

Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Missouri had <u>87,029</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **60,613** were screened in for response by CPS.
- 4,419 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 2.8 children per 1,000 (7.2% decrease since 2019).
- Of the **4,419** children, **3,814** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = 15 years, representing 341 of the 4,419 cases.

<u>Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023</u>




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- <u>55.8%</u> = parents of the child.
- 44.2% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 58.9% = female; 41.0% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>57</u> in 2022 to <u>61</u> in 2023.
- Missouri reported 7 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **4,515** victims and **80,177** non-victims.

There are <u>6,890</u> children, family, and school social workers in Missouri with a mean wage of \$21.34 (compared to Missouri's minimum wage: \$13.75)




Foster Care and Adoptions


- <u>18,824</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 12,514 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 5,876 children entered care and **6,310** exited.
- 1,470 children were adopted; 2,451 were waiting to be adopted.
- 5.15% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system increased by 3.59% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021




- 2019.

- <u>612</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (increase from 588 kids in 2019; 4.08% increase).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, 601 children exited foster care due to age (.33% increase from 2020).
- 3,841 children were living with nonrelatives; 5,336 stayed with a relative.
- 855 children were staying in group homes or institutions: 85 children classified as runaways.
- 4.4% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

Adoption, <u>2020</u>





Funding for Child Welfare Services


- Missouri spent <u>\$566,652,953.47</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$342,577,915.07 = from the federal government
- \$210,262,958.56 = from state and local funds.




The significant funding sectors of the \$<u>342,577,915.07</u> in federal funding received in Missouri in 2020:

- \$58,474,510.88 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$44,261,541.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Missouri's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2021 was \$51,369,005






Child Poverty

- <u>336,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (25% of all children).
- <u>22%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from 15,333 in 2021 to 12,480 in 2022 (18.61% decrease).


Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, 2023


HOUSING

- <u>9,915</u> children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (3.53%)
- <u>24.5%</u> of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- 22% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>26,870</u> total Missouri residents living in public housing



- The state spent <u>\$46,757,490</u> on WIC in 2023, serving **89,547** people: a **7.02%** increase in total participants and 33.26% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>924,180</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 254,720 children.
- 44.8% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Missouri, 2020








Health

- <u>5,972</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (**8.9**% of births).
- <u>7,821</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (11.28% of births).
 - 10.42% of all White babies
 - 15.73% of all Black babies
- <u>3,166</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 16 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>392</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of 6 per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




Medicaid Expansion

Missouri has been a <u>Medicaid</u> <u>expansion</u> state since 10/01/2021.

Maternal Mortality

- <u>84</u> Missouri women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- Missouri reported <u>24</u> maternal deaths per every 100,000 live births
- <u>83,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (**3.49**% decrease from 2021).
- <u>503,000</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2022 (3.29% increase from 2021).
- <u>99,958</u> children in Missouri were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (14.79% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








Zero to Three

- <u>56.2%</u> of babies live above low-income
- 24.9% of babies live at low income
- 18.9% of babies live in poverty
- 9.4% of babies live in deep poverty
- 78.5% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Missouri reported <u>946</u> infants screened with prenatal substance exposure.
- Missouri reported 0 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Missouri <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>22,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (6%)
- <u>131</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Missouri in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>21,949</u> children received mental health treatment in Missouri in 2022 (1.2%)
- In 2022, there were <u>12.3</u> suicide deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Missouri.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>38,990</u> children in Missouri (1.9% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>2,079</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for substance use disorder
