
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Minnesota had <u>82,131</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **24,823** were screened in for response by CPS.
- **4,988** child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of **3.8** children per 1,000 (**26.4**% decrease since 2019).
- Of the **4,988** children, **4,721** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims <1years, representing 666 of the 4,988 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




Workforce

There are <u>8,280</u> children, family, and school social workers in Minnesota with a mean wage of \$32.94 (compared to Minnesota's minimum wage: \$11.13)

Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 87.7% = parents of the child.
- 12.3% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 53.6% = female; 46.4% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>25</u> fatalities in 2022 to <u>32</u> in 2023.
- Minnesota reported 4 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **3,073** victims and **7,638** non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



Foster Care and Adoptions

- 10,923 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- **6,133** in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 4,213 children entered care and **4,790** exited.
- 1,103 children were adopted; 1,633 were waiting to be adopted.
- 10.7% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system also increased by 10.2% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021




The increase since 2020 10.1% in children transitioning from foster care to independence.

Juvenile Justice

- 18,594 total arrests for children under 18 in
- 1,933 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 3,968 for Property Crimes.
- 1,412 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 378 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 948 kids in 2019; 60.1% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>




- In 2021, 365 children exited foster care due to age (10.1% decrease from 2020).
- 1,729 children were living with nonrelatives; 2,726 stayed with a relative.

15.5%

- 832 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 86 children classified as runaways.
- 3% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

Adoption, <u>2020</u>




The decline since 60.1% 2019 of children living in juvenile correction facilities.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Minnesota spent \$755,822,053.00 on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$132,978,431.00 = from the federal government
- \$53,460,458.97 = from state and local funds.






The significant funding sectors of the <u>\$132,978,431.00</u> in federal funding received in Minnesota in 2020:

- \$53,601,883.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$46,865,939.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Minnesota sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$32,236,014

Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>37%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 16% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 10% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$20,129</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$9,765 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty


- <u>250,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2023 (19% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients decreased from 46,151 in 2021 to 33,823 in 2022 (26.7% decrease).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




HOUSING

- 4,277, children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (1.63%)
- 35.4% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>23%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>21,075</u> total Minnesota residents living in public housing



- The state spent \$69,174,598 on WIC in 2023, serving 106,144 people: a 6.4% increase in total participants and a 21.5% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>550,220</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including **152,334** of children.
- <u>38.5%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Minnesota, 2020








Health

- <u>4,439</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (7.2%% of births).
- <u>6,195</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (9.6%).
 - 9.1%% of all White babies
 - 11.2% of all Black babies
- <u>1,465</u> births to mothers aged 15–19 in 2023 a rate of 8 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>294</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023 -- a rate of 5 per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




Medicaid Expansion

Minnesota is a <u>Medicaid expansion</u> state, implemented on 1/1/2014.

Maternal Mortality

- 40 Minnesota women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Minnesota, there are 12 maternal deaths
 - 46,000 children had no health insurance in 2023.
 - <u>640,118</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (2.1% increase from 2020).
 - 3,268 children in Minnesota were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (2.8% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








Zero to Three

- 72.9% of babies live above low-income
- 15.5% of babies live at low income
- 11.6% of babies live in poverty
- 4.2% of babies live in deep poverty
- 84.3% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Minnesota reported <u>1,183</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Minnesota reported **998** plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Minnesota has a Family First plan approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>13,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (4%)
- <u>38</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Minnesota in 2022.

Mental Health

- <u>91,425</u> children received mental health treatment in Minnesota in 2022 (4.9%)
- In 2022, there were <u>11.2</u> deaths by suicide per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Minnesota.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of 41,195 children in Minnesota (2.0%% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>670</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
