
### Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Mississippi had <u>32,923</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **24,826** were screened in for response by CPS.
- 8,781 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 12.9 children per 1,000 (6.4% decrease since 2019).
- Of the **8,781** children, **7,766** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1 years, representing 1,240 of the 8,781 cases.

#### Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




### Workforce

There are 3,370 children, family, and school social workers in Mississippi with a mean wage of \$20.55 (compared to Mississippi's minimum wage: \$7.25)



#### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023



Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 72.3% = parents of the child.
- 27.6% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 53.0% = female; 46.6% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>72</u> in 2022 to <u>76</u> in 2023.
- Mississippi reported 11 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **9,460** victims and **29,511** non-victims.


### Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>



### Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>5,805</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 3,825 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **2,150** children entered care and **1,990** exited.
- 604 children were adopted; 1,154 were waiting to be adopted.
- 8.1% increase in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also increased by 6.7% from 2021.

#### Duration in Care, 2021





#### Juvenile Justice

- 2,719 total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 362 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 596 for Property Crimes.
- 214 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>186</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **198** kids in 2019; 6.1% decline).

### Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>58</u> children exited foster care due to age (4.9% decrease from 2020).
- 1,726 children were living with non-relatives; 1,176 stayed with a relative.
- 239 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 20 children classified as runaways.
- 7% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






# Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Mississippi spent \$107,994,159.73 on child welfare services in 2020.
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$84,391,506.92 = from the federal government
- \$23,308,666.69 = from state and local funds.


#### Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$84,391,506.92 in federal funding received in Mississippi in 2020:

- \$20,747,634 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$20,953,435 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Mississippi's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2021 was \$8,009,657

### Child Care & Early Learning




- <u>45%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 11% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 21% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$8,186</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$6,724 annual cost of home-based infant care



### Child Poverty

- <u>217,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (32% of all children).
- 29% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>2,880</u> in 2021 to <u>2,511</u> in 2022 (12.8% decrease).

### Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>



### **HOUSING**


- 1,930 children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (1.39%)
- 39.8% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>25%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- 16,674 total Mississippi residents living in public housing

#### **Child Poverty Over Time**



- The state spent \$37,585,920 on WIC in 2023, serving 64,689 people: a 3.68% decrease in total participants and 107% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>553,610</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 159,370 children.
- 47.7% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

### Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Mississippi, 2020








### Health

- 4,290 low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (12.5% of births).
- <u>5,257</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (15% of births).
  - 12.9% of all White babies
  - 18% of all Black babies
- <u>2,596</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of **25** in every 1,000 teen girls.
- 305 infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of 9 per 1,000.

### Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




#### Medicaid Expansion

Mississippi has not adopted a Medicaid expansion policy.

#### **Maternal Mortality**

- <u>70</u> Mississippi women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- Mississippi reported <u>39</u> maternal deaths per every 100,000 live births
- <u>39,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (15.3% decrease from 2021).
- <u>355,000</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2022 (1.9% decrease from 2021).
- <u>80,058</u> children in Mississippi were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (5.2% decrease from 2020).

### Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








### Zero to Three

- 48.3% of babies live above low-income
- 22.3% of babies live at low income
- 29.4% of babies live in poverty
- 12.9% of babies live in deep poverty
- 72.4% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

#### Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Mississippi did not report the number of infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Mississippi did not report any plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Mississippi <u>has submitted a Family First plan</u> to be approved by the administration.


#### Teens & Youth

- <u>15,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (8%)
- <u>114</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Mississippi in 2020.

### Mental Health

- <u>36,441</u> children received mental health treatment in Mississippi in 2022 (2.0%)
- In 2022, there were <u>9.0</u> suicide deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Mississippi.

### Treatment Type for Youth with Substance Use Disorder, <u>2023</u>



- From 2015 to 2019, an average of 18,165 children in Mississippi (1.9% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>350</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
