
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Nevada had <u>41,010</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **15,091** were screened in for response by CPS.
- 6,496 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 8.4 children per 1,000 (30.2% increase since 2019).
- Of the **6,496** children, **4,195** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 894 of the 6,496 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




Workforce

There are 3,800 children, family, and school social workers in Nevada with a mean wage of \$28.39 (compared to Nevada's minimum wage: \$12)



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 82.7% = parents of the child.
- 17.2% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 49.7% = female; 50.2% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>15</u> in 2022 to <u>21</u> in 2023.
- Nevada reported **5** total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **6,947** victims and **27,175** non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>



Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>6,783</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- **4,047** in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **2,650** children entered care and **2,736** exited.
- 744 children were adopted; 1,470 were waiting to be adopted.
- 3.3% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system increased by 2.3% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice


- <u>10,818</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 1,216 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 1,246 for Property Crimes.
- 1,778 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>342</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **546** kids in 2019; 37% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>164</u> children exited foster care due to age (1.23% increase from 2020).
- 1,881 children were living with non-relatives; 1,792 stayed with a relative.
- 184 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 63 children classified as runaways.
- 4% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Nevada spent \$253,074,236.01 on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$114,092,179.69 = from the federal government
- \$138,642,563.84 = from state and local funds.


Federal Funding Sources, 2022



The significant funding sectors of the \$114,092,179.69 in federal funding received in Nevada in 2020:

- \$40,775,340.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$41,000,662.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Nevada's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$15,487,070

Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>12%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 4% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 7% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- \$13,024 annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$10,407 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty

• 195,000 children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (28% of all children).

- 35% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients rose from <u>14,546</u> in 2021 to <u>15,821</u> in 2022 (8.8% increase).


Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, 2023



HOUSING


- 5,076 children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (3.68%)
- 24.4% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>35%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- 5,676 total Nevada residents living in public housing

Child Poverty Over Time



- The state spent \$32,184,461 on WIC in 2023, serving **52,830** people: a **0.4**% increase in total participants and 14.9% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>375,531</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including 87,142 children.
- 35.5% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Nevada, 2020










Health

- <u>3,016</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (**9.5**% of births).
- <u>3,779</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (11.2% of births).
 - 9.4% of all White babies
 - 15.6% of all Black babies
- <u>1,248</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 13 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- 191 infants aged<1yr died in 2023; a rate of 6.0 per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




Medicaid Expansion

Nevada has been a <u>Medicaid</u> expansion state since 01/01/2014.

Maternal Mortality

- 35 Nevada women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Nevada, there is **20** maternal deaths
- <u>55,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (12.7% decrease from 2021).
- <u>349,006</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (7.4% decrease from 2020).
- <u>63,132</u> children in Nevada were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (4.1% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2021








Zero to Three

- 57.2% of babies live above low-income
- 22.8% of babies live at low income
- 19.9% of babies live in poverty
- 11.2% of babies live in deep poverty
- 75.5% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Nevada reported <u>1,536</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Nevada reported **249** plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Nevada <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>14,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (9%)
- 48 children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Nevada in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>3,384</u> children received mental health treatment in Nevada in 2022 (0.2%)
- In 2022, there were <u>15.0</u> deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Nevada.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>34,233</u> children in Nevada (3.5% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>1,099</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD
