
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Montana had <u>10,632</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **6,978** were screened in for response by CPS.
- 2,628 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 11.2 children per 1,000 (29.7% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 2,628 children, 2,138 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 312 of the 2,628 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




Workforce

There are <u>1,090</u> children, family, and school social workers in Montana with a mean wage of \$23.72 (compared to Montana's minimum wage: \$10.30)



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 90.26% = parents of the child.
- 9.74% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 51.2% = female; 48.6% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>1</u> in 2022 to <u>2</u> in 2023.
- Montana reported 1 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 2,784 victims and 9,832 non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>4,434</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 2,672 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **1,398** children entered care and **1,764** exited.
- 340 children were adopted; 553 were waiting to be adopted.
- 13.33% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system increased by 8.63% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice


- 4,355 total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 413 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 658 for Property Crimes.
- 324 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>99</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 138 kids in 2019; 28.3% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>92</u> children exited foster care due to age (9.8% decrease from 2020).
- 1,010 children were living with non-relatives; 1,310 stayed with a relative.
- 249 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 13 children classified as runaways.
- <u>3.6%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Montana spent \$111,734,767.36 on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$46,650,849.69 = from the federal government
- \$63,224,023.05 = from state and local funds.


Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$46,650,849.69 in federal funding received in Montana in 2020:

- \$15,354,863.80 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$12,295,443.52 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Montana's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$6,836,628

Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>50%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 20% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 9% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$11,700</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- **\$9,100** annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty

- <u>58,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (25% of all children).
- 21% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from 4,944 in 2021 to 4,252 in 2022 (14% decrease).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, 2023



HOUSING


- 1,285 children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (2.82%)
- 30.3% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>21%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>3,051</u> total Montana residents living in public housing

Child Poverty Over Time



- The state spent \$8,440,804 on WIC in 2023, serving 13,966 people: a 1.01% increase in total participants and 15.9% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>130,980</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 39,580 children.
- 38.5% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Montana, 2020








Health

- <u>855</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (7.7% of births).
- <u>1,090</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (9.72% of births).
 - 9.16% of all White babies
 - Unreported % of all Black babies
- 442 births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2021 -- a rate of 14 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>55</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2021; a rate of **4.9** per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, 2021




Medicaid Expansion

Montana has been a <u>Medicaid</u> expansion state since 01/01/2016.

Maternal Mortality

- 17 Montana women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- Montana did not report a number of maternal deaths per every 100,000 live births
- <u>17,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (0% decrease/increase from 2021).
- <u>95,000</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2022 (2.15% increase from 2021).
- 30,652 children in Montana were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (25.11% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2021








Zero to Three

- <u>68.0%</u> of babies live above low-income
- 18.4% of babies live at low income
- 13.6% of babies live in poverty
- 5.1% of babies live in deep poverty
- 73.7% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Montana reported <u>25</u> infants screened with prenatal substance exposure.
- Montana reported 0 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Montana <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>4,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (7%)
- 14 children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Montana in 2020.

Mental Health

- 23,245 children received mental health treatment in Montana in 2022 (1.3%)
- In 2022, there were <u>36.3</u> suicide deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15–19 in Montana.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>12,546</u> children in Montana (3.5% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>180</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for substance use disorder
