
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Ohio had <u>200,393</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **72,709** were screened in for response by CPS.
- 20,598 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 8.0 children per 1,000 (19.1% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 20,598 children, 14,894 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 3,111 of the 20,598 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




Workforce

There are 11,870 children, family, and school social workers in Ohio with a mean wage of \$24.62 (compared to Ohio's minimum wage: \$10.70)



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 63.3% = parents of the child.
- 36.7% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 53.4% = female; 46.3% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>115</u> in 2022 to <u>140</u> in 2023.
- Ohio reported 0 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 22,499 victims and 90,072 non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>



Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>24,391</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 14,946 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 9,701 children entered care and 9,445 exited.
- 1,543 children were adopted; 3,679 were waiting to be adopted.
- 3.3% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 4.9% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice


- <u>20,149</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 1,676 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 3,287 for Property Crimes.
- 1,362 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>1,476</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 1,746 kids in 2019; 15% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>1,173</u> children exited foster care due to age (7.3% decrease from 2020).
- 8,700 children were living with non-relatives; 3,233 stayed with a relative.
- 1,828 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 166 children classified as runaways.
- <u>3%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Ohio spent \$1,415,773,422.15 on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$535,445,313.08 = from the federal government
- \$876,371,171.15 = from state and local funds.






The significant funding sectors of the \$535,445,313.08 in federal funding received in Ohio in 2020:

- \$222,540,668.66 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$185,674,249 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Ohio's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$130,204,382

Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>30%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 10% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 9% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$12,351</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$9,278 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty

- <u>662,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (26% of all children).
- 23% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>86,601</u> in 2021 to <u>74,703</u> in 2022 (13.7% decrease).


Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>



HOUSING


- 7,660 children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (1.46%)
- 32.7% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- 23% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>61,105</u> total Ohio residents living in public housing

Child Poverty Over Time



- The state spent \$116,403,424 on WIC in 2023, serving 174,372 people: a 8.88% increase in total participants and 39.5% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>1,653,610</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 505,430 children.
- 40.3% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Ohio, <u>2020</u>






Health

- <u>11,092</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (8.7% of births).
- <u>13,737</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (10.6% of births).
 - 9.63% of all White babies
 - 15.07% of all Black babies
- <u>5,478</u> births to mothers aged 15–19 in 2023 a rate of **15** in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>905</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of 7 per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




Medicaid Expansion

Ohio has been a Medicaid expansion state since 01/01/2014.

Maternal Mortality

- 161 Ohio women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Ohio, there is 25 maternal deaths
- <u>122,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (12.86% decrease from 2021).
- 1,272,111 children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (2.5% increase from 2020).
- <u>220,188</u> children in Ohio were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (4.3% increase from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








Zero to Three

- 55.8% of babies live above low-income
- 21.6% of babies live at low income
- 22.6% of babies live in poverty
- 12.1% of babies live in deep poverty
- 73.8% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Ohio reported <u>6,528</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Ohio reported 4,140 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Ohio <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>39,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (6%)
- <u>186</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Ohio in 2020.

Mental Health

- 24,750 children received mental health treatment in Ohio in 2022 (1.3%)
- In 2022, there were <u>9.6</u> suicide deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15–19 in Ohio.

Treatment Type for Youth with Substance Use Disorder, <u>2023</u>



- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>78,743</u> children in Ohio (2.0% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>8,936</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD
