
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, New York had <u>148,838</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 148,838 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 46,431 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 11.7 children per 1,000 (31.0% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 46,431 children, 27,359 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 4,193 of the 46,431 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




Workforce

There are <u>22,310</u> children, family, and school social workers in New York with a mean wage of \$35.62 (compared to New York's minimum wage: \$15.50)





Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- <u>83.8%</u> = parents of the child.
- 16.2% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 51% = female; 48.9% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>105</u> in 2022 to <u>123</u> in 2023.
- New York reported 2 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- No data is available on post-response services given to victims and non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>20,605</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 14,134 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **6,097** children entered care and **6,471** exited.
- 1,248 children were adopted; 3,610 were waiting to be adopted.
- 3.6% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also increased by 9% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice

- <u>10,818</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 1,216 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 1,246 for Property Crimes.
- 1,778 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>342</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **546** kids in 2019; 37% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021




• In 2021, <u>1,525</u> children exited foster care due to age (3.8% decrease from 2020).

• 6,380 children were living with non-relatives; 4,687 stayed with a relative.

• 1,574 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 270 children classified as runaways.

• 4% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- New York spent \$2,608,150,336 on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$978,222,983 = from the federal government
- \$1,629,927,353 = from state and local funds.

Federal Funding Sources, 2020




The significant funding sectors of the \$978,222,983 in federal funding received in New York in 2020:

- \$484,909,672 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$158,883,392 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.

New York's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$208,762,428

Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>24%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 9% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 10% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$19,584</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$16,383 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty

• 1,206,000 children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (30% of all children).

- 38% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients rose from 166,672 in 2021 to 173,080 in 2022 (3.8% increase).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>




HOUSING

- 43,604 children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (5.18%)
- 22.1% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>38%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>299,346</u> total New York residents living in public housing



Child Poverty Over Time



- The state spent \$365,851,632 on WIC in 2023, serving 416,219 people: a 7.4% increase in total participants and 20.9% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>2,638,700</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 747,520 children.
- <u>32.4%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of New York, <u>2020</u>






Health

- <u>17,381</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (8.6% of births).
- <u>20,390</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (9.7% of births).
 - 8.18% of all White babies
 - 14.34% of all Black babies
- <u>5,000</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2021 -- a rate of **9** in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>825</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2021; a rate of 4 per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




Medicaid Expansion

New York has been a <u>Medicaid</u> expansion state since 01/01/2014.

Maternal Mortality

- 241 New York women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in New York, there is 22 maternal deaths
- <u>111,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (3.5% decrease from 2021).
- 2,121,659 children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (3.8% increase from 2020).
- <u>631,462</u> children in New York were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (16% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








Zero to Three

- 63.0% of babies live above low-income
- 17.4% of babies live at low income
- 19.6% of babies live in poverty
- 10.9% of babies live in deep poverty
- 72.6% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, New York reported <u>215</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- New York reported **184** plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

New York <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>61,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (6%)
- 82 children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in New York in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>6,345</u> children received mental health treatment in New York in 2022 (0.3%)
- In 2022, there were <u>5.1</u> deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in New York.

• From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>134,107</u> children in New York (2.3% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.

Substance Use

• On March 31st, 2023, <u>1,974</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD
