
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Nebraska had <u>40,356</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **14,499** were screened in for response by CPS.
- 2,228 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 4.6 children per 1,000 (21% decrease since 2019).
- Of the **2,228** children, **1,795** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 277 of the 2,228 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




There are 3,520 children, family, and school social workers in Nebraska with a mean wage of \$22.89 (compared to Nebraska's minimum wage: \$13.50)





Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 75% = parents of the child.
- 25% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 53.2% = female; 46.5% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>3</u> in 2022 to <u>0</u> in 2023.
- Nebraska reported **5** total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 1,622 victims and 13,395 non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>5,671</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 3,873 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **1,929** children entered care and **1,798** exited.
- 392 children were adopted; 807 were waiting to be adopted.
- 1% increase in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system increased by **6.5**% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice

- <u>8,282</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 398 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 1,846 for Property Crimes.
- 1,111 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>207</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **309** kids in 2019; 33% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>110</u> children exited foster care due to age (8.9% increase from 2020).
- 1,647 children were living with non-relatives; 1,322 stayed with a relative.
- 152 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 38 children classified as runaways.
- <u>3%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Nebraska spent \$157,510,499.71 on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$67,583,829.11 = from the federal government
- \$87,480,085.78 = from state and local funds.


Federal Funding Sources, 2022



The significant funding sectors of the \$157,510,499.71 in federal funding received in Nebraska in 2020:

- \$7,055,950.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$25,084,271.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Nebraska's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2020 was \$11,602,088

Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>32%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 20% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 10% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- \$13,000 annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$8,320 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty

- <u>91,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (19% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients decreased from <u>8,003</u> in 2021 to <u>6,299</u> in 2022 (21.2% decrease).


Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>



HOUSING


- <u>924</u> children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (0.94%)
- 36.8% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- 22% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>10,338</u> total Nebraska residents living in public housing

Child Poverty Over Time



- The state spent \$20,606,945 on WIC in 2023, serving 36,356 people: a 2.19% increase in total participants and 16.18% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>288,410</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including 109,123 children.
- 46.1% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Nebraska, <u>2020</u>






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Health

- <u>1,936</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (**8.0**% of births).
- 2,653 preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (10.8%).
 - 10.16% of all White babies
 - 15.66% of all Black babies
- 896 births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 a rate of 13 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>153</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023 -- a rate of 6 per 1,000.

Medicaid Expansion


Nebraska has been a <u>Medicaid</u> <u>expansion</u> state since 10/01/2020

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Maternal Mortality

- 31 Nebraska women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Nebraska, there is 25 maternal deaths
 - <u>23,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (4.2% decrease from 2021).
 - <u>174,328</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (3% increase from 2020).
 - <u>57,523</u> children in Nebraska were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (7.6% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>






Zero to Three

- 66.9% of babies live above low-income
- 20.3% of babies live at low income
- 12.8% of babies live in poverty
- 7.9% of babies live in deep poverty
- 87.5% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Nebraska reported <u>149</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Nebraska reported 31 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Nebraska <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>3,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (3%)
- <u>25</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Nebraska in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>3,018</u> children received mental health treatment in Nebraska in 2022 (0.2%)
- In 2022, there were <u>14.4</u> deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Nebraska.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>5,185</u> children in Nebraska (0.8% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, 400 clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD
