to independence.

Juvenile Justice


- 18,857 total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 990 for Disorderly Conduct.
- **3,950** for Property Crimes.
- 1,831 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 198 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 495 kids in 2019; 60% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>



- In 2021, 474 children exited foster care due to age (37.4% increase from 2020).
- 1,207 children were living with nonrelatives; 1,592 stayed with a relative.
- 440 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 50 children classified as runaways.
- 6% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Maryland spent \$577,970,836.00 on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$203,719,323.00 = from the federal government
- \$371,497,246.00 = from state and local funds.


Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$203,719,323.00 in federal funding received in Maryland in 2020:


- \$59,375,198.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$21,586,899.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Maryland's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$52,544,253

Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>22%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 8% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 8% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- \$19,906 annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$14,320 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty

- <u>294,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (22% of all children).
- 30% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>55,922</u> in 2021 to <u>41,268</u> in 2022 (26.2% decrease).


Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, 2023



HOUSING


- <u>5,668</u> children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (2.04%)
- 24.1% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- 29% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>17,748</u> total Maryland residents living in public housing

Child Poverty Over Time



- The state spent \$79,103,752 on WIC in 2023, serving 122,099 people: a 2.8% increase in total participants and an 24.16% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>672,152</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including **217,897** children.
- <u>37.1%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2019 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Maryland, <u>2020</u>






Health

- <u>5,623</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (**8.6**% of births).
- <u>7,296</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (10.69% of births).
 - 9.27% of all White babies
 - 13.34% of all Black babies
- 2,105 births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 11 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>374</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2021; a rate of **6.0** per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




Medicaid Expansion

Maryland became a <u>Medicaid</u> expansion state on 1/1/2014.


Maternal Mortality

- 74 Maryland women died while pregnant or within 42 days post-pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents.
- For every 100,000 live births in Maryland, there are 21 maternal deaths.
 - <u>60,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (3.23% decrease from 2021).
 - 507,000 children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2022 (2.87% decrease from 2021).
 - <u>118,616</u> children in Maryland were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (9.95% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








Zero to Three

- 69.5% of babies live above low-income
- 16.5% of babies live at low income
- 14.% of babies live in poverty
- 7% of babies live in deep poverty
- 81.2% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Prenatal Substance Exposure

Maryland <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>19,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (6%)
- <u>73</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Maryland in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>72,543</u> children received mental health treatment in Maryland in 2022 (3.9%)
- In 2022, there were <u>8.2</u> deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Maryland.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>25,536</u> children in Maryland (1.3% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>1,089</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
