
### Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, North Dakota had <u>2,643</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. All <u>2,643</u> were screened in for response by CPS.
- 895 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 4.8 children per 1,000 (50.2% decrease since 2019).
- Of the **895** children, **663** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 190 of the 895 cases.

#### Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




### Workforce

There are <u>820</u> children, family, and school social workers in North Dakota with a mean wage of \$30.05 (compared to North Dakota's minimum wage: \$7.25)



#### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 83.5% = parents of the child.
- 16.4% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 49.6% = female; 50.4% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>6</u> in 2022 to <u>2</u> in 2023.
- North Dakota reported 0 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 909 victims and 4,098 non-victims.


# Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>



### Foster Care and Adoptions

- 2,346 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- **1,547** in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 893 children entered care and 801 exited.
- 225 children were adopted; 431 were waiting to be adopted.
- 2.5% increase in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 1.7% from 2020.

#### Duration in Care, 2021




The increase since 2020 37.5% in children transitioning from foster care to independence.

### Juvenile Justice


- 4,152 total arrests for children under 18 in
- 740 for Disorderly Conduct.
- **559** for Property Crimes.
- 332 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 39 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 78 kids in 2019; 50% decline).

### Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>



- In 2021, 33 children exited foster care due to age (37.5% increase from 2020).
- 931 children were living with nonrelatives; 365 stayed with a relative.
- 83 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 5 children classified as runaways.
- 1.5% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






# Funding for Child Welfare Services

- North Dakota spent \$51,908,304.14 on child welfare services in 2020.
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$29,743,616 = from the federal government
- \$22,164,688.14 = from state and local funds.


#### Federal Funding Sources, 2022



The significant funding sectors of the \$29,743,616 in federal funding received in North Dakota in 2020:


- \$13,269,899 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$9,394,307 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- North Dakota's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$3,747,139

# Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>50%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 17% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 10% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$10,758</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- **\$9,203** annual cost of home-based infant care






## Child Poverty

- <u>33,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (18% of all children).
- 19% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from 2,778 in 2021 to 1,738 in 2022 (37.4% decrease).

# Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>



### **HOUSING**


- <u>660</u> children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (1.66%)
- 25.1% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- 19% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>2,037</u> total North Dakota residents living in public housing

#### **Child Poverty Over Time**



- The state spent \$6,463,285 on WIC in 2023, serving 10,423 people: a 10.9% increase in total participants and 2% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>66,310</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 24,350 children.
- 41.7% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

# Total Urban vs. Rural Population of North Dakota, 2020








### Health

- <u>681</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (7.1% of births).
- <u>966</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (9.6% of births).
  - 8.83% of all White babies
  - 11.62% of all Black babies
- <u>299</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 11 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- 45 infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of 5 per 1,000.

# Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




### **Medicaid Expansion**

North Dakota has been a Medicaid expansion state since 01/01/2014.

### **Maternal Mortality**

- 11 North Dakota women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- The number of maternal deaths to every 100,000 live births is not recorded in North Dakota.
- <u>10,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (28.57% decrease from 2021).
- <u>37,385</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (22.8% increase from 2021).
- <u>7,592</u> children in North Dakota were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (35% increase from 2020).

# Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








### Zero to Three

- 72.1% of babies live above low-income
- 18.4% of babies live at low income
- 9.5% of babies live in poverty
- 6.8% of babies live in deep poverty
- 83.5% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

#### Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, North Dakota did not report data for infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- North Dakota did not report any plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

North Dakota <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


### Teens & Youth

- <u>2,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (4%)
- <u>0</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in North Dakota in 2020.

### Mental Health

- <u>1,800</u> children received mental health treatment in North Dakota in 2022 (0.1%)
- In 2022, there were <u>13.7</u> suicide deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in North Dakota.

#### Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>5,032</u> children in North Dakota (1.9% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>659</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
