
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, New Hampshire had <u>200,393</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 10,318 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 1,276 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 5.1 children per 1,000 (4.8% increase since 2019).
- Of the 1,276 children, 983 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 158 of the 1,276 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




Workforce

There are <u>880</u> children, family, and school social workers in New Hampshire with a mean wage of \$29.23 (compared to New Hampshire's minimum wage: \$7.25)



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 85.4% = parents of the child.
- **14.6**% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 51.1% = female; 48.8% = male.
- Child fatalities stayed stagnant from <u>2</u> in 2022 to <u>2</u> in 2023.
- New Hampshire reported 9 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 1,317 victims and 14,329 non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>



Foster Care and Adoptions

- 1,779 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 1,181 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 740 children entered care and 598 exited.
- 221 children were adopted; 238 were waiting to be adopted.
- 8.2% increase in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 8.3% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021




The increase since 2020 36.7% in children transitioning from foster care to independence.

Juvenile Justice

- 3,243 total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 88 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 241 for Property Crimes.
- 337 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 12 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 24 kids in 2019; 50% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>



- In 2021, 1,173 children exited foster care due to age (7.3% decrease from 2020).
- 8,700 children were living with nonrelatives; 3,233 stayed with a relative.
- 1,828 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 166 children classified as runaways.
- 3% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

The decline since 2019 of children living in juvenile correction facilities.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- New Hampshire spent \$92,067,015.87 on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$72,851,957.00 = from the federal government
- \$16,517,518.00 = from state and local funds.






The significant funding sectors of the \$72,851,957.00 in federal funding received in New Hampshire in 2020:

- \$32,695,275.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$8,128,306.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- New Hampshire's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$6,557,037

Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>26%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 10% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 13% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$17,250</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$11,402 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty

• <u>48,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (19% of all children).

- <u>25%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from 6,068 in 2021 to 5,228 in 2022 (13.8% decrease).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>



HOUSING


- 1,073 children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (2.14%)
- 27.3% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>25%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>5,522</u> total New Hampshire residents living in public housing

Child Poverty Over Time



- The state spent \$7,161,558 on WIC in 2023, serving 13,373 people: a 1.96% decrease in total participants and 21.7% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>135,200</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 33,720 children.
- 41.9% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Ohio, <u>2020</u>








Health

- <u>809</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (6.8% of births).
- <u>1,077</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (8.5% of births).
 - 8.49% of all White babies
 - 9.85% of all Black babies
- 186 births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 a rate of 5 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>37</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of **3.0** per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




Medicaid Expansion

New Hampshire has been a <u>Medicaid</u> expansion state since 08/15/2014.

Maternal Mortality

- 11 New Hampshire women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- 9,000 children had no health insurance in 2022 (18.18% decrease from 2021).
- <u>89,670</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (0.004% decrease from 2020).
- <u>20,261</u> children in New Hampshire were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (18.4% increase from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








Zero to Three

- 74.6% of babies live above low-income
- 16.4% of babies live at low income
- 9.1% of babies live in poverty
- 5.7% of babies live in deep poverty
- 82.7% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, New Hampshire reported <u>118</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- New Hampshire reported 74 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

New Hampshire <u>has a Family First</u> <u>plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>2,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (6%)
- Zero children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in New Hampshire in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>13,000</u> children received mental health treatment in New Hampshire in 2022 (0.7%)
- In 2022, there were **9.6** suicide deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in New Hampshire.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>12,613</u> children in New Hampshire (2.7% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>1,790</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
