
### Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, New Mexico had <u>37,716</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 19,118 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 5,670 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 12.6 children per 1,000 (29.3% decrease since 2019).
- Of the **5,670** children, **3,894** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 651 of the 5,670 cases.

### Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




### Workforce

There are <u>2,470</u> children, family, and school social workers in New Mexico with a mean wage of \$26.33 (compared to New Mexico's minimum wage: \$12.00)



#### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 85.3% = parents of the child.
- 14.6% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 50.6% = female; 48.8% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>19</u> in 2022 to <u>16</u> in 2023.
- New Mexico reported 0 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **6,673** victims and **22,450** non-victims.


## Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>



### Foster Care and Adoptions

- 2,748 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- **1,800** in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 927 children entered care and **950** exited.
- 203 children were adopted; 704 were waiting to be adopted.
- 2.2% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 36.4% from 2021.

#### Duration in Care, 2021




The decrease since 2020 25.3% in children transitioning from foster care to independence.

### Juvenile Justice


- 2,852 total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 219 for Disorderly Conduct.
- **265** for Property Crimes.
- 438 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 198 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 270 kids in 2019; 27% decline).

#### Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>



- In 2021, <u>68</u> children exited foster care due to age (25.3% decrease from 2020).
- 840 children were living with non-relatives; 659 stayed with a relative.
- 125 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 47 children classified as runaways.
- 4% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

The decline since 2019 of children living in juvenile correction facilities.






# Funding for Child Welfare Services

- New Mexico spent \$88,937,542.42 on child welfare services in 2020.
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$58,272,428 = from the federal government
- \$29,336,431 = from state and local funds.


#### Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$58,272,428 in federal funding received in New Mexico in 2020:

- \$24,819,697 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$25,591,795 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- New Mexico's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$11,386,064

### Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>26%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 12% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 16% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$13,521</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$11,564 annual cost of home-based infant care






### Child Poverty

### • 147,000 children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (32% of all children).

- <u>28%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>29,944</u> in 2021 to <u>27,996</u> in 2022 (6.5% decrease).


### Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>



### **HOUSING**


- 2,784 children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (3.21%)
- 37.9% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>28%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- 7,613 total New Mexico residents living in public housing

#### **Child Poverty Over Time**



- The state spent \$24,730,253 on WIC in 2023, serving 38,257 people: a 10.89% increase in total participants and 34.06% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>321,370</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 100,420 children.
- 41.1% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

### Total Urban vs. Rural Population of New Mexico, 2020






### Health

- <u>2,024</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (9.7% of births).
- 2,142 preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (10% of births).
  - 8.82% of all White babies
  - 15.05% of all Black babies
- <u>1,267</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 18 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- 97 infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of **5.0** per 1,000.

#### Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, 2021




### Medicaid Expansion

New Mexico has been a Medicaid expansion state since 01/01/2014.

### **Maternal Mortality**

- 31 New Mexico women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in New Mexico, there is 28 maternal deaths
- 18,000 children had no health insurance in 2022 (43.75% decrease from 2021).
- 404,719 children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (1.9% increase from 2020).
- 6,830 children in New Mexico were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (29% decrease from 2020).

#### Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2021










### Zero to Three

- 45.6% of babies live above low-income
- 26.0% of babies live at low income
- 28.4% of babies live in poverty
- 17.8% of babies live in deep poverty
- 71.7% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

#### Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, New Mexico reported <u>658</u> infants in screened with prenatal substance exposure.
- New Mexico reported 52 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

New Mexico has submitted a Family First plan to be approved by the administration.


### Teens & Youth

- <u>11,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (6%)
- 41 children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in New Mexico in 2020.

### Mental Health

- <u>65,814</u> children received mental health treatment in New Mexico in 2022 (3.6%)
- In 2022, there were <u>19.6</u> suicide deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in New Mexico.

### Treatment Type for Youth with Substance Use Disorder, <u>2023</u>



- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>18,717</u> children in New Mexico (2.7% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>725</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD
