
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Massachusetts had <u>83,461</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, <u>37,685</u> were screened in for response by CPS.
- 21,710 were child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 16.2 children per 1,000 (13.3% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 21,710 children, 12,161 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 2,084 of the 21,710 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




There are 10,380 child, family, and school social workers in Massachusetts with a median wage of \$31.13 (compared to Massachusetts' minimum wage: \$15.00)





Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 79% = parents of the child.
- 20% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 50.2% = female; 47.5% = male.
- Massachusetts did not report any child fatalities from 2022-2023.
- Massachusetts reported 302 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 23,976 victims and 52,624 non-victims.

Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>12,906</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- **8,824** in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **3,836** children entered care and **4,082** exited.
- 835 children were adopted; 3,342 were waiting to be adopted.
- 4% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also increased by 10.6% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice

- 4,141 total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 167 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 652 for Property Crimes.
- 110 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>204</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **288** kids in 2019; 29.2% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>623</u> children exited foster care due to age (16.2% decrease from 2020).
- 3,537 children were living with non-relatives; 2,539 stayed with a relative.
- 1,384 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 95 children classified as runaways.
- 4.5% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Massachusetts spent <u>\$1,053,787,651.00</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$289,816,360.31 = from the federal government
- \$757,604,423.69 = from state and local funds.


Federal Funding Sources, <u>2020</u>



The significant funding sectors of the \$289,816,360.31 in federal funding received in Massachusetts in 2020:

- \$123,790,999.22 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$34,584,209.10 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Massachusetts' sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2021 was \$78,965,341

Child Care & Early Learning



- 33% of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 10% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 12% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
 - <u>\$24,005</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
 - \$15,129 annual cost of home-based infant care





Child Poverty Over Time


- <u>317,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (24% of all children).
- 32% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients rose from <u>56,841</u> in 2021 to <u>75,706</u> in 2022 (33.19% increase).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>




HOUSING

- <u>6,245</u> children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (2.28%)
- 28.4% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- 34% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>52,012</u> total Massachusetts residents living in public housing



- The state spent \$28,996,845 on WIC in 2023, serving 123,522 people: a 6.8% increase in total participants and 6.5% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>713,870</u> people were food insecure in 2022, including 169,800 children.
- <u>30.9%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Massachusetts, <u>2020</u>






Health

- <u>5,081</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (**7.6**% of births).
- <u>6,176</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (9% of births).
 - 8.41% of all White babies
 - 11.37% of all Black babies
- <u>1,311</u> births to mothers aged 15–19 in 2023 a rate of **6** in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>227</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of **3.0** per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




Medicaid Expansion

Massachusetts has been a Medicaid expansion state since 01/01/2014.

Maternal Mortality

- <u>56</u> Massachusetts women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Massachusetts, there is **16** maternal deaths
- <u>22,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (22.2% increase from 2021).
- <u>497,000</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2022 (4.24% decrease from 2021).
- <u>222,537</u> children in Massachusetts were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (1.59% increase from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2021








Zero to Three

- 74.5% of babies live above low-income
- 12.8% of babies live at low income
- 12.7% of babies live in poverty
- 7.3% of babies live in deep poverty
- 72.2% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Massachusetts reported <u>6,048</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Massachusetts reported **5,874** plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Massachusetts <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.

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
Teens & Youth

- <u>19,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (5%)
- **Zero** children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Massachusetts in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>2,150</u> children received mental health treatment in Massachusetts in 2022 (0.1%)
- In 2022 there were <u>5.9</u> deaths from suicide per 100,000 adolescents aged 15–19 in Massachusetts.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of 29,350 children in Massachusetts (1.5% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>3,356</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
